

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time! The central message we learn from today's readings is that Jesus reconciles all things by the blood of the cross. Redemption is found only in Jesus, by loving one another as Jesus has loved us. In the first reading from Deuteronomy, Moses tells the people that all it takes to be saved is to listen to the voice of the Lord and keep his commandments. "For this command that I enjoin on you today is not too mysterious and remote for you." Then in the Letter to the Colossians, Paul offers a clear, concise teaching that in Jesus is revealed the very nature and person of God. God is both human and divine. "Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation." And finally, Luke's gospel tells the parable of the "Good Samaritan" which basically and once and for all tells us how we are to treat each other and the true definition of neighbor. At the end of the story, the question about who the neighbor to the robber's victim was answered. "The one who treated him with mercy. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise."

We know this story and when we hear stories like this we probably think, "That would never be me to keep walking and just ignore the person in need right in front of me." How could those guys be so cold-hearted and unfeeling. But maybe they were afraid or just minding their own business. Actually, they did do what most people do according to the voice of social convention. If they thought they were doing the right thing, or at least an ok thing, it shouldn't really surprise us, because we do the same kind of things all the time. How many times do we explain not being kind or generous as kind of ok? (I don't give to charities because I have to save for retirement. I don't call that person because they will tie me up on the phone for hours. I am not completely honest with my taxes because everybody else cheats too. I won't forgive my brother because he doesn't deserve it. I am too busy to volunteer for anything. I won't look at a person in need on the street because they only want money and it's just a scam.) I won't do X.Y or Z because... So many excuses.



Jesus knows that it's nearly impossible to come away from today's gospel story with anything but deep admiration for the Samaritan. He is the good guy in the story and for Jesus a "good" or "faithful" person is someone willing to do whatever God wants. It's a person who responds to that little voice we hear that calls us to do the loving thing. There are other voices trying to sway us away from God. So, what will you do the next time you encounter someone in need? Will you just leave or really take the time to listen, to reach out to treat them as Jesus would, with care and compassion? The choice is always up to us!



GOSPEL Luke 10:25-37

ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

"The Ethics and Public Policy Center's study of 865.727 women in a private medical database show that the mifepristone abortion pill causing 22 times the complications claimed by the FDA. with approximately 11% of women having a serious medical issue within 45 days of taking the pill. HHS Secretary RFK, Jr. has ordered a full review of regulations. The Charlotte Lozier Institute analyzed data from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, approximately 29,000 anonymized E.R. visits,.. and found that 83.5% visits following chemical abortions were miscoded as miscarriages. Researches found that this misclassification often stems from women concealing their abortion history. (They are often told to do so by the abortion pill provider.) This leads to potential delays in appropriate care. The study also notes these cases were 50% more likely to involve serious complications. Further, these miscodes mask and statistically deflate postabortion complications rates and undermine both the science and medical management necessary to address these issues, representing a threat to effective surveillance". (LifeNews, July/August 2025) In addition, the FDA has acknowledged that as many as "7% of women will need surgery after taking mifepristone to stop bleeding or to complete the abortion (in 2023, that would be approximately 13,000-45,000 women)." True to form of the abortion industry, hiding the truth about dangers of the chemical abortion pills from the women they say they are helping. Just as they hid and continue to hide the truth from the women about the development of their babies in the womb in order to push abortion. The truth: Abortion kills live, human beings in the womb, harms women and all of us.

FIFTEENTH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME WEEKLY GUIDE FOR PERSONAL PRAYER CREIGHTON ONLINE MINISTRIES

Summary of the Readings for the Week

Sunday is the Fifteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. In Luke's gospel we see Jesus challenged by a scholar who asks how to obtain eternal life. Jesus says "love your neighbor as yourself." When he is asked, "who is my neighbor?" Jesus tells the well-loved story of the Good Samaritan, who stopped to help a Levite who had been left for dead. Even though others had passed by the Levite, the Samaritan cares for him with tenderness. "Go and do likewise," Jesus tell us.



In the dioceses of the United States, Monday is the memorial of Saint Kateri Tekakawitha, Virgin. Tuesday is the Memorial of Saint Bonaventure, Bishop and Doctor of the Church.

We begin three weeks of readings from the Book of Exodus continuing the story of God's faithful deliverance of the people from slavery in Egypt. This week we read of their plight in Egypt, Moses'




birth and how he became a part of Pharaoh's inner circle, Moses' encounter with God in the burning bush, God's summons to Moses and the people, and the story of the Passover up to the time they left Egypt.

