

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Fourth Sundav in Ordinarv Time! Todav's readings emphasize that Jesus teaches with authority. In the first reading from Deuteronomy, we have Moses being very direct with the people. He doesn't mince words and the people know very clearly what will happen to false prophecy. On the other hand, Moses himself definitely speaks for God. "A prophet like me will the Lord, your God, raise up for you from among your own kin; to him you shall listen." Then in the second reading from 1 Corinthians, Paul speaks about being focused on God and how this suits a single person better because they have less distractions and other concerns. Remember that at that time, it was believed that the Second Coming of Jesus was imminent. "I am telling you this for your own benefit, not to impose a restraint upon you, but for the sake of propriety and adherence to the Lord without distraction." And finally, Mark's gospel we see Jesus expelling a demon from a possessed man. This action along with his teaching astonished the people. "What is this? A new teaching with authority. He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him."

Yes, Jesua taught with authority, having power of his own. This was very different from the teaching of the scribes and even the Old Testament prophets. Everything changes with Jesus entering into human history. When Jesus speaks, God acts. This is a reversal from the prophets. It was God who spoke first and then the prophets acted on his words. But in Jesus we have God's word present in human flesh. And when he teaches, his words themselves have power to act. Jesus' words to the unclean spirit come from him and actually cause the spirit to come out. This is true of all the words of Jesus. His words are not empty promises; they have authority. I'm not sure we understand how much our words matter. Just look around and listen to what is heard in stores, restaurants, and coffee shops. Read what is written on social media and other internet forums. It's basically free for all out there. It seems that all the guardrails have come off that kept us from being cruel, unreasonable, or vulgar. It's as if we just wait for the day when we can unload on everyone around us and not pay any penalty for it. I do remember a kinder, a gentler a more polite time. What happened?



Maybe we don't think words matter anymore or understand their power to harm, tear down or spread hate. This type of rhetoric has permeated our political discourse, entertainment talk and, yes, sad to say, much of our religious conversations. And I think that when we participate in all the mocking, ridiculing and spoken outrage we are using our words in an unfaithful way, in a way God hasn't said we should. It's as if we use words to bring about the exact opposite of what God expects and demands of us. The people who heard Jesus preach in the synagogue were "astonished" in a good way at what he said. I am "astonished" at what I often hear in a negative way. There is a lot of complaining, not complimenting; a lot of anger but not much compassion; a lot of mocking but little understanding; a lot of bitterness and not enough forgiveness. And I hear a lot of nonsense, but not merely as much love and kindness. If we truly believe in the power of Jesus' word, we should be careful and watch what we say.

Many thanks for your generosity in last week's special collection to help in the relief efforts at Father Jim's parish in Uganda. To date we have raised over \$3500 dollars, which will be a big help as Father Jim cares for over 300 displaced people, many of whom are children, at this time. The Four Gospels

Have you ever wondered why there are four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John? Why not just one? For nearly 2000 years, theologians, scholars, and saints have been wondering about this "problem." For some people, differences in the four Gospels regarding details and the order of events can feel like a challenge. Even more, the Gospel according to St. John is very different from the other three. So, what is the deal?

First, the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke are all very similar. They are called the synoptic Gospels, coming from the word "synopsis," which means, "at one view." For the most part, these three Gospels are similar in content, although each contains a few events, miracles, and teachings which are not in the others. In addition, in each of these Gospels, some of the events are related in a different order. Secondly, the Gospel of John is very different in style; one doesn't need to read more than a few verses to realize it gives us a quite different account of the life of Jesus.

Why Are There Four Gospels?

One of the main reasons for there being four Gospels relates to how they developed. First, Jesus Christ, present on the earth, taught, preached, and worked miracles. After his Death, the Apostles orally proclaimed the Death and Resurrection of Jesus, faithfully recounting his life and words. This oral stage of preaching, as well as catechesis, hymns, and doxologies, became the background for the Gospel writers, called Evangelists. After several years of preaching and meditation, the Gospel writers took the oral sources and earliest body of instruction and wrote it all down in what we know today as the four Gospels.

When the Gospel writers wrote these accounts (under the guidance of the Holy Spirit), they had different audiences and different contexts in mind. This accounts for some of the differences we find in their Gospels. For example, scholars suggest that St. Matthew was writing for a Jewish audience who would know, for example, the Jewish background for rituals and other things Jesus did.

Therefore, the Gospel of Matthew doesn't explain the meaning of these things because he is assuming that his readers would already know them. More importantly, because he was writing for a Jewish audience, it was important to St. Matthew that he show that Jesus was the true Messiah they had been waiting for. St. Luke, on the other hand, was a former Gentile who had converted, and he was writing for a Hellenistic (Greek) audience who would not have understood Jewish rituals and traditions. That is why we find in his Gospel more detailed explanations of ceremonial actions.

