

# Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's Advent blessings be yours on the first Sunday of Advent! Once again, we find ourselves on the threshold of another Church Year and another Church season-Advent. It's kind of like hitting the re-set button, having come full circle and about to start the same journey once again. In the first reading from Isaiah, the people of Israel have hope that God will still care for them even though they know that have been unfaithful. "Why do you let us wander, O Lord, from your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear you not?" Then in the second reading from I Corinthians, Paul is encouraging the people of Corinth for being true in their faith of Jesus Christ. "God is faithful, and by him you were called to fellowship with his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord." And finally, we begin this new Church Year by journeying with Mark. Jesus is telling his disciples to be alert, to be ready, and to watch. "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time come." Advent is a season of hope and Jesus is telling his followers and us to be full of hope. Are you?

Sometimes in our spiritual life we convince ourselves that the ultimate goal of a life of faith is "finding God" or "finding meaning" or "finding truth," as if these things were far away. But actually, when it comes to faith it is not so much our going out to find God, but letting God find us, come to us, visit us, and accompany us on the journey. Our task is to find a way to let him in so he can accomplish whatever it is that he is asking of us. And that means being ready for each moment of each day, ready to recognize grace in all its forms. It means opening the door to God who comes knocking over and over again. And so, we wait, and we watch. During Advent we look back and are thankful that God came into our world and changed absolutely everything in the person of Jesus. And we look forward, far ahead to when Jesus will return, and God's plan comes to fulfillment. But we also wait and are on watch for our God who wants to come to us in this time and place, our God who wants to be reborn in each of our hearts this Christmas and every day after that. Now it can't happen if we don't think it can happen or refuse to open ourselves up to the possibility. Nor can it happen if we refuse to be open to grace or let other things become more of a priority. Or simply if we are too busy or just don't want it to happen. In other words, God is ready to do some pretty wonderful things through us, but it's up to us to open the door and invite him in. Advent is such a great time to do just that.

As a way to spiritually start the Advent Season, there will be a *Night of Eucharistic Revival* in our church beginning at 7pm on Tuesday, December 5th. Father Roger Landry, a priest of the Fall River Diocese and a designated Eucharistic Preacher by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops will preside over this service. There will be Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, scripture, teaching, music, communal and private prayer time with Benediction concluding the service. The opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation will also be provided during this time. Hopefully you can come to start your Advent in a truly holy way by spending some time prayerfully with friends in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. Hope to see you there; and bring a friend!

# The Collect A Prayer in Four Parts

"Let us pray..." After the Gloria, the priest sings or says this invitation to pray. As the General Instruction of the Roman Missal ("GIRM") describes, "Next the Priest calls upon the people to pray and everybody, together with the Priest, observes a brief silence so that they may become aware of being in God's presence and may call to mind their intentions. Then the priest pronounces the prayer usually called the 'Collect' and through which the character of the celebration finds expression" (GIRM, no. 54). It is called the Collect because it sums up and gathers together all the intentions of the day's sacrifice.

The Collect has a standard structure of four parts: an invocation to God, the grounds on which we base our confidence (or a reference to the feast of the day), a petition, and a conclusion. For example, we see these four parts in this Collect from the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time: "O God [invocation], who teach us that you abide in hearts that are just and true [grounds for confidence], grant that we may be so fashioned by your grace as to become a dwelling pleasing to you [petition]. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever."



Praying Together

During the Collect and other prayers in the Mass, the priest extends his hands and arms outward in what is called the "orans" position, which means a position of prayer. This position was used by our Jewish ancestors and adapted for Christian prayer. With a historical note from the early Christian writer Tertullian, the Christians adjusted how the hands are held "so as to resemble those of the Lord on the cross." During the Mass, the priest uses this gesture to

indicate that we are all praying together; he is collecting all our prayers and offering them up to the Father.

At the end of this prayer, the people respond by saying, "Amen." As Fr. Guy Oury teaches us, this Hebrew word means "so be it, without question." He continues, "The Amen is the people's stamp of approval on what has just been said in their name. It is a Yes to the priest as having spoken the prayer" (The Mass, p. 57). The meaning and function of this simple response invite the congregation to respond boldly with a confident "Amen" in affirmation of this prayer in their name.

