Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Fourth Sunday of Lent! The focus of this Sunday's readings is to take to heart the words: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son." In the first reading from the Second Book of Chronicles, we hear King Cyrus giving the Israelites permission to return to their homeland. Tradition tells us that King Cyris did so out inspiration from God.

"Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go, and may his God be with him." Then in the second reading from Ephesians, Paul strongly teaches that we have been saved by Jesus and raised up to be with him in heaven. It is by grace that one is saved through faith. It is God's gift. "For we are his handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance, that we should live in them." And finally, John's gospel has Jesus telling Nicodemus in a very direct way that he, the Son of God has come so that all who believe will have eternal life. The world will be saved through him. However, many people will prefer darkness to light and will not come to believe. And yet for those who believes Jesus says they will be saved. "But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly sees as done in God."

"Do you believe in Jesus?" What a silly question, right? But think about it. Do you believe in Jesus? Don't be shocked, but I wonder about this from time to time. I know that I say I believe in Jesus. I think about him a lot. I read stories about him, and I pray to him all the time, telling him stuff and laying out my needs before him. And I do all this with what I believe to be a sincere heart. But how do I know? How can. I be sure? How can I tell if I'm just going through the motions, just doing things in case they are true? There is a familiarity and comfort and security that comes with hanging on to the traditions that have been passed down to us, especially when we hear the passage today from John's gospel: "Whoever believes in me will not be condemned." I really want that to be true. If there really is heaven, I don't want to be anyplace else. But is saying the words: "I believe *in Jesus*" the same as actually believing in him? His words seem a bit too easy. Doesn't God need some evidence? It's funny how we may think that our all-knowing, all-powerful God needs some proof to be convinced that we are believers. He knows all things and whether we love him or not, trust him or don't, hope in him or don't, believe in him or don't.

And how all those things shape what happens when we leave this earth. Best to just leave that to our merciful God. So, I believe that God certainly doesn't need any evidence. But he wants evidence. And the reason is simple. It's because we need to see evidence of our belief in Jesus, our faith in him. And others need to see evidence in us too, evidence that we believe what we say, evidence that we have a kind and generous heart. Evidence that we trust in God's promises, evidence that we are open to God working through us, evidence that we are willing to change for the better. Do I believe in Jesus? The only way I'll know is by actually doing my best to live as he wants me to live, by acting with kindness, forgiving those who have hurt me, reaching out to the lonely, the forgotten. If I'm not doing any of these things, then the words: "I Believe in Jesus" are just that-words. I don't want to fall into that trap.

Next weekend on the Fifth Sunday of Lent we are having a special "Gift Card Sunday" for the benefit of Parish Social Ministry. We are asking everyone to donate gift cards when you come to Mass next weekend. Simply place your donations in the regular collection basket at your Mass. We are only looking for the following cards: "Stop and Shop," King Kullen," Lidl," and 'Visa or Master Card." These are the only ones that serve the needs of Parish Social Ministry. So, remember "Gift Card Sunday" on March 17th. It's the perfect way to practice some almsgiving for Lent.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special notes is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the invitation to the St. Patrick's Celebration on Saturday, March 23rd, the continuing *Parish Lenten Schedule*, an invitation to the Sodality of Our Lady's Annual Women's Retreat Day, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join *FORMED* (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. Have a great Fourth Week of Lent. *Keep your Lenten smile going while you put your beliefs into practice. And remember: Get real! Get spiritual! Get real spiritual.* God bless always.

READINGS FOR TODAY'S MASS MARCH 10, 2024-FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

FIRST READING 2 Chr 36:14-16, 19-23

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem. Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy. Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled." In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cy-rus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!




Attention 7Th & 8th Grade Parents/Students

THE FIRST STATION-JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DIE

Just as Jesus was wrongfully accused, sometimes people falsely place blame on me to escape the responsibility themselves. And yes, sometimes I also put others down in order to build myself up. When Jesus was condemned to death, even those who had once followed Him went along with Pilate. Do I care more about being accepted by those around me than returning your love? Help me Lord. Be with me Lord.

