

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Easter blessings be vours on the Fourth Sunday of Easter! Also, Happy Mothers' Day to all our Moms. Thanks for being the face of God's love to us. The Church refers to this Sunday as "Good Shepherd Sunday." In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas went to Antioch where they preached to the Jews at first but then started to preach to the Gentiles as Jesus had commissioned them when he said: "I have made you a light to the Gentiles, that you may be an instrument of salvation to the ends of the earth." Then in the second reading from the Book of Revelation, John speaks of a vision where he saw many people who had remained steadfast in faith. They were praising God before his heavenly throne and will be protected because of their faith as an elder proclaimed: "For the Lamb of God who is in the center of the throne will shepherd them and lead them to springs of life-giving water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." And finally in John's gospel, the image of Jesus as the "Good Shepherd" is established in his care for all those who follow him. This role is established in his claiming unity with the Father: "The Father and I are one."

This statement by Jesus was puzzling to the people around him. God was seen as often hidden, distant, nearly unknowable, not very accessible. But those who believed in Jesus were likely drawn to his message of oneness. Jesus now opened new avenues of access to God. Remaining close to Jesus meant remaining close to God. To follow Jesus was following God. Listening to Jesus was listening to God. It all boiled down that being close to Jesus was the path to being close to God. Of course, there are many ways to build a more faithful "oneness" with Jesus. The include prayer, scripture, nature, faithful living, the Church and of course what happens at the "table of the Lord." And what is also believed is that even though we are unlike God in many ways and don't often live in ways that reflect what God wants, we are still able to be "one" with the God who made us, who died for us and who sustains us. But remember that our relationship with God is not some sort of isolated thing, disconnected with the world. Actually our "oneness" with God can only be true and made manifest in the concrete relationships we have with one another. We can't claim to love God and be close to him if we are not in similar relationship with one another.

The last part of this "oneness" is that it has nothing to do with how much we are alike or different. Our Catholic Church is one of the flocks we belong to, a treasure for sure that should never be taken for granted. But we also belong to the flock of Christians, and the flock of believers, and the flock of people of good will, and the flock we forget a lot-the flock of humanity. Jesus is the Shepherd of that flock too and loves every sheep in that flock. He died for that flock too. And just as he and the Father and Spirit are one, he hopes that we, the entire human family, can be one too. A flock that takes care of one another, forgives one another, understands one another, and watches out for one another. Shouldn't we want that? Shouldn't our "oneness" with God be accomplishing these same things with our God? I think so. Why? Because God sees one flock!

This coming Thursday, May 15th, there will be a special Healing Mass starting at 7pm in our church. The Mass will be celebrated by Father Gio and myself with Al Barbarino lending his musical gifts to accompany our prayer. Bob Walsh, a well-known Healing Evangelist, will give a witness testimony. This evening promises to be a time of peace and healing in the midst of our Easter joy. I hope you can make the time to come to this Mass for yourself and in prayerful solidarity with all those you know who are sick. Join us and bring a friend!

Please take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to the Stand-Up Comedy Night on Saturday, May 17th, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. FIRST READING Acts 13:14, 43-52


Paul and Barnabas continued on from Perga and reached Antioch in Pisidia. On the sabbath they entered the synagogue and took their seats. Many Jews and worshipers who were converts to Judaism followed Paul and Barnabas, who spoke to them and urged them to remain faithful to the grace of God. On the following sabbath almost the whole city gathered to hear the word of the Lord. When the Jews saw the crowds, they were filled with jealousy and with violent abuse contradicted what Paul said. Both Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly and said. "It was necessary that the word of God be spoken to you first, but since you reject it and condemn yourselves as unworthy of eternal life, we now turn to the Gentiles. For so the Lord has commanded us, I have made you a light to the Gentiles, that you may be an instrument of salvation to the ends of the earth." The Gentiles were delighted when they heard this and glorified the word of the Lord. All who were destined for eternal life came to believe, and the word of the Lord continued to spread through the whole region. The Jews, however, incited the women of prominence who were worshipers and the leading men of the city, stirred up a persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in protest against them, and went to Iconium. The disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

SECOND READING Revelation 7:9, 14b-17

I, John, had a vision of a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, race, people, and tongue. They stood before the throne and before the Lamb, wearing white robes and holding palm branches in their hands. Silent Prayer After Communion

After the wonderful moment of receiving our Lord in Holy Communion, what should we do next? You got it: pray! According to the Diocese of Peoria, "After we receive the Most Holy Eucharist we return to our pew... This is a most opportune time to pray and talk with our Lord, whom we have just received" (A Study of the Mass, p. 20).

