Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continues Christmas blessings be your as we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family! This feast is part of the Christmas season which lasts until the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus. The message from today's readings is that God has been faithful throughout salvation history and will continue to be faithful to us. What a crazy sort of command God gave Abram in today's first reading from Genesis. He wanted him to look up at the sky and count all the stars, for that would be the number of his descendants. And this with Abram's wife Sarah being well beyond child-bearing age. Yet Abram did as God commanded. "Abram put his faith in the Lod, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness." Then in the second reading from Hebrews, we see the newly named Abraham told to trust in God even more. He followed where God told him to move and even was willing to offer his son Isaac as in sacrifice as commanded by God. "By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; he went out, not knowing where he was to go." And by faith Abraham, when put to the test, was ready to offer in sacrifice Isaac his son. And finally, Luke's gospel narrates the Fourth Joyful Mystery of the Rosary, the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It is the faith of Mary and Joseph, not just the law that brings them to the temple. It is the law, but for them also an act of love to present their son in the temple. Here we have the fulfillment of revelation for two faithful prophets: Simeon and Anna. Long suffering in their waiting for the Messiah, they are now rewarded for their faith in old age with a glimpse of their salvation. After hearing what Simeon had to say, Mary and Joseph took Jesus home to live as a family. "The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of the Lord was upon him."

What makes a family holy? What makes the Holy Family "holy?" We know that this family is unique and has characteristics we don't have. After all the child is God. The mom was free of original sin and the dad? Well, we don't know too much about him, although he seems to be solid, upright, a faithful guy who took his responsibilities seriously. Our families don't compromise the same sort of elements. So, is the Holy Family "holy" in the same way we are called to be holy? Seems like an impossible mission. We do know that the Holy Family came together, how it was formed, how it came to be. And the stories surrounding the beginning of this family are incredible stories. What comes out loud and clear is the role of God, the presence of God and the will of God. God brought them together and each of them responded to that God out of faith, despite what their wishes might have been. So, can we be holy like the Holy Family? I say yes! Now none of us are sinless like Mary and most of us fall far short of Joseph. But believing that God is the reason our families came together? Believing that God has a plan for our families? Believing that God is the glue holding it all together, challenging us to be the best husbands, wives, sons and daughters we can be? Yes! All that is possible.

Many thanks to all who gave generously in the Christmas collections at all the Masses for Christmas. Your generosity will go a long way in helping St. Raymond Parish keep up with its financial challenges and also help the needy in our community. It was also great seeing all the people who came to the Christmas Masses. Don't stop now but make it a New Year's resolution to attend Mass each Sunday. Jesus would love to see you and so would we.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. DECEMBER 31, 2023-FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY

FIRST READING

Gn 15:1-6; 21:1-3

The word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, saying: "Fear not, Abram! I am your shield; I will make your reward very great." But Abram said, "O Lord GOD, what good will your gifts be, if I keep on being childless and have as my heir the steward of my house, Eliezer?" Abram continued, "See, you have given me no offspring, and so one of my serv-ants will be my heir." Then the word of the LORD came to him: "No, that one shall not be your heir; your own issue shall be your heir." The Lord took Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants be." Abram put his faith in the LORD, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness. The LORD took note of Sarah as he had said he would; he did for her as he had promised. By faith he received power to generate, even though he was past the normal age --and Sarah herself was sterile--for he thought that the one who had made the promise was trustworthy. So it was that there came forth from one man, himself as good as dead, descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sands on the seashore. By faith Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was ready to offer his only son, of whom it was said, "Through Isaac descendants shall bear your name." He reasoned that God was able to raise even from the dead, and he received Isaac back as a symbol.

When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, They took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord, Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, He took him into his arms and blessed God, saying: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted -and you yourself a sword will pierce— so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eightyfour. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

The Responsorial Psalm

Sing a joyful song unto the Lord! As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "After the First Reading follows the Responsorial Psalm, which is an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word and which has great liturgical and pastoral importance, since it fosters meditation on the Word of God" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 61). (The "P" in the word "Psalms" is silent, so it sounds like "Salms.")

According to the Glossary in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, a Psalm is "A prayer in the Book of Psalms of the Old Testament, assembled over several centuries; a collection of prayers in the form of hymns or poetry. The Psalms have been used since Jesus' time as the public prayer of the Church." There are 150 Psalms altogether, varying in length from very short (Psalm 117 has only two verses) to incredibly long (Psalm 119 has 176 verses!).