THE SECOND STATION-JESUS IS GIVEN HIS CROSS

Lord, help me remember the humble and loving way You carried Your cross up to Calvary when I experience life's heavy burdens and strife. Sometimes I think I can't go on. Help me remember I am not alone. You are always with me. May I imitate Your virtues of love, humility and perseverance while dealing with my crosses and offer them up on behalf of my sins, for the sick and less fortunate. Help me to understand that there is nothing You and I can't get through together.





THE THIRD STATION-JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME

I am like you, Jesus, in that I take up my own cross. But my cross is made up of my sins, temptation and Materialism. I carry my cross through my life, like You, Jesus, carried Your cross to Calvary. Jesus, You fell under the weight of my sins. I fall by accepting temptation and giving into evil. I fall when I give in to gossip or hurt others. You carry my sins to death so I can be free. Help me, Jesus, to really understand all that You have done for me. Help me to make my burden lighter.

THE FOURTH STATION-JESUS MET HIS MOTHER

How does anyone have the strength to watch someone they love suffer and die? Death knows no boundaries and takes everyone. I need to have the strength and faith of Mary when I am faced with the loss of a loved one. Lord, while I know death is not an end but really a beginning, please give me the strength of faith that Your mother showed, and help me to be strong for the others who are grieving.





THE FIFTH STATION-SIMON OF CYRENE HELPS JESUS CARRY HIS CROSS

I need Your help to get me through these tough situations that I encounter during my day. Help me discover my options through prayer. Please help me to be nicer to those who are against me, and let me be trusting in my relationships with my friends, family and neighbors. I have enough to handle on my own. Why, then, am I further burdened with worry about family members or friends? Why does it always seem to be me who has to take on their problems as well as my own? Lord, show me the way.

THE SIXTH STATION-VERONICA WIPES THE FACE OF JESUS

Let me recognize all the good things that surround me each day of my life. Our heavenly Father gave all of us a beautiful world. You even died so our sins would be forgiven. THE THIRTEENTH STATION-JESUS IS TAKEN DOWN FROM THE CROSS

Lord I am truly sorry for forgetting You. I am sometimes preoccupied by my life when I should be focusing on You. I really don't know why, but I always seem to let all the things in my life crowd you out. Often, when I do pray, I do not concentrate on my prayer. I sometimes just say the words and don't pay attention to what I am saying. Help me to show that You are my first priority by setting aside time for You each day.

THE FOURTEENTH STATION-JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB

Dear Jesus, following Your death, helplessness and despair was felt by many. Your death on the cross left those who really knew You empty inside. Lord, when I am feeling empty inside, help me to attain inner strength and peace to make it through the day. Knowing that You love me and believe in me, gives me the reassurance I need. Help me to face my problems, and to remember that You are with me always until the end of time.

The Creed



"I believe in one God..." We all likely recognize these words as the beginning of the Creed which we say together after the homily. Besides needing to stand up and stretch our legs after the homily, why do we have the Creed?

What is the Creed

According to the glossary of our Catechism, a creed is "a brief, normative summary statement or profession of Christian faith, e.g., the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed. The word 'Creed' comes from the Latin Credo, meaning 'I believe,' with which the Creed begins" (CCC, Glossary, s.v. "Creed"). As we will see, a creed is a collection of core truths in which we believe.

As the Catechism teaches, there have been many professions of faith that have come from Church Councils or from certain individuals. "None of the creeds from the different stages in the Church's life can be considered superseded or irrelevant. They help us today to attain and deepen the faith of all times by means of the different summaries made of it" (CCC, no. 193).

The Catechism continues that two creeds have a special place in the Church's life: the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. "The Apostles' Creed is so called because it is rightly considered to be a faithful summary of the apostles' faith" (CCC, no. 194). "The Niceno-Constantinopolitan or Nicene Creed draws its great authority from the fact that it stems from the first two ecumenical Councils (in 325 and 381). It remains common to all the great Churches of both East and West to this day" (CCC, no. 195). Although either the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed can be used in the Mass, many of us probably most often hear the Nicene Creed being used.