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal instructs us that this period may be given over to quiet prayer or to singing: "When the distribution of Communion is over, if appropriate, the Priest and faithful pray quietly for some time. If desired, a Psalm or other canticle of praise or a hymn may also be sung by the entire congregation" (GIRM, 88).

The Importance of Silence



Fr. Guy Oury, author of "The Mass," says that a period of silence is important: "The whole Church, the whole community, should take time to give silent thanks. It is important to do so, even if this has to be done after dismissal. This is the moment, if ever, to introduce a time of silence, as recommended also at other moments of the celebration. On the whole, however, the Eucharistic Prayer is much less silent than in the past, and the silence that favors recollection is a value not to be lost. Thanksgiving is absolutely indispensable in its collective form and its personal form. Sacramental effectiveness of the Eucharist does not work automatically. It requires dispositions. Mass itself is a thanksgiving, but thanksgiving does not cease with reception of Communion. It continues, and may extend to a hymn or a psalm said in common. There is much singing in the course of Mass, but at this moment it is well to let the peace of silence fall over the assembly" (p. 123).

So, what kind of prayer is fitting during this time? Fr. Oury notes an anonymous author writing in Syria around the year 300 AD who gives us an example: "After receiving the precious Body and the precious Blood of Christ we give thanks to him for making us worthy worthy to share in his holy mysteries and ask him that this partaking be not for judgment and condemnation but for salvation and the benefit of soul and body, for the preservation of piety, for the remission of sins and for the life of the world to come" (The Mass, p. 117).

Perhaps this is a moment of prayer where thanks pour forth from our hearts as we recognize the wonderful gift we have been given. Maybe it is a moment to ask that we be strengthened for what we are facing. Hopefully, it is a moment to say from our hearts that we truly want to live in God's love.

Silent but Active Prayer



Whatever our prayer is, Fr. Joseph McGloin reminds us that this time of silence shouldn't be mindless and passive: "So, although this is a time of silence, it isn't a time to prop ourselves upright, either kneeling or sitting, and doze off to dream of the upcoming day or the past night. It isn't a time, either, to say, 'Ok, Lord, do your thing,' and then settle back to wait passively for Him to do it. That would be about as polite as welcoming a visitor into our home and then just sitting there while they entertained and feasted us.

No, this moment of union with God after Holy Communion ought to be the most active, wonderful part of the Mass for us. We talk to him and we listen. His talk will be quiet talk– the way he almost always communicates with men. He wants to teach us, especially at this intimate moment, to love him in return. This will mean an active response on our part. Silent prayer doesn't mean just sitting back in regal passivity, waiting for the gifts to be laid at our feet. So, let us use well this opportunity for prayer after Communion and grow closer to the Lord we have just received!

Many find the Anima Christi prayer, "Soul of Christ, sanctify me," to be a helpful tool for this time of prayer. Other options include a personal prayer of gratitude, a request for guidance and strength, or a moment of silent adoration.

For Reflection: Review the Lord Jesus' teaching on prayer in Matthew 6:5-8. Bring this attentiveness to your personal prayer to God the Father after receiving Communion.

The Via Lucis includes fourteen stations for reflection on Christ's Paschal victory, which include events from his Resurrection to Pentecost.

Sixth Station: Jesus Appears to the Disciples

"When the doors were locked where the disciples were ... Jesus came and stood in their midst." (John 20.19)

Recall how often Jesus criticizes his apostles for lack of faith, and how often he commended people like the centurion and the woman with the hemorrhage for their great faith. Our lack of faith is shown when we decide that certain situations could not possibly be transformed by Christ. When friends or family try to encourage us we resist them with our cynicism or our claims that "you just don't understand." The disciples locked the doors for fear. Jesus burst through the doors for love. When I think there are aspects of my life where Jesus' presence is impossible, I show how little faith I have in his power to save and in his particular love for me.

