Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today's readings encourage us to trust God to fill us with the grace needed to serve him and follow his Son, Jesus. In the first reading from the Book of Joshua, the people decide that they will continue to serve the God of Israel because it was by his power and benevolence that they were protected throughout their journey from captivity in Egypt to the Promised Land. When questioned by Joshua the people answered:

"Therefore we will also serve the Lord, for he is our God." Then in the second reading from Ephesians, Paul likens love between a husband and wife to that of Jesus and his Church. "For no one hates his own flesh but rather nourishes and cherishes it, even as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body." And finally in John's gospel, we see the difficulty that many people had in accepting what Jesus was teaching. They loved the miracles and healings, but when it came to Jesus claiming to be God's Son and that he was the "Bread of life" come down from heaven, it became too much for many people. They simply left him, so Jesus turned to the Twelve Apostles and asked they where they stood. It was Peter who spoke up and said: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God."

Many of Jesus' disciples stopped following him and returned to their former ways of life. How could that happen after all they saw Jesus do and heard him say? We would never do that! But are we so sure? Well you could say that we would have done the same thing 2000 years ago and are actually doing the same thing right now, in our time and place. Of course, we won't ever admit we don't believe his teachings or that we have walked away from him. Sometimes we fool ourselves that gong to Mass once a week assures us that we are still buying what Jesus is selling. But then, aren't returning to our former ways of life every time we yell at a spouse or child, apologize and do it again a half hour later? Sit in church and promise to forgive someone yet wake up carrying the same grudge? Hear Jesus challenge us to give from our want not from our excess, but then keep coming up with excuses to cling to ever dollar?

Say to God or a priest that we sincerely want to stop doing bad stuff like gossiping, cheating on taxes or spouse, stealing and many other things. Then as soon as leave the parking lot we go back to the same old self. Every time we wake up the exact same person, we were the day before we are, in a sese, returning to our old selves. We say we believe, which is the easy part. It's doing the right things, embracing the new life promised to us and made possible by the death and resurrection of Jesus that shows we want to be transformed into the beautiful persons God created us to be and say: "*Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life?*"



Institution Narrative

What is the Institution Narrative? Simply put, the Institution Narrative is the words of Jesus at the Last Supper which we hear in the Mass. These are the words of the Mass that describe what Jesus did and what he said, including the words of Consecration which gave us his Body and Blood for the Holy Eucharist. When we hear the word "Institution" in this context, we are talking about the Institution of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

One Narrative from Multiple Texts

Fr. Guy Oury, author of the The Mass, teaches, "The Account of the Institution is reported two different ways in the Gospel narrative. According to the Pauline tradition, followed by Saint Luke, the Lord after each consecration commanded his disciples to do what he had done, in memory of him: 'Do this in memory of me' (Lk 22:19). 'Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me' (1 Cor 11:25). Saint Matthew prefaces each consecration with an invitation to partake of the bread and wine: 'Take and eat' ... 'Drink from it, all of you' (Mt 26:26ff)." Fr. Oury continues, "St. Paul and St. Luke speak of the 'cup of the new covenant in my blood.' St. Matthew's rendition is more direct and abrupt: 'This is my blood of the [new] covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins'... As reported in St. Matthew, the words of institution contain what amounts to a complete doctrine of the Eucharistic celebration. They say in effect that the death of Jesus has the character of an expiatory sacrifice for the sin of the world. Beyond that, they say that the Eucharist gives us the true Body and the true Blood of the crucified Christ as our food, and by the very fact of sacramental eating of the victim it also gives us participation in Christ's own sacrifice-this by will of the Lord expressed in person..." Interestingly, "There is not a single Liturgy that adhered strictly to one of the four scriptural formulas to the exclusion of the three others. Every liturgical account of the Institution was made of borrowings from more than one text" (The Mass, pp. 91-92).



A Fuller Picture of the Last Supper

At the Last Supper, Jesus and his disciples ate a ritual meal. This meal had an order of events and a progression that would have been familiar to the disciples. What we recognize now in the Mass reflects parts of the meal that Jesus changed significantly. Those changes we now see at the heart of the Mass, as the priest stands in the person of Christ. These words and actions at the heart of the Mass are the true words and actions of Jesus, the words and actions by which Jesus changes the bread and wine into the Eucharist, his true Body and Blood.

