

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time! And Happy Valentine's Day to everyone also. A special blessing will be offered for all married couples at each Mass today to honor your marriages and the power of the sacramental grace you received on your wedding day. The theme of today's readings is that by encountering others we encounter God and are called to conversion. In the first reading from Leviticus, we see how those who were judged to have leprosy were kept apart from the regular community. It showed that life outside of Eden meant that humans were subject to sickness and disease. "He shall dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp." Then in the second reading from 1 Corinthians, Paul encourages the people to work only for the glory of God. Be like him for he does everything in the name of Jesus. "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ." And finally, in Mark's gospel, we see Jesus moved emotionally to cure the leper who has approached him and begged for healing. Jesus cures him by word and gesture. He orders him to be made clean and he touches him. "I do will it. Be made clean."

St. Francis experienced an intense interior conversion when he encountered a leper near his hometown. He was already following Jesus with great fervor, but his encounter with the leper made him come to see, accept and love the most marginalized members of society. Francis surrendered to the transforming mercy of God and experienced a powerful life-altering conversion. Like St. Francis we too are called to encounter the "lepers" of our own society and be moved to deeper Christian conversion. In our society who and what gets cast aside, marginalized, or thrown away? The elderly, the unborn, immigrants, the poor, LGBT people, those with addictions; the list is endless. Jesus built a culture of encounter. He listened and heard the story of pain and the cry for help. In the gospel Jesus felt compelled to reach out to the leper and touch him. Jesus doesn't blame the leper or reinforce his exclusion. Rather he allows himself to be moved by what he encounters. Jesus healed the leper, but not just of his disease, also socially. As a former leper he is now welcomed into the body of the community. We too are called to imitate Jesus and build a culture of encounter. We should refrain from seeking our own benefits and be imitators of Jesus. When we intentionally encounter those on the margins, we open ourselves to a divine encounter just as St. Francis did. From bitterness to sweetness, God invites us to conversion which can help bring about personal and societal healing.

This coming Wednesday, February 17th is Ash Wednesday and signals the start of the 2021 Lenten Season. Because of the pandemic, ashes cannot be distributed as usual. The only way ashes can be given is to sprinkle them on the person's head. Since this is awkward and I am still feeling symptoms from COVID-19. I decided that we will not offer this way to give ashes. We will bless ashes at each Mass and offer the praver for everyone at *Mass.* There will not be ashes available for people to take with them like past years either. In this bulletin you will find a complete Stations of the Cross -prayer service for your use during Lent. We will not be having the regular Friday evening Stations this year. This prayer service for the Stations will be published every Sunday in Lent. Use this service for private prayer at home or for a visit to church. Check the bulletin announcement for more details about Ash Wednesday and the Lenten Season at St. Raymond's.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of information and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education and the Principal's Corner of St. Raymond School, an order form for the new round of Parish Picks which will start later this month (we need your help to make this fund raiser successful!), an order form for the special One Year Memorial Candles, an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great start to Lent this week. Wear that Lenten smile as you pray, sacrifice and help others. Plus remember: Don't wallow in the challenge of Lent; wallow in the mercy of God. God bless always.

THE FIRST STATION-JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DIE

Just as Jesus was wrongfully accused, sometimes people falsely place blame on me to escape the responsibility themselves. And yes, sometimes I also put others down in order to build myself up. When Jesus was condemned to death, even those who had once followed Him went along with Pilate. Do I care more about being accepted by those around me than returning your love? Help me Lord. Be with me Lord.

THE SECOND STATION-JESUS IS GIVEN HIS CROSS

Lord, help me remember the humble and loving way You carried Your cross up to Calvary when I experience life's heavy burdens and strife. Sometimes I think I can't go on. Help me remember I am not alone. You are always with me. May I imitate Your virtues of love, humility and perseverance while dealing with my crosses and offer them up on behalf of my sins, for the sick and less fortunate. Help me to understand that there is nothing You and I can't get through together.





THE THIRD STATION-JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME

I am like you, Jesus, in that I take up my own cross. But my cross is made up of my sins, temptation and Materialism. I carry my cross through my life, like You, Jesus, carried Your cross to Calvary. Jesus, You fell under the weight of my sins. I fall by accepting temptation and giving into evil. I fall when I give in to gossip or hurt others. You carry my sins to death so I can be free. Help me, Jesus, to really understand all that You have done for me. Help me to make my burden lighter.

