Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Christmas blessings be yours on the Feast of the Epiphany! Today we give thanks to God for the hope we have, even in the midst of whatever current darkness we are facing. Why? Because the time of God's restoration has come through the birth of Jesus. The first reading from the prophet Isaiah speaks about a darkness that covers the earth, with thick clouds covering the people. Captivity brought the weight of hopelessness to Israel. Yet. the light of hope will ultimately triumph. "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you." The Responsorial Psalm's refrain is: "Lord, every nation on earth will adore you." This shows the far-reaching power and effect the coming birth of the Savior will have on the world. Jew and Gentile will be coheirs of salvation won in Jesus Christ. And finally, Matthew's gospel passage tells of the Magi from the east, the Three Kings, who come searching for the newborn king of the Jews. They are led to Bethlehem where they find the infant Jesus. They pay him homage and offer their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Then they travel home, not reporting to Herod, who only wanted to kill this newborn baby threat. "And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way."

Today we hear again the story of the Magi, three people who came from the east, but not empty handed. They came bearing gifts that represented certain things (kingship, divinity, and death). Think about it. Did the baby Jesus really need these gifts? Not in the least. Yet they are the gifts the Magi needed to give. It is easy to think that God needs certain things from us, but this isn't really the case. God has no needs in the way we use this word. God is God and he can do whatever he wants in whatever way he chooses. God can't be diminished in any way by our failure to give him anything, no matter what it is. Yet maybe the gifts God desires are precisely what we need to give him. Sometimes it is hard to make relevant, a story of something long ago. It is not more than just interesting. What does the Magi really have to do with us? Like the Magi, we too go on a journey each week, a much shorter one, to church. We walk in and up an aisle to a pew of our choice to sit in. We too come from an ordinary place to the foot of a miracle. And the object is the same as it was for the Magi. We come to gaze on God, draw near to him, commune with him, worship him. But like the Magi do we come with something to give or are we empty handed?

What value do I have to give? My prayers, yet my mind wanders. My generosity, but I am oftentimes too self-centered. Maybe my kind heart, but I usually also do something unkind each day. How about forgiveness and mercy? Well, there are some grudges and hurts I'm not willing to part with yet. Basically, all I have to give is my imperfect, flawed, weak and sinful self, which is precisely the gift God wants from me. And it is the gift I need to give. It's wanting to imitate Jesus, knowing I can't completely do that. It's doing Godlike things when I mostly do ordinary things. It's wanting to forgive the unforgiveable, love the unlovable and show compassion and mercy when I really want to show something else altogether. In other words, God wants the gift of our whole selves. It is not the gift God needs, but rather the gift I need to give and what the world needs from me. So, give yourself to the God who is always giving himself to you. Remember this as we all remember that special gift-giving journey long ago.

Remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to the Holy Hour on Tuesday evening, January 6th to honor the patron saint of our parish, St. Raymond, whose feast day is Wednesday, January 7th, the Come and See Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week.

Have a great first week of January 2026! *Keep your Christmas joy going and remember: Follow the Wise Men, not the wise guys.* God's Christmas blessing be yours always.

GOSPEL Matthew 2:1-12

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage.' After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

St. Raymond of Penyafort

St. Raymond of Penyafort (c. 1175–1275) was a Spanish priest, Dominican friar, and one of the greatest canon lawyers in Church history. Born near Barcelona, he studied law and theology and became a respected teacher of canon law. Later, he joined the Dominican Order and lived a life of prayer, teaching, and service.

St. Raymond was appointed adviser to Pope
Gregory IX and was asked to organize Church laws
into what became a foundational collection of canon
law. Known for his wisdom, humility, and dedication
to justice, he lived to be nearly 100 years old and
is the patron saint of canon lawyers.
His feast day is January 7th.

Summary of the Readings for the Week

This Sunday is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. The Gospel of Matthew recounts the journey of the magi who, having seen the star announcing the newborn King of the Jews, "have come to do him homage," offering gifts and worshipping Jesus, therefore manifesting Christ's revelation to all peoples.

This week, Monday is the Memorial of Saint John Neumann (bishop, religious) who, as Bishop of Philadelphia, is known for his tireless work in Catholic education and the growth of parochial schools in the United States. Tuesday is the Optional Memorial of Saint André Bessette (religious) who as a Holy Cross brother, was known for his deep devotion to Saint Joseph and his quiet ministry of hospitality and prayer at Saint Joseph's Oratory in Montreal, Canada. Wednesday is the Optional Memorial of Saint Raymond of Peñafort (our Parish patron), who as a Dominican priest, was known for for his expertise in canon law and his efforts to reconcile conflicting interpretations of Church law.

This week, the First Readings are excerpts from the third, fourth and fifth chapters of the First Letter of John. The readings continue the apostle John's pastoral reflections on living in the light of Christ. He encourages believers to remain faithful, love one another deeply, and understand that whoever is born of God does not persist in sin but keeps safe in Christ, fostering confidence that "if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us."

The Gospels for the first half of the week highlight the beginning of Jesus' public ministry and his compassionate authority. On Monday, (Matthew 4:12-17, 23-25) Jesus hears of John the Baptist's arrest and withdraws to Galilee, where he proclaims the nearness of the kingdom of heaven, calls for

repentance, and goes throughout Galilee teaching and healing "every disease and every infirmity," drawing great crowds from many regions as word of his teaching and miracles spreads.

