Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time! readings emphasize the fleeting nature of life and human toil. We need to strive in holiness so that we may become rich in what matters to God. In the first reading from Ecclesiastes, Qoheloth speaks to the frustration of laboring hard for our goods and possessions when we know that we will eventually leave this earth without them. "For what profit comes to man from all the toil and anxiety of heart with which he has labored under the sun?" Then in the second reading from the Letter to the Colossians, Paul emphasizes the new life in Jesus that one has through being baptized. One should concentrate on what appears hidden, which will come to light in the glory of the kingdom. Paul says: "Think of what is above, not of what is on earth." And finally, in Luke's gospel, Jesus cautions against being so preoccupied with the riches of this world that you lose sight of what is most important. You never know when your life will come to its end here on earth. Judgment will not be so kind to anyone who has lived a life of greed. "Thus, it will be for all who store up treasure for themselves but are not rich in what matters to God."

We often mix up eternal things and things that don't last, meaningful things and things that don't mean much, real things and false things, heavenly things and earthly things, God-things and not-so-God things. Knowing what not to confuse is the easy part. It isn't that hard to believe in the things that matter in eternity and the things that don't. But actually, living in the light of this obvious truth is the hard part. Paul is not simply talking of material wealth, but that pursuing it is a dangerous trap. Many of us devote so much time and energy to it only to have it disappear in the blink of an eye when our life's ending rapidly approaches. What will matter then? Not the things we thought we couldn't do without. But there are many other things that can distract us from what is truly important: our desire for revenge, refusal to forgive, the earthly need for attention, feeling important or better than other people, or spending time endlessly entertaining ourselves while neglecting our obligations to others. All these "things" can lead us to a slew of regrets for the missed opportunities to bring some light and comfort to those who needed it.

In a real sense, today's readings are meant to act as a kind of warning to us, a kind of sign with big bold letters shouting **DANGER AHEAD** on it. Will we heed the warning, or will we presume it is meant for someone else? In other words, will we continue down the path of life confusing things that don't

really matter with the things that truly do? It's an important question to ask ourselves, because the answer matters not just for today, not just for tomorrow, but for eternity.

Have a great first week of August. Smile, share, set your sights on the things that really last and remember: Spend less time on what is urgent and more time on what is important. God bless always.





Summary of the Readings for the Week



On the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the first reading from Ecclesiastes offers a powerful caution about focusing too much on the things of this world: "Vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" In Luke's gospel Jesus tells the parable of the rich man storing up treasures for the future, and he warns, "Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions."



Wednesday is the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, with its own special readings. Friday is the Memorial of Saint Dominic.

We continue the story of Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt. This week our readings are from the Book of Numbers for the first several days and from the Book of Deuteronomy on Friday.



In Matthew's Gospel this week we hear some marvelous words about faith and discipleship. The "feeding of the 5,000" comes after the disciples ask Jesus to send the crowd away because they

didn't know how to feel them. Jesus tells them to "give them some food yourselves" and blesses the loaves and fishes.



Jesus comes to his disciples across the water in a storm, and invites Peter to come to him, across the water; when Peter comes, he takes his eyes off Jesus and goes down. A persistent Canaanite woman begs Jesus for help for her daughter. When he refuses, she persists and he replies, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish."

Jesus asks his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" and Peter replies, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." But when Peter tries to stop Jesus from talking about the hardships that are ahead, Jesus tells him, "Get behind me, Satan!" He gives his followers a guide for their lives: "Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it."



The disciples wonder why they could not drive out a demon from a boy, Jesus answers, "Because of your little faith." Faith "the size of a mustard seed" is enough.

Sunday is the Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus cautions us to be ready for the coming of the Lord. "Be sure of this: if the master of the house had known the hour when the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into.

Daily Prayer This Week

This week we can ask, in the variety of ways, in the situations of our daily lives, that our eyes might be opened to see Jesus as he really is - glorified, with the Father, and ready to renew our faith and trust in him.

As we begin our day, and at brief times throughout our day, we can pull our consciousness together by letting the themes of this week's readings guide us. What is truly important in life? How do we spend our time and money? What treasures are we storing up for eternity?

One day, we might ask to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus as we go through a day full of strong wind and waves. We can ask again and again, as things get tougher and more challenging.

Another day, we might focus on what comes out of our mouths. Is there cynicism, judgments, distortions of the truth, divisive and self-serving manipulation, yelling and hurtful put-downs?

How do I practice using my voice to give praise to God by affirming others, forgiving



them, by telling the truth, by defending the poor and the voiceless, by giving God thanks?

Another day, I might be conscious of those I regard as "dogs," those I disdain or think of as "the enemy." I might ask for the grace to open my heart to whatever faith in God they have, however different from mine. I might ask for a sense of solidarity with them, not because it is my desire or inclination, but because it is God's desire for me.



How can I heal and reconcile, at least in my heart, what needs healing: racism, sexism, anti-Semitism, anti-Muslimism, fear and hatred of foreigners, hostility against the poor or my harsh judgments about "sinners."

Later in the week, we can get in touch with the call of Jesus to deny ourselves. This is not self-denial for its own sake. This is the dying to self that comes from loving in the self-sacrificing way that Jesus did.

Who in my family, friends, relative, co-workers, members of my parish or congregation needs my self-denying love?

How have I focused on "gaining the world" and lost some of my true self in the process?

Is there some way this week that I can taste discovering my true self in giving some time, some compassion, some love, some special care to someone who needs this from me?

Contraception - Abortion Physician-Assisted Suicide

The early 1900s was bringing about a great change in how society viewed the inequalities in work, education, and voting for women. Margaret Sanger, thinking that childbearing was women's biggest problem, sought to change family structure by limiting family size, through "birth control" (a term she coined), to two or three children. She believed that children were a burden. "The most merciful thing that a large family does to one of its infant members is to kill it". In addition, for the "betterment of society", she promoted sterilization or permanent segregation for people she called "morons, imbeciles, criminals, epileptics". "While I personally believe in the sterilization of the feebleminded, the insane, and syphilitic, I have not been able to discover that these measures are more than superficial deterrents when applied to the constantly growing stream of the unfit". She lobbied to have government control the size of American families through birth control. sterilization and birthing licenses. "No woman shall have the legal right to bear a child, and no man shall have the right to become a father, without a permit". She started what she called "The Negro Project" to reduce the African American population by pushing birth control. Was Margaret Sanger's solution to the inequalities women faced in the 1900s, just about that, or was it more about eugenics, cleansing our human society of people that others have deemed "unfit" or "those unworthy of life"? As was stated before, the above are just "superficial deterrents". We as a people, as a nation, in such a short period of time, have gone from seeing each child that is conceived as a blessing, to birth control, and now to the widespread practice and acceptance of abortion, legally killing the child in the womb, when birth control fails. And now, another segment of our society is being given a "choice", physicianassisted suicide, euphemistically called "Medical Aid in Dying." (American Life League, Culture of Life Studies Program)

"There can be no true democracy without the recognition of every person's dignity and without respect for his or her rights...May the 'people of life' constantly grow in number and may a new culture of love and solidarity develop for the true good of the whole of human society."

(Evangelium Vitae, The Gospel of Life)