THE FOURTH STATION-JESUS MET HIS MOTHER

How does anyone have the strength to watch someone they love suffer and die? Death knows no boundaries and takes everyone. I need to have the strength and faith of Mary when I am faced with the loss of a loved one. Lord, while I know death is not an end but really a beginning, please give me the strength of faith that Your mother showed, and help me to be strong for the others who are grieving.





THE FIFTH STATION-SIMON OF CYRENE HELPS JESUS CARRY HIS CROSS

I need Your help to get me through these tough situations that I encounter during my day. Help me discover my options through prayer. Please help me to be nicer to those who are against me, and let me be trusting in my relationships with my friends, family and neighbors. I have enough to handle on my own. Why, then, am I further burdened with worry about family members or friends? Why does it always seem to be me who has to take on their problems as well as my own? Lord, show me the way.

THE SIXTH STATION-VERONICA WIPES THE FACE OF JESUS

Every day I see people who are suffering or in need of help. They seem to be everywhere. I wish someone would help them. I'm so busy; I just don's have the time. That isn't really true. THE FOURTEENTH STATION-JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB



ASH WEDNESDAY

This Wednesday, February 17th is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the Lenten Season. Many Catholic faithful usually receive blessed ashes to mark the start of this holy season. Because of the pandemic, the imposition of ashes in the usual manner is not possible. Plus remember that Ash Wednesday is not a Holy Day of Obligation. No one is obliged to come to church or receive ashes. The only way that ashes can be distributed is to sprinkle them on the head of each person. Since I don't see this option as sensible or safe, I have decided not to offer this alternative. I am still feeling the effects of the virus for over a month now. To stand, sprinkle, clean my hands and repeat over and over won't work for me. Also, I don't feel comfortable asking our deacons, who are all compromised, nor Eucharistic Ministers to help do this. So instead, we will celebrate 4 Masses on Ash Wednesday and at each Mass, a bowl of ashes will be blessed, and the formula recited for the entire congregation. Also, during Lent, there will be a 12:15pm Mass celebrated each weekday, Monday through Friday. Starting with this bulletin there will be a *Stations of the Cross*-prayer service in the bulletin each week that you can use to pray the Stations at home or during a visit to church. We will not have the usual Friday evening Stations of the Cross. So, even with restrictions, let us enter Lent the best way we can, either by attending Mass or watching from home on Ash Wednesday. -God bless always. Father Chuck





Abstinence and Fasting

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain **entirely** from meat/ poultry on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of

Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on **Ash Wednesday** and **Good Friday.** This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired and excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from **Ash Wednesday** and **Good Friday**

fast and abstinence.



EASTER MASSES OF REMEMBRANCE

Many people like to request the intention for a Mass on Easter Sunday. Since there are a limited number of Masses for Easter, all requests are not able to be fulfilled. Therefore, there will be a special Novena of Masses for Easter; the Easter Masses of Remembrance.

Those who you mention will be remembered at all the Masses during the Easter season. Special envelopes have been mailed with the regular envelope packet and in the Easter mailing to all parishioners. They are also available on the front side pews and the back pews by the doors of the church. Simply fill out the intentions you wish to have remembered on the front of the envelope, include your donation and either mail it back, drop it in the Sunday Mass collection or place it in one of the wooden boxes marked "Easter Masses." 

O Merciful Mother, give us the courage to reject the culture of death and the strength to build a new Culture of Life. **Amen.**






SPIRITUAL ADOPTION PRAYER PROGRAM EIGHTH MONTH DEVELOPING BABY

Your spiritual adopted baby is about 16"- 20" long and weighs between 4-6 pounds. With only one month to go, a layer of fat is produced and stored beneath the skin, for both insulation and as a food supply. Antibodies that give immunity to diseases are building up. The amniotic fluid is totally replaced every three hours, and the baby absorbs a gallon of it every day, more if the fluid is sweetened! Your baby's heart pumps 300 gallons of blood per day and the placenta begins to age. The center of the baby's bones are hardening, but the bones in the head are soft and flexible for delivery. Even though your baby could survive outside the womb at this point without much medical help, it is still legal to have him or her killed through abortion for any reason! Please keep praying for your little one and his or her mother and father, that they will trust in God and be graced with a loving, generous heart and bring their baby birth. On a personal witness, this week I visited with my granddaughter who is in the eighth month of her pregnancy. She showed me 14 sonogram pictures of her daughter, my great-granddaughter, Sofia Marie. There she was in full sight, 4lbs. 12 oz., a little bit of hair on her head, and sucking her thumb, and then it seemed trying to get her whole fist into her little mouth. Lent 2021