## **Preparing for Prayer**

How should we pray during the Collect? Does the Collect seem to happen so quickly that you miss the words? That brief moment of silence before the prayer is an important one when each person can offer personal intentions to be joined with what the priest is about to pray. Here is a great moment to share interiorly any specific prayers you would like to offer along with the spoken prayers of the Mass. It is also an opportunity to prepare ourselves to listen attentively to the words of the Collect as an overview or summary of the main emphases of the prayers for that particular Mass. Perhaps we could see it as an invitation for how Jesus might teach us in the Mass. We might benefit greatly from reading over the words of the Collect before the Mass. If you have never done it, I would invite you to read through the words a couple of times and ask the Lord to prepare your mind and heart for what is to come. This mentality also prepares us to listen to the Liturgy of the Word, God's word spoken to His people.

For Reflection: Take time before Mass, either at home or in church, to pray with the Collect prayer for that liturgy. You can find Collects in Missals, missalettes, or online. Reflect on Psalm 33, which tells us that God "surveys all who dwell on earth" (v. 14). Consider God receiving all the prayers we lift up during the moment of silence that belongs to the Collect. The Psalm further claims, "The One who fashioned together their hearts / is the One who knows all their works" (Ps. 33:15). Allow the Collect to "fashion" and shape your heart by listening attentively to the words the presider proclaims.

What do the liturgical colors of Advent signify?
This December, instead of red and green, learn from the colors purple and rose.

Once Thanksgiving has come and gone, our culture moves on quickly to the celebration of the Christmas season. All around us, there will be an explosion of Christmas reds and greens, holly and evergreen, ornaments, and wreaths. However, you might notice that your parish is colored a different way.

Rather than reds and greens, the altar is draped in a deep violet, the priests wear violet vestments, and our wreaths have candles of that same violet and a lovely rose. Why does the Church abstain from the colors of Christmas until the 24th? And why do these seemingly random shades of violet and rose take their place? It is because violet and rose are the liturgical colors of Advent. As a preparatory season, Advent does not yet share in the joy of Christmas. Rather, it anticipates it through penance and the practice of patient waiting, humbly and sincerely give thanks to Almighty God, the source of all grace and goodness!

Violet is the liturgical color that symbolizes penance, sacrifice, and prayer, and as such, it characterizes both Advent and Lent. Moreover, during Advent, we meditate particularly on the coming of our King at Christmas. In this way, the color violet—traditionally associated with royalty—takes on a dual meaning, representing both the penitential nature of the season and the kingship of the coming Christ.


The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete ("Rejoice") Sunday. On this day, we celebrate that our wait is almost over and we witness the sudden introduction of a lovely shade of rose in our churches and our Advent wreath. As the liturgical color used to signify joy, rose is used in the third week of Advent in anticipation of the coming of the Messiah.

These colors of the Advent season are not arbitrary-rather, they are intentional reminders of how we should orient our hearts as we prepare for the coming Christ. While it is fine to join in the festivity around us, we must keep our hearts aligned with the Church during this season, joining in the hopeful and penitential anticipation of our coming Savior.

#### THE VEIL REMOVED

The Veil Removed is a 7-minute film that reveals the coming together of heaven and earth at Mass, as seen by saints and mystics, revealed by scripture and in the Catechism of the Catholic Church.




St. John of Damascus, also known as John Damascene, was a monk and theologian whose writings were crucially important in staunchly defending the value of visual art in communicating the Christian faith and in worship.

In the Tradition of the Church, we have evidence that the very early Church believed in the real presence of Christ's flesh and blood in the Eucharist. St. John Damascene wrote: "You ask how the bread becomes the Body of Christ, and the wine...the Blood of Christ. I shall tell you: the Holy Spirit comes upon them and accomplishes what surpasses every word and thought...Let it be enough for you to understand that it is by the Holy Spirit, just as it was of the Holy Virgin and by the Holy Spirit that the Lord, through and in himself, took flesh" (De Fide Orthodoxa).

We can see the faith St. John has in the power of the Holy Spirit to carry out great miracles. He reminds us of this power by pointing out the fact that the Holy Spirit made Jesus in the flesh within the Blessed Virgin's womb. In doubting the truth of the Eucharist, we are doubting that miraculous power of the Holy Spirit that brought about our Savior in the flesh.