A Statement of Faith and Renewal of Belief



How did the Creed enter the Mass? As the Diocese of Peoria instructs, "The Creed, or Profession of Faith, stems from the Ancient Church. This statement of belief was not originally written to be recited at Mass; it was rather intended as a prerequisite 'contract' for adult baptism. One would profess these essential truths of the faith before being admitted into the Church through baptism. Eventually, the Creed would be inserted into the Mass as it is today" (A Study of the Mass, p. 9). Fr. Guy Oury says, "The Fathers of the Church recommended that Christians recite [the Creed] daily, morning and evening, as a renewal of their faith and safeguard against doctrinal error"

How many of you say the Creed when you get out of bed each morning?! Jokes aside, the Fathers of the Church were really on to something here. Because the Creed is a great summary of the truths of the Faith, especially the Holy Trinity (more on that to come), knowing the Creed is a wonderful way to know some of the basics of the faith and to keep them fresh in our minds and hearts.

For Reflection:

 Per Father Luke's advice, consider beginning and/or ending your day by reciting the Creed prayerfully.

 Consider gathering with others to study the Creed, using the Catechism or another resource. One option is to study one line of the Creed each week in preparation for participation in Mass on Sunday.

The Seven Last Words of Christ



The seven last words of Christ-the final phrases that Our Lord spoke during His Passion-have been the subject of Christian meditation since His death, particularly on Good Friday. Bishop Fulton Sheen preached on these seven sacred words every Good Friday for over half a century.

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

The words are stunning upon impact. It wasn't enough for Jesus to say to us, "Love your enemies." He showed us how to do it. He forgave the friend who betrayed Him, the chief priests who falsely accused Him, the cowardly judge who condemned Him, the vicious crowd that called for His crucifixion, the callous soldiers who scourged Him nearly to death, nailed Him to a cross, and left Him to asphyxiate. All when He was perfectly and clearly innocent. It doesn't make forgiving our enemies seem so difficult. Though we, too, suffer hurt, betrayal, and other wounds from those who challenge our charity in this life, Christ has gone before us in all these sufferings–and we have His grace to assist us. But there's something else.

Jesus wasn't just addressing the individuals responsible for His death. He was asking His Father to have mercy on all of us. On you and me. Sure, we can say that we aren't the historical Judas, or the soldiers that nailed Him to the Cross. But our sins were the reason for His Passion—it was our sin that He atoned for with His precious Blood. Our sin tormented Him far more than any physical torture.

And strangely, paradoxically, mysteriously-the very Blood that our sins shed was the cause of their forgiveness. The Blood of Christ, which, as St. Paul says, "speaks more eloquently than that of Abel" (Hebrews 12:24), cries out to His Father for mercy, rather than for the justice that Abel's demanded. Not only His words, but His Blood, His whole being, supplicate His Father on our behalf. It makes sense that these words would be the first of His seven last words. They encapsulate the entire purpose of His Passion. They are, as it were, the opening words of the final act of His Passion, His death upon the Cross.

Eucharistic Witness Living Sacrifice in Lent By Fr. Richard Veras Magnificat Magazine



When I was a seminarian, a beloved auxiliary bishop of New York spoke to us about the seeds of his own vocation, which were planted at the beginning of a Lent many years before.

When in high school, he had asked a classmate what he was giving up for Lent, and his friend said he was not going to give up anything that year, which scandalized the young future bishop. His friend explained that his plan was to attend Mass every day of Lent.

Going from scandal to fascination, he was moved to give up his own plans for Lenten sacrifice and follow his friend in attending daily Mass. During the course of that Lent, he found himself pro foundly drawn to the Mass and to the Eucharist; Jesus was becoming a real presence in his life.

He continued to come before the Lord daily in the Eucharistic sacrifice beyond that Lent, and through his seminary and priestly years, and for the rest of his life. And he told us this story with a youthful joy which animated and enlivened his aged face.

May the sacrifices of young people this Lent be enlivened by the holy and living sacrifice of Jesus made present at every Mass, and may this bear fruit in their own lives and in the life of the Church. May the Lord's voice be heard in many young hearts during this Lenten season, that he may animate disciples who will keep his real presence alive and among us for generations to come... even until the end of time!