Dear Friends:

"The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan...After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the Gospel of God."(Mark 1:12 - 14) Each year on the First Sunday of Lent, the Church presents for our reflection and prayer the experience of Jesus in the desert. Jesus's experience in the desert follows immediately upon His baptism by Saint John the Baptist and immediately precedes His public ministry and proclamation of the Kingdom of God, in word and in deed. Saint Mark points out to us that the Spirit, who had just descended upon Jesus in the form of a dove, drove Jesus into the desert.

The desert was a barren place, a place of lifelessness, the home of the devil and evil. The Spirit sends Jesus into the desert to prepare himself for the years of His public ministry, ultimately leading to His Death and Resurrection. Jesus spends time away from the world to prepare himself. But He also goes forth into the desert to begin His battle against evil, sin and death. Jesus goes into the very dwelling of evil to begin the confrontation. This battle will continue throughout the rest of Jesus's life. The ultimate victory will come on Good Friday through His ultimate act of love on the Cross.

Our yearly experience of Lent, our forty day "desert experience," can be viewed in the same way. We are inspired and sent by the Spirit to spend some time apart from the world of noise and recover the beauty of silence. But, we are also sent to do battle. Our experience of true silence should allow us the opportunity to both listen to the voice and promptings of God as well as to better know ourselves. This personal battle against sin and evil can be painful, because we come to realize that we are all in need of constant conversion. There are real changes each and every one of us need to make in our lives and our hearts this Lent. But like Jesus, we are not alone. The Lord was ministered to by angels during His forty days in the desert. We are constantly aided by our guardian angels, by the angels and saints in heaven, by the community of the baptized, and by the grace of the sacraments of the Church. Like Jesus, we need to emerge from the desert ready to take on the evils of the world and work to spread the Gospel.


It was only a few short weeks into Lent 2020 that the experience of Covid-19 made radical changes to our society, our Church, and our families. The experience of desert isolation was no longer a metaphor but a lived reality. The experience of having our parishes locked down for months was painful for all of us. Many of us still experience this isolation in many ways. But as Christians we always remain men and women of hope. We know that the Cross of Good Friday leads to the empty tomb of Easter Sunday.

Pope Francis has declared this year as a special Year of Saint Joseph. In Saint Joseph we find a man of profound hope and strength as well as prayerful silence. Scripture does not record one word spoken by Saint Joseph. But Scripture does tell us of his unwavering faith and trust, which go beyond words. Following Jesus, and like Saint Joseph, men and women in the first centuries of the Church began to leave the towns and villages and settle in the isolation of the desert. Like the Lord, they sought to rid themselves of the distractions of everyday life so they too could do battle with evil, and through their quiet example proclaim the Kingdom of God.

This continued throughout the history of the Church, even to our present moment. Saint Antony, Saint Benedict, Saint Bruno, and so many others show us the lived experience of the desert is not an escape from the reality of life but a privileged encounter with the Lord and a revelation of our true selves. While most of us are not called to the monastic or solitary life, the last twelve months have given each of us an experience of solitude. We are encouraged to remain "socially distant." In the midst of the real suffering and hardships this has caused, perhaps the hidden grace is that it has led us to be "temporary monastics."


Our typical Lenten "desert experience" of forty days has lasted a bit longer. But we will come out of it! And like the Lord, when we emerge our goal is to proclaim the Gospel of God according to our vocation and the graces given to us. In addition to our personal sins and the evils present in our own hearts, we live in a world that is right now suffering from real physical illness as well as real division and hurt of every kind. Jesus emerged from the desert bringing the healing presence of God to all he encountered. As the baptized, the Church, the continuing presence of Jesus in the world, we need to do the same. The same Holy Spirit that drove Jesus into the desert is driving us on.
