# Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's closing blessings for this Church year be yours on the great Feast of Christ the King! Today we reach the final Sunday and last week of the liturgical year. Next Sunday we begin the holy season of Advent. Today's readings are aimed at helping us to understand sin and freedom as Jesus does. In the first reading from the Prophet Ezekiel, we see the leaders of Israel being denounced as failed shepherds. God now assumes the role that they should have carried out. Through misguided leadership the kingdom has not been protected. Instead of staying true to God the leaders chose other alliances to ensure security, and they failed. Now it is time for God to take over. "Thus says the Lord God: I myself will look after and tend my sheep." Then in the second reading from 1 Corinthians, Paul proclaims Jesus as a king who will hand over the kingdom to his heavenly Father. All this will be accomplished because of Jesus' resurrection. "Brothers and sisters: Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep." And finally, our last gospel for this year coming from Matthew portrays Jesus coming on earth to render final judgment on all the nations. The sheep will inherit the kingdom while the goats will be left to eternal damnation. Why? Because it all comes down to how we treat those in need. "Whatever you did for these least brothers of mine, you did for me." The goats missed all the opportunities not knowing that in the least is found Jesus. "Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me."

In today's gospel we can identify six sins of omission: failing to feed the hungry, not giving drink to the thirsty, not welcoming a stranger, not clothing the naked, nor caring for the sick, nor visiting those in prison. This is the yardstick Jesus uses to describe who will be saved and who will not. We tend to think of sin as an action, like stealing or murder. It is easy to ask forgiveness "for what I have done" but not as easy "for what I have failed to do." Many Christians reject "social sin" but that is highly selective and individualistic. Throughout the Old Testament scriptures social sin is denounced and the New Testament is equally concerned with social justice. Some people felt that Jesus needed a much shorter list of people who truly matter and a greatly expanded list of those who do not. Our constant temptation is to worship a God with whom we are very comfortable, a God who doesn't challenge us out of our comfort zones. Some people like to believe that God is a member of the same political party, belonging to the same ethnic group, has the same tastes in music and food-in short, a mirror image of themselves.

Or we may just complain a lot that God is asking too much of us. We are more realistic than God is! But remember that although no one can truly cure all the world's ills, everyone can do something to alleviate the suffering of others. A life that revolves exclusively around my comfort will make me deaf and blind to the needs of others. And you just read where that leads you.

Get in on the action.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from *Parish Social Ministry* (the annual Giving Tree starts next Sunday), info from *Religious Education*, an invitation to a special Eucharistic Revival evening of prayer hosted by our Light of the World ministry on Tuesday evening, December 5th, an order form for the special One-Year Memorial Candles that begin December 3rd, the First Sunday of Advent, he order form for the Countdown to Christmas Raffle (plenty of days left to be a big winner), the order form for the Christmas Plant Sale, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. Have a great last week of the Church liturgical year. Then get ready to start the holy season of Advent next Sunday. Plus remember: Apply yourself to the Bible and the Bible to yourself. God bless always.



# The Gloria

## Glória in Excélsis Deo

To review what we have covered so far regarding the Mass, we have recalled our baptism with the Holy Water, genuflected to honor Jesus in the tabernacle, quietly and prayerfully prepared for Mass, sung the opening hymn, made the Sign of the Cross, and humbly called to mind our sins and praised God's mercy in the Penitential Act. Now, it is time for another one of my favorite parts of the Mass: The Gloria.



# A Song of Praise

"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will." Many of us may recognize these words from St. Luke's Gospel as the song the angels sing in praise announcing the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem (Luke 2:14). Each year on Christmas Eve, I recall our family traditions from when I was young, including Christmas Eve Mass together as a family. One year, we went to bed very early so that we wouldn't be too tired for the Mass at midnight. In my memory, I still hear very clearly my grandparents singing in the choir and the bells ringing with joy as we sang together the news of Christ's birth. As we grew older and became altar servers, my brother and I would practice so that we could ring the bells steadily throughout the Gloria. It took a lot of endurance!

As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal indicates (GIRM), "The Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the highest) is a most ancient and venerable hymn by which the Church, gathered in the Holy Spirit, glorifies and entreats God the Father and the Lamb" (GIRM, no. 53). The Gloria is full of phrases and titles from the Bible. Edward Sri explains, "one could describe this prayer, which goes back to early Christianity, as a mosaic of biblical titles for God and common biblical expressions of praise." The list of the many Scripture references to these titles are, "Lord Almighty" (Baruch 3:1; 2 Corinthians 6:18), "Lord God Almighty" (Revelation 4:8; 11:17; 15:3; 19:6), and "King of Glory" we are not directly bringing those sins to God for forgiveness as we do in Reconciliation.