On Tuesday (Mark 6:34-44), Jesus responds with deep compassion to the crowds like a shepherd to his sheep and performs the miracle of feeding the five thousand, multiplying five loaves and two fish to satisfy all who had come to hear him. On Wednesday (Mark 6:45-52), he demonstrates his dominion over creation's challenges by walking on the sea to reach his disciples struggling against the wind, calming their fear and revealing more fully his identity as Lord over the forces of nature.

For the remainder of the week, the focus of the Gospels shifts to Jesus' proclamation of his mission and his healing power at work in varied contexts. On Thursday the Gospel from Luke 4:14-22a presents Jesus in his hometown of Nazareth reading Isaiah's prophecy and declaring that the Spirit of the Lord is upon him to bring good news to the poor, release to captives, and sight to the blind, inaugurating his public mission as fulfillment of Scripture.

On Friday (Luke 5:12-16) Jesus heals a man with leprosy, touching and cleansing him, which both reveals his power over disease and invites deeper reflection on purity, mercy, and the kingdom breaking into the world. On Saturday (John 3:22-30) the reading shifts to an encounter between the disciples of John the Baptist and Jesus' disciples, where John acknowledges that "he must increase, but I must decrease," pointing all toward Christ.

Sunday, January 11th, is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, marking the end of the Christmas season. Matthew's Gospel shows Jesus approaching John at the Jordan to be baptized, teaching that even the sinless one enters into the waters "to fulfill all righteousness," and at that moment the heavens open and the Father's voice declares Jesus as His beloved Son.

My Prayer: Jesus, grant me courage to share your peace, welcoming your kingdom into every moment.

Compassionate Provider

"He had compassion for them." (Mark 6:34)

Jesus compassion for the crowds, feeding them with five loaves and two fish, reveals that Christ sees my needs and invites me to trust him with what I have.

My Prayer: Jesus, help me trust you with my blessings and share generously with those around me.

Presence in the Storm

"Take courage; it is 1. Do not be afraid."
(Mark 6:50)

Jesus walking on the sea to his disciples amid the storm, calming their fear and proclaiming his steadfast presence, reassures me that I am never alone in struggle.

My Prayer: Jesus, calm my anxieties and steady my heart so I may bring peace into my family and workplace.

Mission Fulfilled

"Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." (Luke 4:21)

Jesus proclaiming that he fulfills Isaiah's prophecy in bringing good news to the poor and freedom to captives invites me to recognize God's word is alive and to join him in His mission.

My Prayer: Lord, help me live your word today so my actions uplift those I meet in love and service.

Mercy Revealed

"I do will it. Be made clean" (Luke 5:13)

Jesus healing a man with leprosy, touching him with mercy and restoring him, shows me that no one is beyond God's compassion.

My Prayer: Jesus, make me attentive to the suffering around me and generous in offering comfort to those around me.

Joyful Witness

"He must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30).

Saint John the Baptist's affirmation of Jesus teaches me that discipleship points to Christ as the source of life and joy. John's humility invites us to celebrate Christ above all.

My Prayer: Jesus, help me set aside self-interest so that your love shines through me in every part of my life.

The Baptism of the Lord



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, or Theophany, is the feast day commemorating the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River by John the Baptist.



The Epiphany marks the arrival of visitors, identified in Scripture as the magi, to the place where Jesus was born. The Three Kings are know for the gifts they brought:

Gold — a symbol of wealth and power, identifies the recipient as a king.

Frankincense — the crystalized resinous sap of a tree used as incense and as an offering, is symbolic of prayer.

Myrrh — another resinous tree sap, was used in healing liniments and as an embalming ointment.

NYS Bishops' Statement on Gov. Hochul's Plan to Sign Assisted Suicide Bill

December 17, 2025

Following is a joint statement by Timothy Cardinal Dolan and the Bishops of New York State on Governor Hochul's announcement that she will sign the physician-assisted suicide bill passed earlier this year

by the legislature:

"We are extraordinarily troubled by Governor Hochul's announcement that she will sign the egregious bill passed by the legislature earlier this year sanctioning physician-assisted suicide in New York State. This new law signals our government's abandonment of its most vulnerable citizens, telling people who are sick or disabled that suicide in their case is not only acceptable, but is encouraged by our elected leaders.

Tragically, this new law will seriously undermine all of the anti-suicide and mental health care investments Governor Hochul has made through her tenure. How can any society have credibility to tell young people or people with depression that suicide is never the answer, while at the same time telling elderly and sick people that it is a compassionate choice to be celebrated?

"While physician-assisted suicide will soon be legal here in New York, we must clearly reiterate that it is in direct conflict with Catholic teaching on the sacredness and dignity of all human life from conception until natural death and is a grave moral evil on par with other direct attacks on human life. We call on Catholics and all New Yorkers to reject physician-assisted suicide for themselves, their loved ones, and those in their care. And we pray that our state turn away from its promotion of a Culture of Death and invest instead in life-affirming, compassionate hospice and palliative care, which is seriously underutilized."
