Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Advent blessings be yours on the Third Sunday of Advent! This Sunday is also called "Gaudete Sunday" as our theme is one of joy. We rejoice because we have been included in Jesus' kingdom. As we prepare for heaven to actually come to earth with the birth of Jesus. First the prophet Isaiah speaks of the beautiful and fruitful places in Lebanon in contrast to the barren hills surrounding Jerusalem. The coming of Jesus will be the wedding of what "will be" with what currently "is." "Here is your God, he comes with vindication; with divine recompense comes to save you." Then in the second reading from the Letter of James, the people are encouraged to be patient until the coming of the Lord. "Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand." And finally, in Matthew's gospel, we see John, from prison, asking Jesus if he is truly the long-awaited promised savior. Jesus tells John' disciples to report back all the things Jesus has done and said as proof of who he was. And he wanted John to know how important he always was in God's plan to get the people ready for Jesus' coming. "Behold I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way before you."

Just as people flocked to John the Baptist to hear what he had to say, they flocked to Jesus for the same reason. Yet, Jesus doesn't just provide answers. Rather he starts as usual by asking them a question, one that is meant to get them thinking. "What did you go out to the desert to see?" There would be different answers. Some came out of curiosity, some to hear fiery talk, or to get baptized. By asking this question, Jesus wants the people to take a sincere look at their motives, their expectations, hopes and desires. Why go to see John? What did they want to experience? What were they hoping to see? Jesus asks us the same question. What are we hoping to see? Jesus didn't tell people what to do or not do. Rather he painted pictures in people's minds. He painted a lot of pictures of what the kingdom looks like. We call them parables. And he painted pictures of what blessedness looks like which we call the beatitudes. Jesus painted pictures where deserts bloomed and the blind could see and the lame walk and people loved their enemies and forgave the seemingly unforgiveable. It's as if Jesu was telling people that faith isn't about what one knows, but about what one sees.

. In a very real sense, we see what we want to see, what we expect to see. In less than two weeks we will celebrate Christmas, and the manger we now see empty will no longer be so. Coming close we will see a small baby statue representing something that happened 2000 years ago. Will we realize that Christmas is more than just a remembrance but about making something present, someone present. That it is a breaking into our hearts and minds and world of the One who can make all the wonderful things we hope for possible. Jesus is the one who can help us see not as we usually do but as God sees. As Advent continues, truly reflect on what you hope to see come Christmas morning. And may what you do see last for much more than a day.

Today we have our special *Gaudete Hospitality Sunday*, sponsored by the Sodality of Our Lady after all the morning Masses in the cafeteria. All those who ordered *Christmas Plants* are asked to pick them up in the cafeteria during this time. Also, our *Christmas Cash 50/50* winning number will be drawn at 2pm when hospitality ends in the cafeteria. So, stop by for some refreshments and friendship with fellow parishioners after Mass. Pick up your plants and get some more Christmas Cash 50/50 tickets. You may be the lucky winner!

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the Christmas Masses of Remembrance envelope information, the Christmas Mass and Confession Schedule, the Come and See Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover, an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great Third Week of Advent. Smile, share and spread some joy everywhere you go. Plus remember: God is also making a list and checking it twice. God bless always.

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT TIME WEEKLY GUIDE FOR PERSONAL PRAYER



Come & See

Until you do, you will never know

Summary of the Readings for the Week



The Third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday, when we are called to rejoice with expectant faith, letting Christ dispel our discouragement and renew our hope as we await His coming with trust and perseverance. In the Gospel, Jesus reassures John the Baptist by pointing to His works: healing, restoring, and proclaiming good news. This reassurance invites us as well to recognize Him through the fruits of mercy and transformation in our own lives.

During this week, the liturgy deliberately limits saint celebrations because the Church focuses intensely on preparing for Christ's birth, inviting us to contemplate the mystery of His coming with undivided attention.

The First Readings for this week are taken from the Book of Numbers (Monday-Tuesday), the Book of Isaiah (Wednesday-Thursday), and the Book of Zephaniah (Friday-Saturday). Numbers, a historical book, recounts Israel's desert wanderings and God's guidance for the community, emphasizing covenant fidelity and divine provision. Isaiah, a prophetic book, calls the people to repentance, hope, and trust in God's saving power, while Zephaniah calls Israel to reform and rejoices in the coming of the Lord who restores justice and mercy.