For Every Condition and Time

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) indicates that the Responsorial Psalm should be sung, and that if "the Psalm cannot be sung, then it should be recited in a way that is particularly suited to fostering meditation on the Word of God" (GIRM, no. 61). We typically repeat a refrain in between the verses. The refrain gives a brief line for meditation, summarizing a theme of a particular Psalm. Speaking of the Psalms, the Catechism states, "Prayed and fulfilled in Christ, the Psalms are an essential and permanent element of the prayer of the Church. They are suitable for men of every condition and time" (CCC, no. 2597).

Speaking of the use of Psalms in earlier times, the Catechism notes, "The Psalms both nourished and expressed the prayer of the People of God gathered during the great feasts at Jerusalem and each Sabbath in the synagogues. Their prayer is inseparably personal and communal; it concerns both those who are praying and all men" (CCC, no. 2586). The Psalms still have great value for us as well. "Whether hymns or prayers of lamentation or thanksgiving, whether individual or communal, whether royal chants, songs of pilgrimage or wisdom-meditations, the Psalms are a mirror of God's marvelous deeds in the history of his people, as well as reflections of the human experience of the Psalmist [the person writing the Psalm]. Though a given psalm may reflect an event of the past, it still possesses such direct simplicity that it can be prayed in truth by men of all times and conditions" (CCC, no. 2588).



Jesus Prayed the Same Words

We are encouraged sing the Psalms with faith and joy, recalling the exhortation of St. Paul. St. Paul recommends that the faithful gathered waiting for the coming of the Lord sing together psalms, hymns, and spiritual canticles (Col 3:16). The heart shows its joy by singing. Thus St. Augustine says rightly, 'to sing belongs to lovers.' There is also the ancient proverb: 'One who sings well prays twice'.

Our Lord Jesus would have also sung and prayed these same words in the Psalms. Since we know from the Gospels that he regularly went to the Jewish prayer gatherings, we can conclude that he would also have sung the Psalms regularly. There were times he referred directly to the Psalms, such as when he started praying Psalm 22 from the Cross: "My God, My God, why have you abandoned me?"

It doesn't get much better than spending a little time with the Lord using the exact words he used to pray. The next time you have 20 seconds to spare, try praying Psalm 117. If you have 20 minutes, check out a longer passage, like Psalm 119. If you are really feeling bold, try to sing one, whether at Church, working outside, or in the shower. It is always "good to praise the Lord!" (Psalm 92:1)

For Reflection:

1. Take time to pray with either Psalm 117 or with Psalm 119. If you choose the latter, perhaps select a shorter portion of the Psalm for deeper reflection after you pray with its full length!

2. Open your Bible to the Book of Psalms and allow yourself to "wander" through the pages. Find and pray with a Psalm that speaks to you at this moment in your life.

Eucharistic Witness St. Stephen Deacon & First Martyr († 36) Feast: December 26

St. Stephen, deacon and first martyr of the Church, died at the hands of Saul somewhere in the mid-30s AD (see Acts 7:58). After Stephen is arrested, he points out how God was with many of their great forefathers in faith apart from the land of Israel-how God first came to Abraham "in Mesopotamia" (Acts 7:2), how God was with Joseph in Egypt (7:9-10), and how God appeared to Moses in the burning bush while he was exiled in the land of Midian (7:29-30). For Stephen, these Old Testament examples foreshadow how-in the fullness of time-there is a movement from the Temple made with stones to the Temple of Christ's Risen Body (see John 2:19-21), from a plot of land to worship in spirit and in truth. The earthly Temple gives way to the Temple of Christ's Mystical Body-gathered in worship of the Risen Lamb, especially in the Holy Eucharist.

Christianity, in fact, can be boiled down precisely to this: the Holy Spirit reproducing the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ in and through each of us. This begins in baptism, and it is consummated in the Holy Eucharist–where we are offered up to the Father in him, with him, and through him.

St. Stephen and all the martyrs embody this recapitulation of Christ's life in a concrete way. But this is the path for us all: for some, it's a red martyrdom-like St. Stephen (and which is still occurring to this day). For others, this will entail a white martyrdom, a daily death to ourselves-that Christ may live through us. This begins in our baptism; it is consummated in the Holy Eucharist; and it continues in the outpouring of our lives in love to others-whereby Christ's life is reproduced in and through us. This is what Christianity is all about: to love as Christ loves, to the point of giving our livesin one way or another.

ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

Since the Supreme Court's overturn of Roe vs. Wade, the pro-abortion forces have been working steadily and determinedly to get the "right" to abortion throughout the entire nine months of pregnancy, for any reason or no reason, with no restrictions written into each State's Constitution. Biden has promised to sign this radical anti-life bill if it reaches his desks. These are but a few threats to the babies in the womb coming in the 2024 year. Please tell your representatives in D.C. to vote "no" to this assault on human life.


