

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's Easter blessings be yours on the Second Sunday of Easter-Divine Mercy Sun*day!* The first readings during the Easter season are taken from the Acts of the Apostles which describe how the early Church got started and went through its growing pains. Today we hear: "With great power the apostles bore witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great favor was accorded them all." Then in the second reading from the First Letter of John, we hear what it means to believe in Jesus as the Christ. "In this way we know that we love the children of God when we love God and obev his commandments." And finally, today's gospel from John is heard every year on this Sunday. It is the story of Jesus' appearance to Thomas. This familiar story leads us to focus on faith and the nature of belief. What it means to believe is of tremendous importance. And though we may never fully understand our belief completely, we should still reflect on it. That's why we have this gospel passage year after year. What we believe as Christians is in a God called Father and in God the Son, and in God the Holy Spirit. Yet there is only one God, for our Triune God is such a deep mystery. I guess you could say that belief in God is behind everything we see and experience. It says the world can't be some sort of "accident." Something beyond us must be responsible for its very existence. Many people just stop there with a belief in God but with little specifics. And that's fine, because it is the same voice of God speaking to them as speaks to us and who gifts us with faith. So, if we believe in God in a simple way or in a more complicated way, just know that to say: "I believe in God" says something very profound, personal and demanding. You see, our "faith" invites us to expand what it means to believe. This means embracing and accepting a much deeper commitment. For when we Catholics say, like Thomas: "My Lord and my God," we are also saying that: "We love the God we believe in."

What is this love of God? It is nothing less than that we keep his commandments. That's when our belief in God leads to challenges. That's when our belief leads to serious responsibilities. That's when our belief leads to action on our part. It is our response to a God who has shown us how much he loves us, and how merciful he is to us, how generous, understanding and compassionate he is with us. So, when we get to this profound realization of how incredible our God is, revealed perfectly in the person of Jesus, that becomes the catalyst for all we say and all we do. This is what enabled the apostles, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to not simply remain behind locked doors and *"think about"* Jesus. Rather it was their deep faith and desire to return love for love that gave them the courage to put into practice the love Jesus had showed them. And that's why the world was never the same. So, when you read the response of Thomas; *"My Lord and my God,"* don't just stop there. Share God's great love and demonstrate the depth of your belief through countless acts of goodness, kindness, mercy and love.

Today we celebrate *Divine Mercy Sunday* when we are encouraged to trust in God's merciful love for us and draw nearer to him. We should also perform corporal works of mercy out of love for God, who redeemed us by his suffering and death. We will celebrate this feast in our church from 2-4pm. There will be Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, the Rosary, a spiritual reflection and Benediction. All are invited.

It is with a touch of sadness and appreciation that I announce that Father Theo Iloh will be leaving St. Raymond Parish at the end of April. Father Theo is being called back to Nigeria by his bishop to take up a position as a seminary and college professor. We will all miss Father Theo and wish him well in his next priestly assignment. Father Theo will celebrate the 12noon Mass on Sunday, April 28th after which there will be a parish reception in the school cafeteria. All are most welcome to come and give your personal best wishes to Father Theo both at the Mass and reception.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), info about Adult Confirmation on Pentecost, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week.

ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

NYS CONSTITUTION EQUALITY AMENDMENT BILL

There is a ballot proposal this coming November to amend the NYS Constitution. The Equality Amendment Bill (S.108-Krueger, A.1283-Seawright) states that no person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws of the state subjected or be to anv discrimination in their civil rights based on a list of protected classes. The current clause includes race, color, creed and religion. The proposed changes add: "pregnancy, outcomes, reproductive pregnancy and healthcare autonomy." It also adds "age" without the any exclusion of minors. The following are comments alerting the voter to the danger of the

Equality Amendment Bill:

The Liturgy of the Word & the Liturgy of the Eucharist

As we conclude the Liturgy of the Word and prepare to transition to the Liturgy of the Eucharist, it is a fitting time to reflect on how these main parts of the Mass are united and complement each other. We previously touched on this unity in our reflection on the homily. This time, we will hear from a couple of our recent popes. As The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "The Mass consists in some sense of two parts, namely the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, these being so closely interconnected that they form but one single act of worship. For in the Mass is spread the table both of God's Word and of the Body of Christ, and from it the faithful are to be instructed and refreshed" (GIRM, 28, also cf. SC 56, 48, 51). Perhaps the two main parts of the Mass seem obvious, but how are they "so closely interconnected"? How are the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist related? As two examples, they both strengthen us in understanding our faith and living it out in the world, and they both draw us deeper into true unity with Christ.

The Two Ways Our Lord Nourishes Us



Pope St. John Paul II reflected on how the unity of the Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist goes back to the early Church: "We are well aware that from the earliest times the celebration of the Eucharist has been linked not only with prayer but also with the reading of Sacred Scripture and with singing by the whole assembly. As a result, it has long been possible to apply to the Mass the comparison, made by the Fathers, with the two tables, at which the Church prepares for her children the word of God and the Eucharist, that is, the bread of the Lord" (Dominicae Cenae, 10). This image of the two tables illustrates for us that we are fed in two main ways through the Mass: through the hearing of God's word to us and through the true presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. As we have reflected before, through the Scriptures we come to know God as he reveals himself to us; we learn who we are as his people; and we learn how to live our lives in him and



with one another. As we will see as we continue through the Mass, in the Eucharist we are nourished in a unique way through the true presence of Jesus and his dwelling with us through Holy Communion.

