Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Lenten blessings be yours on the Third Sunday of Lent! Today's readings encourage us to realize that no matter what, at every turn, God is ready to help us. And this is especially true whenever we receive him in the Eucharist and encounter him in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The first reading from Exodus enumerates God's commandments in detail trying to show the Israelites how they were to live this new covenant relationship they had with God. And it all starts with the first commandment: "You shall not have other gods besides me." If they deviated from this commandment, all else would fall apart. Then in the second reading from 1 Corinthians, Paul tells these new Christian that they don't need signs or wisdom. All they need do is proclaim Jesus Christ crucified. All else is in vain. "For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength." And finally, John's gospel depicts the scene when Jesus chased out the money changers from the temple. He was dismayed at seeing that the temple had been desecrated in such a way and its holiness compromised by making it a marketplace. "Take these out of here and stop making my Father's house a marketplace."

When Jesus shows his outrage at the temple scene in today's gospel, he makes a very outrageous statement: "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." Jesus was talking about his body and comparing it to the temple, the holiest of places. Was Jesus saying that he was as holy as the temple, the place where God dwelled? You bet he was. This is really a beautiful image, and it applies, not only to Jesus but also to describe our own bodies. It's the term the Church uses. Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. Huh? Sounds kooky, but it's true. Not in the same way as Jesus. He is God and the Savior of the world. Yet the term applies nonetheless, because God made us in his image, to be good with a dignity that can't be forfeited. And God loves us beyond all measure and Jesus promised to send his Spirit which means that God does indeed dwell within us. In other words, we were created in a certain way, for a certain purpose, with a God-given dignity, to be holy. That means sharing kindness, mercy, compassion, and love...you name it. And when we see ourselves this way, even the Ten Commandments are seen in a new light. They are no longer rules imposed from outside, but rather are deep truths that show us what is most real and authentic in ourselves.

Living this way is what will make us happy and fulfilled. A temple? Jesus was a perfect one, no doubt about it. May we also strive to be the best temples we can be, trusting that God will raise us up too.

This coming Tuesday evening, March 5th, we will have our third and final special *Lenten Holy Hour* from 7-8pm in the church. In the spirit of the Eucharistic Revival this is a great way to spend some quality spiritual time in the third week of Lent. Eucharistic Adoration is the best way for us to open our hearts to Jesus so that we may grow closer to him during Lent. The hour will consist of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, scripture, time for quiet prayer, a reflection, music and ending with Benediction. So, if you can make it again or for the first time, please come and join us for this hour with Jesus. And bring a friend.

Next Sunday, March 10th the Human Life Committee will be collecting baby items at all the Masses in the altar server sacristy. This collection coincides with the ninth and final month of this year's Adopt a Baby program. We have been praying together for the babies we adopted and now we have a sort of "Baby Shower" in anticipation of all their births. Thank you for your prayers and generosity to these babies in need.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to the **St. Patrick's Celebration** on Saturday, March 23rd, hosted by the Knights of Columbus, ads for the Sodality of Our Lady's "Retreat Day" and "Scholarship Exam," the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join *FORMED* (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great Third Week of Lent. Smile, share and live in the dignity God created you with. Plus remember: Maybe you have given God a thousand reasons not to love you. None of them have changed his mind. God bless always.



GOSPEL Jn 2:13-25

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and oxen, and spilled the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables, and to those who sold doves he said, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." His disciples recalled the words of Scripture, Zeal for your house will consume me. At this the Jews answered and said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking about the temple of his body. Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken. While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing. But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well.

Abstinence and fasting

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat/poultry on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired and excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

How to Engage With the Homily

Why are Homilies so long anyway? To answer that question, we start by realizing that we don't always understand the Word of God perfectly when we first read it. Whenever we read a Bible passage, we should ask ourselves: "What is God saying here?" Sometimes it is pretty easy to listen to God; sometimes, it is not so easy. Sometimes reading the Bible can answer questions that we have; sometimes reading only seems to bring more questions. We humbly recognize that understanding everything about God and us is not always super-easy. So, in humility, we realize we need help. That is where the preachers of the Word come in-those who have been given a special grace to help God's people understand better his communication with us. With years of prayer and study, some preachers can become incredible resources, such as Cardinal Newman, who was known to preach on average about an hour and a half for every sermon!

Drawing Everyone Closer



In the homily, the bishop, priest, or deacon tries his best to help us hear what God is saying. We try to explain the Scripture and apply it to our lives in the local area. As we said last time, the whole point is to draw each heart in the congregation closer to Jesus. This is really important: the priest seeks out each heart. That is why sometimes the homily focuses on something you already know, do, or believe; that is why the homily might not always be perfectly on track with what you are thinking about. Because there are a lot of people in the pews with different backgrounds and experiences, preaching a homily that directly addresses everyone can be a little tricky. Have you noticed that sometimes the preacher says the same thing in a couple of ways? This is one way of helping different people to understand the same message.

