Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Advent blessings be yours on the Third Sunday of Advent, known as "Gaudete Sunday." The pink candle we light this Sunday signifies joy because in Jesus we have found "Good News." In the first reading the prophet Isaiah is overjoyed because the spirit of the Lord is upon him and sends him to do good works. Isaiah knows that God is with him and has given him great work to do. "I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul..." Then today's Psalm with verses taken from Luke's gospel show that Mary is full of joy because the Lord has looked upon her lowliness and done great things for her. Like Isaiah, Mary knows that God is with her and gives her great meaning and purpose. "My soul rejoices in my God." Even Paul tells the Thessalonians in today's second reading to "Rejoice always!" And finally, John's gospel continues to tout the importance of John the Baptist who seems to also take delight in his mission and purpose of preparing the way for Jesus. "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the way of the Lord." Isaiah, Mary, Paul and John all rejoice because they know that God is with them and working through them. In the darkness of Advent, look to the light of Jesus and rejoice in his Good News.

Now John the Baptist speaks of Jesus who will be among the people but not recognized by them. Many people won't accept or recognize Jesus for who he is, God's Son and the Messiah. But are those people long ago the only ones John is referring to? Of course, we believe in Jesus as God's Son who was born of Mary, had a lot of great things to say, important truths to tell us. And we believe that he suffered an incredibly unjust and cruel death. Yet in that selfless act, we believe most importantly that Jesus saved the world, and redeemed each of us. So, who among us doesn't recognize him? Now I'm not just talking about the Jesus of history and the nexus of our faith. But about the Jesus who still lives among us, and graces us with his presence everywhere, in the good and the bad, the joyful times and the tragic moments, with saints and sinners. The miracle of the Incarnation is not that God just visited a long time ago but that the one who broke into our world in a most profound way continues to do that same thing day after day, moment after moment. That's what Advent prepares us for, not just Christmas but for every day, in every person, and in every situation. That's what Christmas did for us. We don't have to gaze into the heavens to search for him. We just have to pay attention to him here and now with the eyes of faith. So, don't just go through life finding it hard to recognize Jesus in our midst. Find him where he truly is, on the altar, in the sacred scriptures, within each of us and everywhere else too.

Today after all the morning Masses there is a special "Gaudete Sunday Hospitality" sponsored by the Sodality of Our Lady in the school cafeteria. During this time all the Christmas Plant Orders are ready for pick-up. If you placed an order for some plants, come by the school cafeteria and pick up your Christmas plants. So, get in the holiday spirit and stop by the cafeteria after Mass for some refreshments and fellowship.

On Tuesday evening, December 19th there will be a special "No Questions Asked Penance Service" with Confessions, starting at 7:30pm in the church. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a great way of spiritual preparation during Advent so that your celebration of Christmas will be a truly joyous time. The "No Questions Asked" aspect of this service can also help make this an inviting way for people to return to this sacrament who have been away from the sacrament for a long time.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the latest Countdown to Christmas calendar update, an order form for the **Special One-Year Memorial Candles** (only 5 left by St. Joseph's statue), envelops for the Christmas Masses of Remembrance, the Christmas and New Year's Day Mass Schedules, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join *FORMED* (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great Third Week of Advent. One week to go and then Christmas. *Keep smiling and try to spread some "Gaudete" joy to all you meet. Plus remember: Christmas without Jesus is just a mess.* God bless always. *Father Chuck*

Listening to God's Word

As St. Jerome said, "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." Without a doubt, St. Jerome understood that the Bible truly is God speaking to his people. That is why it is so important to have readings from the Bible during Mass. Listening to God's Word helps us to learn about and understand who God is and how much He loves us. Also, we learn about ourselves and just how much we need God in our lives. As we continue some reflections on the Liturgy of the Word, we focus this week on the more spiritual aspects of listening to God's Word and receiving it into our hearts.

Start with Silence

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal reminds us that silence is a very important part of the Mass. Not only are we silent while the readings are read, but there should also be a brief silence after each of the readings. As the Diocese of Peoria's A Study of the Mass teaches, "Even these brief moments allow us to meditate on the marvels and mysteries we just heard... In our world of 'noise,' this silence may seem uncomfortable to us. Yet, this is all the more reason for us to pay close attention to this detail of the sacred Liturgy." Silence is an important means for the faithful to actively participate in the Mass, since it allows the opportunity to really listen with our hearts and take in God's Word.

What if the readings don't make sense to you? The Word of God is not a document. It is not something of the past that happens to narrate a stage of revelation. The Word of God continues to be alive and active (Hebrews 4:12), seeking us out and helping to draw us nearer to God. That is why it is important for us to do our part during the readings of the Mass by really listening and thinking about the words of Scripture. If God is speaking to his people through the Scriptures, and we are part of God's family, then God is saying something to us through each reading. A great question to ask ourselves is: What is God teaching me here? About himself? About us as his people? About how he asks us to live? These reflections will help us concentrate more on the words and help us understand their meaning, even from a reading about a most unusual topic!