Three Acts

From the context of the Gloria, we are clearly singing the first part to God the Father and then the second part to God the Son. The next part of the Gloria, in a sense, tells a story-the story of Christ. Like a three-act play, the Gloria sums up the story of Christ's saving work moving from 1) his coming, to 2) his redeeming death, to 3) his triumphant resurrection and ascension into heaven. The many references to the Scriptures are: he Divine Sonship of Christ (John 5:17-18; 10:30-38; 2 Corinthians 1:19; Colossians 1:13; Hebrews 1:1-2); the Lamb of God (John 1:29, Revelation 5:6-14; 12:11; 17:14, among many others); and Christ's position at the right hand of the Father.

Notice how the whole mission of Jesus is summed up in this section of the Gloria. We move from the Son's Incarnation, to his Paschal Mystery, to his enthronement in heaven. We move from praising Jesus as the 'Only Begotten Son' of the Father who became flesh and dwelt among us; to worshiping him as the 'Lamb of God' who by his sacrifice takes away the sin of the world; to praising him in his triumph over sin and death as he is 'seated at the right hand of the Father.' Indeed, the very climax of salvation history can be summed up in the Gloria.

Fittingly, we probably most often think of the Gloria as a hymn of praise. The Mass is our participation in the one perfect Sacrifice of Christ-the act of perfect worship of the Father. That certainly does call forth praises! The Gloria can truly be a great model of prayer for us and hopefully strengthens our readiness for the many fruits that will continue to come in the Mass. As we sing the Gloria together, it is a great lead into what comes next: The Collect, which gathers our prayers and presents our focus for the celebration of each Mass.

For Reflection: Pray again with Luke's account of the angels appearing to the shepherds announcing Christ's birth and proclaiming the first line of the Gloria (Luke 2:9-14). Next time you participate in Mass and sing the Gloria, consider yourself to be singing with the angels.

## Next Week: The Collect

## The Eucharist as Thanksgiving BY Dr. Richard DeClue, Word on Fire

For those living in the United States, November is the month that we celebrate the federal holiday of Thanksgiving. This American holiday traces its roots back to the Pilgrims' first autumn harvest. It was a means of giving thanks to God for the gifts of his creation. The center of the celebration is a large meal consisting of foods native to this land. While this holiday is not technically a religious holiday, it certainly contains connections to our faith. In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "thanksgiving" is listed as one of the various genres of prayer: 1) blessing and adoration, 2) petition, 3) intercession, 4) thanksgiving, and 5) praise.

In prayers of thanksgiving, we express to God our appreciation for the many blessings that he has given to us through nature, as well as through the supernatural graces won for us by Christ. By offering our prayers of thanksgiving to God, we fulfill the exhortation of St. Paul: "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thes 5:18).

Through the celebration of the Eucharist, prayer of thanksgiving has a particularly prominent role within the Catholic Church. The very term Eucharist is derived from the Greek word eucharistein, which means "thanksgiving." This word is used in the New Testament in a way that recalls "the Jewish blessings that proclaim—especially during a meal—God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification" (Luke 22:19 & 1 Cor 11:24). This sacrament is called the Eucharist precisely because it is a thanksgiving offered to God for these gifts. The Sacrament of the Most Holy Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life", and as such, it is the highest form of thanksgiving that we can offer.

The Eucharist truly is the sacrifice by which we give thanks to Almighty God for saving us from death and giving us new and eternal life. As such, it is infinitely more important than our venerable federal holiday. We should therefore celebrate every Divine Liturgy with an even greater sense of gratitude and sincerity of heart.

#### THE VEIL REMOVED

The Veil Removed is a 7-minute film that reveals the coming together of heaven and earth at Mass, as seen by saints and mystics, revealed by scripture and in the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

I encourage all of us-especially during this month of Thanksgiving-to contemplate this oft-neglected aspect of the Eucharist. May these reflections lead to a deeper appreciation for what the Eucharist truly is. And may we who are blessed to participate in the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Altar humbly and sincerely give thanks to Almighty God, the source of all grace and goodness!



## American Eucharistic Witness Venerable John August Tolton Priest († 1897)

As the Catholic Church concludes November as Black Catholic History Month, we honor Father John Augustus Tolton, the first black priest in the U.S. He was born in Missouri on April 1, 1854, as a slave of a white Catholic family. In 1862, his family escaped slavery and settled in Illinois.

With the help a kind pastor of an all-white parish, he received his first sacraments and was admitted into the parish school. As he grew older, his love of the Eucharist led to his desire to become a priest. When no American seminary would accept him, the same pastor helped John to gain acceptance to a seminary in Rome where he excelled academically.

Returning to the U.S. after ordination, Fr. Tolton faced discrimination and rejection from parishioners. He was later assigned to Chicago, where he led the construction of St. Monica's Catholic Church as a black "national parish church," in 1893. His reputation as holy priest spread among the American Catholic hierarchy, paving the way for more black Catholic men to enter seminaries around America and in Europe.

Fr. Tolton's life was one of deep faith and of perseverance. Despite the opposition he faced, he never lost his love of the Church or of the priesthood, and never did he condemn those who rejected him. Throughout his life, Father Tolton remained "content with weakness, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ" (II Corinthians 12:10).