Listening with Open Hearts

Make no mistake about it, though—the homily is not just the preacher trying to help people understand God's message to us. One of the most important parts of the homily involves everyone sitting in the pews: all are invited to listen with an open heart. Each one is encouraged to follow the homily in his or her heart, taking in what is helpful and being on the lookout for the true needs of the heart.



If we believe that God is working through the ordained clergy who are preaching, then there will always be something in the homily for us; we just have to listen for it.

Another important part of listening to the homily is an openness to being challenged. If we think we already know it all (or enough), our hearts won't be ready to receive God's message to us through the preacher. We have to be ready to admit that we don't know everything and that we don't always understand everything perfectly. Listening to the homily takes some humility. I recall one of the seminary professors at Mount St. Mary's -Sister Joan-who had listened to decades of homilies day after day, including thousands by deacons in the seminary who were still learning their way. Even though she knew so much more than we did, even though at times it seemed we were trying her patience, she was always there in the front row, ready to listen attentively. What great humility! The preacher needs this same humility also, which is why we said above that he tries his best. Remember that when you hear something challenging, it is the preacher's duty to proclaim the truth, and perhaps could be God calling you closer to his heart through the preacher's very words.

This being said, we all know that the homily to the congregation is not always a spectacular touchdown pass. Sometimes we are distracted or tired. Sometimes we hope the preacher will speak on something in the readings that interests us, but he doesn't get to it. Whatever the case, the Lord only asks us to give a good effort at true listening, knowing there will be something there that will help us.

For Reflection:

 Pray with the account of the Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8:26-40. As you conclude your prayer, give thanks for those ordained ministers who help us understand and respond to God's Word in Scripture.

The Eucharist is the only adequate way to approach our shadows

Reality is replete with challenges and enigmas and contradictions. Let us allow God's own light to make our shadows flee. St. Thomas Aquinas helps us.

St. Thomas Aquinas, as evidenced by his many moving hymns, possessed a limitless, profound devotion to the Holy Eucharist. For St. Thomas, the Eucharist was the only adequate way to approach reality, replete as it is with its challenges and enigmas and contradictions. The ineffable power of the Eucharist to enlighten, to enable, to animate, to renew cannot be overstated. St. Thomas wrote:

No one can fully express the sweetness of this Sacrament in which spiritual delight is tasted at its very source, and in which we renew the memory of that surpassing love for us which Christ revealed in his Passion. It was to impress the vastness of this love more firmly upon the hearts of the faithful that our Lord instituted this sacrament at the Last Supper.

We can feel the heart of St. Thomas in his hymn "Lauda Sion":

On the Table of the King, Our new Paschal offering Brings to end the olden rite; Here for empty shadows fled, Is Reality instead; here instead of darkness Light.

If we long for the shadows in our life to flee, and for God's own light to replace the darkness that enshrouds us, let us abandon ourselves to the wonder and grace of the Eucharist. We can pray with St. Thomas as we prepare to receive Holy Communion:

I come as infirm to the Physician of life, as unclean to the fountain of mercy, as blind to the light of eternal splendor, as poor and needy to the Lord of heaven and earth. I implore the abundance of your immense bounty that you would grant to cure my infirmity, to wash away my uncleanness, to enlighten my blindness, to enrich my poverty, to clothe my nakedness that I may receive the Bread of angels, the King of kings, the Lord of hosts.





Eucharistic Witnesses Saints Perpetua and Felicity Martyrs (†203)

Feast: March 7th

When we use Eucharistic Prayer I at Mass, we ask God for the ability to emulate a litany of saints. Sure, we recognize the apostles' names, but the others are less certain. Who were these people? Two of them were Felicity and Perpetua, North African women martyred very early in the third century. While their story isn't conventionally exciting, their quiet confidence and trust in Christ and their steadfastness in their faith can teach us much about living a Christian life today.

We are called to loyalty to Christ even before loyalty to our loved ones:

Like many of our own families today, Perpetua's family was divided in their beliefs. Her father pleaded desperately for Perpetua to renounce her Faith but she refused. St. Perpetua knew wholeheartedly that her identity was solely in Christ. Her loyalty was to Jesus who saved her, even before loyalty to the father who raised her, provided for her throughout her life, and truly loved her and wanted what he believed to be the best for her.

Any situation can be transformed by love:

While we may never experience so drastic a situation as a prison, we can transform the situations in which we feel trapped, discontent, rejected, or alone by focusing on who and how well we love.

We have a responsibility to pray for the souls in Purgatory:

While she was in prison, St. Perpetua prayed faithfully every day, and offered up her sufferings for her bother who had died. The poor souls in Purgatory, unable to pray or obtain any merits for themselves any longer, rely on us for our prayers and intercession.



Communal Prayer Before Mass