The Psalm responses this week are particularly wonderful entries entries to prayer:

Our help is in the name of the Lord. Turn to the Lord in your need, and you will live. The Lord is kind and merciful. The Lord remembers his covenant for ever. I will take the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord.

His mercy endures forever.

We follow a powerful part of Matthew's Gospel all week, with some wonderful messages of Jesus, preparing us for parables about the Kingdom of God. Jesus does not come to bring simple peace, but to call us to find our lives by surrendering them to him and his mission. Then Jesus goes to teach and to preach, beginning with strong words for the towns in which he worked great cures and where the people have not repented. Rather than being discouraged, Jesus prays to his Father and we have the privilege of overhearing him say that, although these things are hidden from those who seemed educated and clever, "you have revealed them to the childlike."



Jesus invites us to come to him – when we are burdened – and he will give us rest. He doesn't tell us we will have no burden. By taking up his burden, the mission he gives us will be light. When the Pharisees go after his disciples because in their hunger they picked grain on the Sabbath, Jesus challenges them to learn what God meant by these words from the prophet Hosea, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice." From that point on, those who rejected him conspired to kill him.

The readings for the Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time tell us about service. In the Genesis story, Abraham generously cares for three strangers who then tell him that his wife, Sarah, will finally have a son. Luke's gospel recounts the classic story of Martha and Mary: Martha ran around serving Jesus while Mary sat at his feet listening. "Mary has chosen the better part," Jesus says.

Summary of the Readings for the Week

This is a great week to grow in a sense of not being alone. It is so difficult to find intimacy with God in the midst of our everyday lives if we go through our lives, either trying to do it alone or simply not acknowledging the fact that God is always with us. We could make this the special gift we ask for each week: "Lord, let me know and experience that you are with me, every day, all the time." If we only came to realize that God is as faithful to us in our slavery as God was in the Exodus story, we'd feel so different each day. We'd express our gratitude more. We'd sing God's praise.

If we walk through each day this week with a little more confidence in God's presence, God's merciful love for us, God's protection and care for us, then the Gospel message of Jesus can find a way into our hearts much more freely. Imagine, if with this confidence, we could start asking Jesus: "Lord, I don't want to keep seeking myself this week. I don't want to be so absorbed in my needs, in winning, in manipulating, in criticizing, in using my power to protect myself. I want to find myself, the life you offer me, by surrendering more, by letting go of what I cling to. Help me be freer this afternoon and when I get home from work."

We could make this prayer, have this conversation with Jesus, while walking from one place to

another, while shopping, over a lunch break, while confront us, this is the doorway to naming a new desire. This week, we can find concrete times in our week, in real encounters and responsibilities of our very busy lives to say these or similar words: "Lord, help me to be more child-like today. Help me simply come to you when I'm burdened or just tired, rather than all the other places I tend to go for relief. Let me be yoked to you as I carry out the promises of my life today. Free me from my impatience and tendency to judge others. Teach me how showing others the mercy you have showed me is more important that my hard driving sacrifice."


One day this week, one of these prayers will be just right. Another day, a much more personal request will come to us. What is important is that we grow in the habit of connecting with Jesus throughout the day, in these brief moments in the background of our lives. We have these moments, and we can easily get better at finding them. Then we can quickly grow in recognizing how the desires in our hearts can get formed and deepened through letting the Word into our hearts. We can practice beginning each day with a moment of prayer, asking for a desire and then repeating and refining that desire throughout the day.

We will discover that this is very consoling and enjoyable. We will experience ourselves growing in gratitude as God is generously giving us what we ask for, and we are indeed finding intimacy with Jesus each day. And when we get ready for bed each night, we can develop a habit of simply giving thanks – telling Jesus we are so grateful that we were not alone this day and how much we are grateful for his presence, mercy and for the mission he's sharing with us.

Food assistance is available for those in need who live within our Parish boundaries, Also, if you are a senior citizen living within the Parish boundaries, and depend on your Social Security benefit as your sole source of income, please contact the Parish Social Ministry and we can help you with food.

During the month of June, the Parish Social Ministry assisted 93 households with food, personal care and household items and assisted them with other services through the Department of Social Services, Catholic Charities and St. Vincent DePaul.

Pantry items still needed: Pasta Sauce, Canned Tomatoes, Pasta and Rice Side Dishes, Chef Boyardee Pasta, Instant Mashed Potatoes, Pinto and White Beans, Canned Fruit, Canned Mixed Vegetables, Carrots, Beets and Peas and Canned Meat.

Ocean Financial Federal Credit Union Supports St. Raymond!