Lond Jesus. let me not be afraid to beg you to transform the situations and relationships which seem to me to be out of your reach. May the life of hope have victory over the death of my cynicism.

Seventh Station: Jesus Confers on His Disciples the Power to Forgive Sins

"Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them." (John 20:23) Our human experience can help us understand why the forgiveness of sins is so closely tied to the Resurrection. There is perhaps no moment when love is so clear as when I receive mercy from someone whom I betrayed. There is perhaps nothing that awakens and generates me like receiving forgiveness, especially the forgiveness of God through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Life can begin again, even after I have done so much to betray the life I have been given. The experience of forgiveness is truly the experience of a life which is indestructible.

Lond Jesus. may your risen life continually pull me back and raise me up from the death of sin.

- <u>Reflection Questions:</u>
- o Do I radiate joy and hope when I talk about my faith?
- o Am I willing to witness to Christ in everyday conversations?
- <u>Action:</u> Share one joyful moment or insight from your faith with someone this week.

Food assistance is available for those in need who live within our Parish boundaries. Also, if you are a senior citizen, living within the Parish boundaries, and depend on your Social Security benefit as your sole source of income, contact the Parish Social Ministry and we can help you with food.

During the month of March, the Parish Social Ministry assisted 91 households with food, personal care and household items and provided the clients with other services needed, such as information on DSS, Catholic Charities and St. Vincent DePaul.

Pantry items still needed: Mac and Cheese, Pasta and Rice Side Dishes, Pasta Sauce, Instant Mashed Potatoes, White, Black and Baked Beans, Canned Potatoes, Canned Fruit, Cold Cereal, Shampoo and Conditioner.

Food donations can be brought to the Ryan House during its open hours or non-perishable food can be left in the bin on the Ryan House porch and in the Altar Server's Sacristy.

Statement of Cardinal Dolan and the NYS Bishops on State-Sanctioned Suicide Bill

April 24, 2025

"Euthanasia and assisted suicide are a defeat for all. We are called never to abandon those who are suffering, never giving up but caring and loving to restore hope." – Pope Francis, 2019

On Easter Monday, April 21, Pope Francis ended his earthly journey and entered eternal life. The Holy Father gave us many examples to emulate throughout his life and ministry, even right to the end when he gave us an example of a holy, natural death.

Sadly, the very next day, news reports indicated that the New York State Assembly would take up legislation (A136/S138) to legalize state-sanctioned suicide for those who are diagnosed with a terminal illness. Euphemistically titled the Medical Aid in Dying Act, this bill would usher in a dangerous new era in our state, turning the Hippocratic Oath taken by physicians to "do no harm" on its head and leaving vulnerable individuals – people with disabilities, the elderly, and those in impoverished and medically underserved communities – subject to pressure and coercion to end their lives so as not to be a "burden" to society or an excessive cost to insurance companies.

One only need to look to the example of our neighbor to the north, Canada, to understand the risk. That country passed a similar law to New York's bill in 2016. Within a few short years, it was expanded to allow not only those with terminal illnesses, but also those with "chronic" illnesses, such as arthritis, to end their lives. In 2027, the law is set to expand to those whose only underlying condition is mental illness, such as depression, anxiety or anorexia.

At a time when New Yorkers are rightly concerned with issues such as affordability, crime, homelessness, federal cuts to Medicaid, behavioral health access, and their children's education, it is unconscionable that lawmakers would consider now an appropriate time to legalize suicide for a segment of the population.

Think of the message this sends. Sadly, we are facing a suicide crisis among young people in our state, and the government rightly spends large sums of money to prevent these tragedies and to deliver a consistent message that life is worth living. Now our state will be telling its citizens that some lives – perhaps where there has been a loss of autonomy or a disability – are not worth living. We pray that the legislature reconsiders this disastrous public policy, and we call on Governor Hochul to exercise her veto authority should the bill come to her desk.