The Gospel of Mark, the first Gospel to be written, presents a powerful narrative of Jesus' life and often includes more vivid detail than the others. St. John, writing a little later than the other three, emphasized specific events to inspire and confirm his readers' faith in Jesus, since he could assume that they would already be familiar with the story of Jesus and his miracles and teachings.



The True Purpose of the Gospels

So, we can see, in writing the Gospels, the writers were not simply recalling the deeds and words of Jesus; they were preaching Jesus, the true Messiah, so that people would really get to know him. The Gospels, in this sense, are kind of like homilies, which are a way to try and help people relate to Jesus and his message of salvation. They are a careful presentation of what Jesus said and did-both an instruction and an invitation to deeper faith.

For Reflection:

1. Set aside time to expose yourself to the distinctive characteristics of each Gospel. What do you notice? What does each Gospel have in common with the others? What distinct contribution(s) does each Gospel offer?

2. Spend time in prayer with Jn 20:30-31, where the author of the Gospel according to John explains why this text was written. Contemplate the "signs" of Jesus' presence in your own life.

Eucharistic Witness St. Marianne Cope Religious (†1918) Feast: January 23

The crisis of our times is a crisis of saints. Life is full of difficulties, and for those who have the high ideal to become a saint, many difficulties. Difficulties are the gifts that Jesus gives us to unite ourselves to Him on the Cross. We should not shy away from the challenges of our life but see them as an opportunity and the means to grow in holiness.

St. Marianne Cope, an American saint from the 19th Century, perfectly models the courageous leadership needed to face difficult circumstances when they arise. Marianne was formed by the hardships of her life: she desired to join the convent from an early age but was unable due to her father's early death. Marianne was the oldest of ten children and quit school after eighth grade to work in the factory to help support her family during this time. During this time, her generosity and compassion grew for others. She developed a love for service and desire to give herself whole-heartly to Christ.

There are two essential leadership qualities that we can learn from St. Marianne Cope. First, she teaches us that leaders should lead by going first. She modeled sacrificial leadership through her willingness to not only send six of her sisters to care for those dying from leprosy in Molokai in Hawaii, but to go herself. Second, not only did St. Marianne lead from the front, but she also desired the work and got to work right away. We may frequently picture saints in chapels or on holy cards, but St. Marianne shows us that saints are hardworking and adding to the Kingdom through their dedicated service to others.

The sisters' dedicated service was driven by their daily encounter with Jesus in the Mass and prayer. They brought their love of God into the work for their neighbor that had been entrusted to them.



The Heart of the Eucharistic Mystery is this One Word By Fr. Peter John Cameron, OP

Ever since Jesus Christ uttered the soul-searing words "Come to me, all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will refresh you" (Mt 11:28), we have been magnetically drawn to this exceptional man of compassion. We simply want him to be with us.

The scribe in the Gospel, overwhelmed at the One who bears our infirmities and endures our sufferings, exclaims, "Teacher, wherever you go I will come after you" (Mk 8:17, 19). The onceblind Bartimaeus uses his new gift of sight "to follow Jesus up the road" (Mk 10:52). The Gerasene demoniac, released from a legion of evil, "presses to accompany Jesus" (Mk 5:18). The people of the Samaritan town, overwhelmed by the Gospel witness of the woman at the well, "begged Jesus to stay with them awhile" (Jn 4:40). As do, of course, the disciples on the road to Emmaus: "They pressed him: 'Stay with us'" (Lk 24:29). Jesus knows how much we need him to stay with us.

The healing of the sick, the comforting of the grieving, the calming of ferocious storms, the raising of the dead, the multiplying of food for those hunger-stung, the forgiving of paralyzing sin, the proclaiming of unheard-of Good News – all of it points to a breathtaking Love that we have never known before ... but for which we have always waited. A Love in the flesh.

We do not want this love to leave us. The words Jesus Christ speaks to Zacchaeus proclaim the heart of the Eucharistic mystery: <u>"I mean to STAY with you"</u> (Lk 19:5). The tense of the verb is indefinite; his stay is open-ended. Jesus is never leaving. The Eucharist is the way he stays. The question Andrew asks at the outset of Jesus' ministry consumes us at every level: "Rabbi, where do you stay?" (Jn 1:38). As we ask, Jesus gestures to the tabernacle, but his words are the same: "Come and see" (Jn 1:39). And then, to assure us, he adds, "I am with you always until the end of the world" (Mt 28:20). "Come to me, all you who are weary and find life burdensome, and I will refresh you." Without end.