Allow His Word to Grow Roots

His Word to Grow Roots

Another way to help us better understand the readings is to recognize that the entire Old Testament is a preparation of God's people for receiving Jesus. The New Testament is a fulfillment of the Old-all the prophecies, all the expectations-all perfectly fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. One of my favorite meditations is to think about something from the Old Testament and see how it leads to Jesus. In the same way, then, look at something in the New Testament and remember back to its beginnings in the Old Testament. For example, we read in Isaiah 7:14, "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call his name Emmanuel." For many of us, our mind probably jumps to Mary and Jesus. Some of the connections are very clear, and some are subtler. Spending time reflecting on the readings can not only help us better understand what we hear, but it also helps the Word of God to be truly rooted in our hearts, our thoughts, and our actions.

What we hear during the Liturgy of the Word is truth about God and the narrative of the marvels God performed... Its culmination is the Paschal Mystery of the Death and Resurrection of Christ, which is perpetuated in the Eucharist. Therefore, the central theme of the readings is always Christ... By carefully listening to the Word of God and reflecting on it, we will realize who ... Christ is, what he says and does, what he expects of us, and how we are to go about accomplishing the task he entrusted to us. Gradually, we will enter into the intimacy of God and discover the meaning of our own existence.

For Reflection:

- 1. Recognizing the unique presence of Jesus in the Scriptures, reflect on the Risen Lord's appearance to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). Pay particular attention to what Jesus says about his presence in "all the scriptures," including "Moses and all the prophets" (Lk. 24:27).
- 2. Next time you are at Mass, listen to hear how Jesus is present in each part of the Liturgy of the Word.

What is the origin of Christmas stockings?



St. Nicholas
(Feast Day: December 6th)
is said to have inspired this
beloved Christmas tradition.

The old man went to bed sad that night. There is no worse feeling for a father than being powerless to protect his children and give them a good life. And it seemed as though he had failed in this regard. It had been a hard year, and he and his daughters barely had enough money to live on from day to day. There was no way he could provide a dowry for them. Without that, they could not marry and faced a life of slavery.

His daughters were afraid, too, but tried to be hopeful. They spoke words of comfort to each other as they did their evening chores. Maybe something good would come along, maybe a miracle would happen, they said. Scrubbing their stockings clean as best they could, they hung them up by the window to dry near the dying fire. Then they went to bed.

The next morning, the daughters went to collect their stockings. But as they approached the window where they hung, what did they see? The stockings were stretched out of shape, with a lump of something in the toes. They quickly investigated, and nearly cried for joy when they found gold coins in each one-more than enough to pay a good dowry. They ran to tell their father, and all four gave thanks to God. Indeed, a miracle had happened.

God's agent that night had been a clever and generous soul named Nicholas. He had heard of the father's plight and, wishing to spare the father the shame of accepting charity, had snuck to the window during the night and tossed the money inside, where it had landed inside the girls' stockings. Nicholas had saved the day—and started a tradition.

This legend of the Christmas stockings is one of the most famous stories handed down to us about St. Nicholas, the 4th-century bishop of Myra in modern-day Turkey. Appearing under various regional titles "Father Christmas" in Great Britain, "Sinterklaas" in the Netherlands, or "Papa Noël" in France—good St. Nicholas has become the symbol of generosity everywhere Christmas is celebrated.

The First Eucharistic Prayer, or the Roman Canon, is the one that has had the longest history in the Roman Catholic Church. Some parts of this prayer stretch back to the very beginning of the Church, and it has been said by every Roman Catholic priest who celebrated the Mass since Gregory the Great in 590 A.D.

This ancient prayer is not marked as much by all of those saints, but double listing of some of the saints of the early church (think of "... John and Paul, Cosmas and Damien ...") and this week we celebrate one of the women listed in the second such litany: St. Lucy, named after the Latin word for light. St. Lucy was a young woman living in the 300s in Sicily. Like St. Agatha, Lucy was also maltreated and then martyred.



How can Lucy begin our delving into the mystery and gift of the Eucharist? Perhaps she teaches us the simplest, but most profound, of truths: the Eucharist is a gift, and must be received. If we receive a gift but never unwrap it, have we really received it?! If we receive Christ, but never return the favor, have we really opened our heart to Him?!

When you or I receive Holy Communion, do we listen to Christ and how He asks us to give ourselves back? Or do we go on with our day just exactly as we were planning to before? Shouldn't there be results? Where is the joy? Why haven't I been transformed yet? St. Lucy shows us that the fault lies not with Christ's gift to me, but my lackluster self-gift back to Him.