Pope Benedict XVI, reflecting on these two tables of the Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist, emphasizes the unity between them: "First of all, there is a need to reflect on the inherent unity of the rite of Mass. Both in catechesis and in the actual manner of celebration, one must avoid giving the impression that the two parts of the rite are merely juxtaposed... There is an intrinsic bond between the word of God and the Eucharist. From listening to the word of God, faith is born or strengthened (cf. Rom 10:17); in the Eucharist the Word made flesh gives himself to us as our spiritual food. Thus, 'from the two tables of the word of God and the Body of Christ, the Church receives and gives the faithful the bread of life.' Consequently it must constantly be kept in mind that the word of God, read and proclaimed by the Church in the liturgy, leads to the Eucharist as to its own connatural end" (Sacramentum Caritatis, 44).

Relationship and Unity

Pope Benedict's words remind me of the way we grow in relationships. Over time, a friendship grows and deepens, and with that depth comes greater love and intimacy. Our love helps us to understand each other more fully and our ongoing communication helps us deepen our love. This helps me realize more concretely what I think the popes are teaching us: in the Mass, we encounter Jesus both through the Liturgy of the Word and through the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Both tables bless us with growing deeper in our relationship with him. Both lead us deeper in unity. Both invite us to share the fruits of that unity with one another.

For Reflection:

• How do you experience the Liturgy of the Word as nourishment? Pray with Ezekiel 3:1-3, in which the Lord instructs Ezekiel to eat a scroll. Meditate on the image of "tables" set for a feast as a way to awaken your "appetite" for worship as you prepare for Mass.

The Three-Fold Sacrament of the Eucharist by Servant of God, Fr. John A. Hardon, S.J.

Pope John Paul II will go down as one of the greatest minds in the history of the papacy. It was John Paul who explained at length that the Eucharist is a sacrament three times over. It is the Sacrifice-Sacrament of the Mass, the Communion-Sacrament of Holy Communion, and the Presence-Sacrament of the Real Presence. On all three levels, the Eucharist is the Risen Jesus Christ whose humanity is a channel of divine grace to the world. It is impossible to exaggerate the importance of this truth of our faith. Even as we say this, we must remember that the Holy Eucharist is Jesus Christ who rose from the dead on Easter Sunday.

Sacrifice-Sacrament.



The Risen Christ offers Himself during the double consecration in the Sacrifice of the Mass. He is on the altar as the Incarnate God in His human nature. He can no longer die a bodily death because He is now in His glorified Body. But He is ready to die because He has a truly human will by which He would die if He could.

Communion-Sacrament.

In Holy Communion, the Risen Christ gives us Himself in the fullness of His di vinity and humanity. The benefits of Holy Communion are beyond human calculation. When we receive our Lord, He strengthens our supernatural life, He gives us the ability to resist the unruly passions of our fallen human nature, He increases our virtues of faith, hope and charity, He removes the guilt of our venial sins and reduces the temporal punishment due to our forgiven sins.

Presence-Sacrament.

During His visible presence in Palestine, Christ did mainly two things: He preached God's truth to the people and performed many miracles. Moreover, He foretold that those who believed in Him would witness even greater miracles in the future. In the Blessed Sacrament, it is the same divine Teacher and the same Miracle Worker who taught and worked wonders during His visible stay before His ascension into heaven. Jesus Christ is on earth in every tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved, and on every altar where the Holy Eucharist is exposed for the adoration of the faithful.

The measure is our belief that Jesus Christ is now on earth is in the Holy Eucharist.

The Eucharist in the Life of St. Faustina By Kathleen Beckman

Saint Faustina's full religious name was Sister Maria Faustina of the Most Blessed Sacrament and her whole life revolved around the Holy Eucharist. What does Saint Faustina teach us about the Eucharist?

Jesus wanted to stay with us and opened His heart of mercy:

Jesus gave St. Faustina a clear love of the mystery of the Eucharist. She wrote that during Mass, "I thanked the Lord Jesus for having redeemed us and for having given us the greatest of all gifts, the Holy Eucharist." (Diary 1747).

Love's sacrifice was fully consummated at the consecration:

During a Holy Hour, in a vision of the cenacle, Sr. Faustina saw the institution of the Holy Eucharist. She came to understand that, "At the moment of consecration...the sacrifice was fully consummated. Hereafter, only the external ceremony of death will be carried out. Never in my whole life had I understood this mystery so profoundly as during that hour of adoration." (Diary 684, 757, 832).

The mercy that gushed from His Heart:

St. Faustina asked God to bring the world to understand more the mystery of divine mercy and the Eucharist. She said, "Who will ever conceive and understand the depth of mercy that gushed forth from His Heart? It is only in eternity that we shall know the great mystery given to us in Holy Communion. One day we will know what God is doing for us in each Mass, and what sort of gift He is preparing through it for us."

Eucharist:

Transform me into a living host to atone for sinners: Through our communion with Christ we grow in selfemptying love that desires to offer reparation for sinners. The Eucharist moves us to an ever-greater thirst for the salvation of souls.

In the Host is the power: Jesus told her: "In the Host is the power; it will defend you always" (Diary 616). Eucharistic love is infinitely powerful to defend us from all that is harmful to our salvation.