To summarize from above, if we take the four Gospels together (or, in this case, Gospels plus the writings of St. Paul), we get a fuller picture of Jesus and his life. words. and ministry. The early Church knew we shouldn't leave anything out and knew the best way to give the "whole picture" was to use all the inspired Gospels and books of the Bible. We certainly benefit from the faith and wisdom of those who have gone before us! We have in the Bible four slightly different accounts of the words and actions of the Last Supper. As we said earlier when reflecting on the Gospels, we have four different Gospels because each writer had a particular audience he was writing for. Some things would have been widely known in certain audiences and so didn't need to be written down. For example, St. Matthew didn't need to talk about Jewish meals, sacrifices, and practices because he was writing to a Jewish audience who would have known all that. On the other hand, St. Luke and St. Paul do talk about the customs more, because they were primarily writing to non-Jewish people. When it comes to the Eucharist, what is essential and what is found in each account is that Jesus, by his word, changes the bread and wine into his Body and Blood, gives Communion to the disciples, and asks them to continue this celebration. That is exactly what we do in every Mass!.

For Reflection: Before participating in Mass, spend time with each of the Institution Narratives in Matthew, Mark, Luke, and 1 Corinthians. Attune your mind to be attentive to the words you will hear again during the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Excerpts from Falling in Love With Christ by Ronald Witherup, SS

There are five aspects of St. Paul's deeply personal experience in falling in love with Jesus that strikes me as pertinent today:

• Love is a two-way street: While the risen Lord startled Paul on the road to Damascus, Paul was free to reject the Lord. Paul, like every other Christian, had to be baptized, had to get acquainted with the stories of Jesus of Nazareth, had to grow in his faith. His love of Christ grew from him being the Church's biggest persecutor, to its most ardent evangelizer.

• True love grows over time: True love is never stagnant. Paul's relationship with Christ also grew throughout his ministry. Paul's letters show that spending time with Christ is essential. Thus the importance of prayer, the sacraments, liturgy, and the word of God that we see underscored in Paul's letters.

• The newness from falling in love: St. Paul speaks of the dramatic transformation that experiencing the love of Christ brought him. Paul uses the language of "new creation: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2Cor5:17; also Gal 6:15).

• The ultimate value of love: St. Paul speaks lovingly of the communities he founded, who were like his spiritual children (1Cor4:14-15). But he also recognized the difficulties of human relationships. He knew the power of sin to turn things upside down. Sometimes, he saw his communities wracked by divisions (such as the Corinthians) or outside agitators (such as the Galatians), but he always worked at getting them to see that enduring love could overcome all their difficulties.

• Love's openness to the future: Love remains open to new avenues, new developments. Paul viewed his love of Christ as something to be shared. After his conversion, Paul immediately set about evangelizing; to proclaim the love of Christ and to bring others into contact with Christ. Are we willing to risk falling in love with Christ?

Pillar 1 - Eucharistic Witness

St. Francis of Assisi

The joy of encountering, knowing and loving Jesus was the hallmark of St. Francis' life and one of the personal attributes that helped him draw others to Christ. He censured friars who


went about with a sad and gloomy face. He exhorted them to have a cheerful demeanor. This was St. Francis' habitual outlook, even in trials. When robbers and thieves beat him up and threw him in a snowy ditch, he jumped out and joyfully sang praises to God. St. Francis shows us the joy that comes from following and obeying Jesus, the joy that enables us to endure suffering and persecution.

St. Francis had a burning desire to imitate Jesus who endured rejection and suffering for the love of us. So, suffering with Jesus was what he considered "perfect joy." "Perfect joy!" Francis knew that perfect joy is a gift of the Holy Spirit. It makes us rejoice in sharing Jesus' humiliation and suffering, knowing we will share in His resurrection and glorification.

In life, there is suffering, sorrow and grief. Joy can still endure, even a flicker, when we keep the faith that we are infinitely loved by God. Joy can be restored. In selfabsorption, we don't accept the gift of joy. Joy comes thru an encounter with Jesus.

As those who have encountered Jesus, we are called to share the joy of the Gospel: Each Christian and every community must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the 'peripheries' in need of the light of the Gospel. The world is so sad oftentimes – people need to see our joy as disciples of Jesus like people saw St. Francis' joy, the joy of knowing Jesus and His love.

A Christian who is living the mission of a disciple is one who believes in Jesus, who knows Jesus, who can't live without Jesus, and who wants to share with others the love, peace, and joy that he has experienced as a result of living in relationship with Jesus.




Communal Prayer Before Mass