The First Readings at the start of the week highlight God's faithful guidance and the human response of trust and obedience. Numbers reminds the faithful that God provides direction and protection for His people: "The Lord bless you and keep you!" (Numbers 6:24), emphasizing the need to follow His commands even when the journey seems uncertain. Isaiah encourages the people to prepare for the Lord's coming and to place their hope in His promises: "The Lord will come to save you" (Isaiah 35:4), reinforcing that Advent is a season to ready the heart for Christ.

For Thursday through Saturday, the First Readings focus on God's promises of redemption and the need

for conversion. Isaiah's prophecy emphasizes God's salvation and the coming joy of the Messiah: "Say to the faint of heart: Be strong, fear not!" (Is 35:4). Zephaniah calls for trust in God and rejoicing in His restoration, declaring: "The Lord your God is in your midst, a mighty savior" (Zephaniah 3:17). Together, these passages guide the faithful to reflect, prepare, and celebrate the nearness of the Lord in their hearts and lives during Advent.

In the Gospels for Monday through Wednesday, Jesus faces the chief priests and elders who question His authority, prompting Him to expose their closed hearts by challenging them with His own question, showing that true authority is rooted in truth and openness to God. On Tuesday, the parable of the two sons underscores that repentance and obedience matter more than empty words, highlighted by Jesus' piercing line, "Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." By Wednesday, the focus shifts toward the unfolding of salvation history through the genealogy of Jesus, revealing that God works faithfully through imperfect people and generations to fulfill His promise of a Savior.

On Thursday, the Gospel tells of Joseph's quiet righteousness and his obedience to God's revelation in a dream which sets the tone of humble surrender as Christ's birth draws near. Friday brings the annunciation to Zechariah, where human doubt meets divine fidelity as God promises a son who will "turn many of the children of Israel to the Lord," ushering in the final moments before the Messiah's arrival. On Saturday, the angel Gabriel appears to Mary with the most profound invitation of salvation history, and her fiat: "May it be done to me according to your word" which becomes the model of Advent readiness: trusting, and open, joyfully surrendered to God's plan.

On Fourth Sunday of Advent, the Gospel of Thursday is repeated, recounting that Joseph moved from fear to trust as he accepted God's plan, embracing his role in salvation history after the angel tells him, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife."

Spiritually, it invites me to examine my openness to God's will, cultivate patience in waiting, and respond with humble surrender like Mary and Joseph, allowing Christ's presence to transform my thoughts, decisions, and relationships.

"The baptism of John, from where did it come?"

Matthew 21:25

The Gospel from Matthew 21:23–27 shows Jesus' authority questioned by the chief priests and elders, emphasizing that true faith and obedience matter more than appearances. "The baptism of John, from where did it come?" reminds me to prioritize living faithfully according to God's word, even amidst pressure and conflicting priorities at work and home, grounding my decisions in integrity and trust.

My Prayer: Lord, grant me the wisdom to recognize Your authority in my life and the courage to follow Your ways faithfully, even when others question or challenge me. Help me to act always with integrity.

Repent and Act

"Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." -Matthew 21:31

The parable of the two sons (Matthew 21:28-32) underscores that action and repentance matter more

than promises. "Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." This encourages me to examine my own life, ensuring that my intentions translate into loving action for my family, colleagues, and community, not just words or plans.

My Prayer: Lord, help me to turn my intentions into loving actions, not empty words, and to respond with repentance and obedience to Your will in every aspect of my life.

Courageous Obedience "Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife" Matthew 1:20



Matthew 1:18-25 recounts Joseph's humble obedience. The angel's reassurance to Joseph calls me to embrace God's plan for my life with courage, responding faithfully with the trust that God works through ordinary people and situations.

My Prayer: Lord, grant me the courage to follow Your plan with humility, like Saint Joseph. May I serve faithfully and joyfully.

Humble Surrender

"May it be done to me according to your word."
- Luke 1:38

Luke 1:5–25 and 1:26–38 focus on the angelic announcements to Zechariah and Mary, emphasizing God's providence and our call to trust and cooperation. Mary's fiat reminds me to adopt an open and trusting heart, allowing God's guidance to shape how I meet the needs of my family, balance work priorities, and cultivate joy and hope in Advent anticipation.



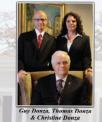
