

### Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-second Sunday in ordinary Time! readings today point to what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. In the first reading from the Book of Wisdom, everything about life on earth is related to God's heavenly wisdom. All that comes from heaven affects positively what happens on earth. "And thus were the paths of those on earth made straight." Then the refrain from Psalm 90 echoes how involved God has always been with the world he created. "In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge." Finally in Luke's gospel, Jesus offers a series of challenging statements. His words grab our attention and grate against our sensibilities. Through the use of extreme examples, Jesus is trying to get at the heart of discipleship, namely, to orient our lives completely on God. His ultimate challenge is in his words: "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple."

At the heart of every God-centered life is a life being in proper balance. That involves valuing everything in the proper way and to the proper degree. It involves making judgments about what a certain thing or certain pursuit is worth. It comes as no surprise to know that when it comes to the things of this earth, things that don't last, we tend to overvalue them in all sorts of ways and often to our great harm. In a sense, every temptation is precisely that, giving too high a value (and being willing to pay too high a cost) to something that falls far short of something else, someone else. In these situations, fulfilling our own needs and wants moves to the front seat rather than remaining in the back seat. It's evidence of a life out of balance.

On the other hand, the things we often undervalue are surprisingly the things that matter the most, the things that last, the God-things that give meaning to every aspect of our lives, on this earth and into eternity. Profound generosity seems way too big a gamble. Mystery? That's for suckers. And abundant love puts one in a risky place of not being loved back. Yes, sometimes God-things (and God himself) just seem to be a kind of bad deal. Today's gospel relies on faith to tell us we know better. The examples Jesus uses show the importance of understanding what something costs, what something is worth. No denying, Jesus' statements are rough stuff, hard to hear and difficult to wrap our minds around.

It seems pretty clear that Jesus always wants us to maintain a proper balance, always valuing things accurately, whether the cost is truly worth it. He's not saying things of this world aren't important, don't have value, not worth pursuing. They aren't worthless. It means there is one thing that is always worth the most, worth pursuing and embracing the cost, no matter what the cost. It's not a what. It's a who. *It's GOD!* Once we realize that and live accordingly, our lives take on a kind of beauty, fullness, peace, joy and meaning. If you want it, rest assured. No price is too high.

Next Sunday, September 14th is our semiannual Parish Blood Drive. This is an important opportunity for parishioners to really make a difference in people's lives. By donating blood, you are not only making a life-saving gift, but also sharing in Jesus' ministry of caring for the sick and those in need. The drive is from 8am till 2pm in the school cafeteria. Members from the committee will be speaking at all the Masses this weekend to encourage everyone's participation. Tables are located in the church vestibule and altar server sacristy where you can sign up for a specific time to donate. Please consider making this gift of life donation next Sunday.

Please take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from *Par*ish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), the Parish Blood Drive flyer, an invitation to the Fatima Prayer Vigil this Monday evening, September 8th, the *Friends of* the Poor Walk sponsored by the St. Vincent de Paul Society on Saturday, September 27th, the Come and See Centerfold, the Communal Prayer **Before Mass** (found on the inside back page), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

But if not, while he is still far away, he will send a delegation to ask for peace terms. In the same way, anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple."

### Summary of the Readings for the Week



Sunday is the Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Gospel passage from Luke stresses that following Jesus requires a profound commitment, asking us to prioritize Him above even our closest family members and even our own lives. The readings from the Book of Wisdom and the Gospel, highlight that becoming a disciple involves sacrifice and setting priorities, a task that is difficult but ultimately leads to the fullness of life. The message from Saint Paul to Philemon adds the theme of reconciliation and love within the Christian community.

Monday is the Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary with its own special readings. Mary's role is to bear the Son who is Immanuel ...



"God with us." Mary's obedience and role as mother fulfill God's promise, and in doing so, she points not to herself but to the One she carries.

Blessed are you, holy Virgin Mary, deserving of all praise; from you rose the sun of justice, Christ our God.

Tuesday is the Memorial of Saint Peter Claver, Priest. Friday is the Memorial of the Most Holy Name of Mary. Saturday is the Memorial of Saint John Chrysostom, Bishop and Doctor of the Church.

The first readings for the first part of this week are from Paul's Second and Third Letters to the Colossians. The letters reflect Paul's message that faith in Christ isn't abstract—it transforms daily life, relationships, and behavior and therefore we must renounce our old, sinful patterns and identities. The first readings for the end of this week are from Paul's

First Letter to Timothy highlight that God's grace and mercy are the central gifts that define the Christian life and therefore our gratitude toward God flows from a deep awareness of His grace.

The Gospel passages for the week from Luke collectively are referred to as the Sermon on the Plain, which is Luke's parallel to the Sermon on the Mount found in the Gospel of Matthew. These Gospel passages show what Jesus is doing ... Jesus prays, He heals, and He teaches.

Jesus spends the night in prayer to seek Father's quidance before twelve choosing the Apostles from among His disciples. He then heals the sick, and casts out demons. demonstrating that God cares and is deeply engaged with human suffering.



In teaching his disciples, Jesus delivers a powerful, counter-cultural message, known as the Beatitudes, which presents a reversal of worldly values ... calling people into a new kind of life: one that reflects God's mercy, justice, humility, and love. God blesses the lowly, not the powerful.

Jesus commands his followers to live radical love and mercy which requires loving enemies, blessing those who curse you, forgiving, and giving generously. "Do to others as you would have them do to you." He warns the disciples against judgment and hypocrisy: "Can the blind lead the blind?" "Remove the plank from your own eye." Jesus is forming a kingdom built on humility, mercy, love, and obedience to His teaching.

The Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. We fix our eyes on the crucified Christ, who was "obedient unto to death, even death on a cross," as whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

### **Daily Prayer This Week**

As we begin this week, we can pray with the spiritual vision that the daily scriptures present. It's not just an ethical program, but a call to live in the world as a new creation, conformed not to worldly standards but to the crucified and risen Christ. This is a call not merely to believe in Jesus, but to live in Him, and to allow His Word to shape every part of our lives ... from our inner desires to our external actions, from how we treat our friends to how we love our enemies.

"As you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith." The readings remind that Christianity is not just a system of belief but a way of life, a continual walking with Christ. This requires rooting ourselves deeply in Him through prayer, sacraments, Scripture, and community. In a world that tempts us to root our identity in success, appearance, or opinion, we are invited to sink our roots into something eternal ... Jesus.

This rooting is not passive so each morning, we can pray for grace to be deeply rooted in Christ, not in worldly identities or fears. "Lord, may I live in You. Root me in Your truth and love." We can ask the Holy Spirit to show us where we are tempted to root our identity in ... success, reputation, control, etc. We must no longer walk according to the flesh, that is, according to our old patterns of sin, selfishness, and pride. Saint Paul shows us what this new life looks like: "Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience...forgive each other...and,

above all these, put on love." These are not optional virtues for extra-holy people, instead, they are the standard clothing for anyone who claims to follow Christ.



It is tempting to reduce the Christian life to simply "being a good person." These virtues are not self-generated; they are fruit of a life hidden in Christ. When we "put on the new self," we are not just improving our moral character, in fact, we are allowing Christ to live in us and through us. In short, we become Eucharistic people that are broken and shared for the life of the world.

To love like this requires grace. It is humanly impossible. That is why it must flow from a heart "hidden with Christ in God." The "old self" cannot love enemies. Only the new self, formed by the cross and nourished by the Eucharist, can do this. Lord, today I choose to put on compassion, humility, and patience.

The Gospel leaves no room for self-deception. It is not enough to know the teachings of Christ ... we must live them. We must build our lives on the rock of obedience, not just admiration. "Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord,' and do not do what I tell you?" The Gospel calls for response. Ask yourself: What am I building my life on? Each evening, examine your fruits: Are my words kind? Is my heart peaceful? Are my actions generous? What is forming the foundation of my decisions, my habits, my relationships?

Let the words of Colossians and Luke guide you into deeper conversion, so that when the storm comes, you may be found still standing – rooted in Christ, clothed in mercy, and overflowing with love.


### Gives Back!

For each donated car, truck or van, running or not, the Associated Vincentian Charities will give back to our parish \$75-\$200 per vehicle.



Pope Francis approved Acutis for sainthood in May 2024 after recognizing a second miracle attributed to him. The original canonization date of April 27, 2025, was postponed due to Pope Francis' death and later rescheduled for September 7 by his successor, Pope Leo XIV. Acutis will be canonized alongside another Italian layman, Pier Giorgio Frassati. Acutis, who died of leukemia at age 15 in 2006, is widely seen as a role model for young Catholics due to his strong devotion to the Eucharist and his use of technology to spread the faith online.

### St. Peter Claver




Saint Peter Claver (1580–1654) was a Spanish
Jesuit priest and missionary who dedicated
his life to ministering to enslaved Africans in
Cartagena, Colombia, providing them with
food, medicine, and spiritual comfort. He is
known as the "Slave of the Slaves" and the
patron saint of slaves, African missions, and
interracial justice. His feast day is
September 9, and he is remembered for his
tireless service and his efforts to uphold the
dignity of enslaved people during a period of
widespread exploitation.

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary
is a feast day on September 8th that celebrates
Mary's birth. While the Bible doesn't detail her
birth, Christian tradition holds she was born to
Saints Anne and Joachim, a couple blessed with

Mary would later become the mother
of Jesus, the Savior of the world

## ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

In 1972 Fr. Paul Marx, a Benedictine monk, established the Human Life Center, with the purpose of fighting against the spread of abortion and the concern about the breakdown of the family within the USA. The Center worked to train and organize leaders within the pro-life movement, including priests, family counselors, and those involved in crisis pregnancy centers. In 1981, Fr. Marx expanded this mission globally and the Human Life Center became known as Human Life International and spread to over 100 countries. About 40 years ago, Fr. Marx was the guest speaker at a pro-life affair and he mentioned two great concerns - couples were limiting the size of their families to one, maybe two children or none at all. The other concern was that abortion would hecome "institutionalized" in the USA and throughout the world. To many, not all, abortion is just another "procedure" like any other medical procedure. Through the use of the media and lies, the proabortion advocates successfully conducted a public relation ruse of focusing on women only, shutting out the fathers, never talking about the baby, never using the word "baby", and stifling pro-lifers who would offer a choice of life and help to the pregnant women. And now through the chemical abortion pills, the killing of the babies has increased, 3,000 babies today, 3,000 babies tomorrow and....? Tragically, Fr. Marx's concerns have come to fruition. Is abortion just another medical procedure? No, abortion is the intentional killing of the youngest, most vulnerable and innocent of our human family the babies in the womb waiting to be brought to birth. The good news is that there are many speaking, praying, and working to ensure that "abortion" does not continue "institutionalized" and one day it will be no more.

Please join with us each Thursday, from 3:00 -3:30, during weekly Adoration as we pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy and the Rosary of Our Lady for an end to abortion and the return to the dignity, respect and protection of all God's children from conception till natural death.

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
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
