Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today's readings encourage us to always praise and thank God, even in the midst of hardships. In the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Habakkuk, the people wonder how long they must suffer. They wonder if God hears them in their anguish. "How long O Lord? I cry for help, but you do not listen!" Then in the second reading from the Letter of St. Paul to Timothy, he exhorts Timothy and his people to remain steadfast in their faith. God has given them the power of love and self-control. should bear their hardship for the gospel with the "Guard this rich strength that comes from God. trust with the help of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us." And finally, Luke's gospel has the apostles asking Jesus to increase their faith. Jesus replies: "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you."

Life is full of hardships for most of us. I'm sure I don't have to tell you that. They arise from difficult relationships, money troubles, health issues. They come with employment challenges, mental or emotional issues, school situations, the consequences of bad choices, poor judgment, or even sin. Yes, life comes with all sorts of hardships, disappointments, burdens and tragedies, both large and small. This is not a part of faith that is very attractive; to bear our hardships for the sake of the Gospel. If I'm not willing to embrace the tough parts of this journey of faith, not willing to embrace the work involved, the sacrifices, the challenges, the self-emptying, the crosses; then can I really say that I am all in? Am I as committed as I should be? Do I only want a Christianity-lite that doesn't demand much. I just want to live a stream of Easters without a single Good Friday.

How many of us wonder, like Habakkuk says, if God is really listening when we are faced with sorrow, disappointment or a painful situation? Is God paying attention? Does he really care? Well, he does provide an answer, but it is one we don't like or accept. It is an answer perfectly on display on Calvary, that if it doesn't come quickly, we're to wait for it. But that is not easy. We want the good stuff now! We want the pain to go away, the problem to be solved, the worries to subside and the heartache to end now.

We don't want to wait, yet that is what lies at the heart of the Paschal Mystery. Everything unfolds in God's time, on his schedule. There was a waiting for that first Easter, a time of confusion, fear and sorrow. But Easter did come. The resurrection came. Salvation came. The Holy Spirit came. And all came in God's time and in the way that God saw fit. What we must do is simply forge ahead, do what is right, honor our promises to God and one another. God wants us to be kind, generous and loving no matter what is going on in our lives. God promises to be our strength at all times, especially when we are praying for Easter in the midst of a Good Friday. Walk by faith and not by sight. Believe that God will not disappoint.

Our parish's Religious Education Program began this past week. Students from 2nd grade through 8th grade were met by a dedicated group of teachers to begin this year's journey of faith formation. Our second graders will be preparing for the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion while the other grades continue to learn more about our Catholic Faith leading to the Sacrament of Confirmation in 9th grade. Later this month we will celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation for our current 9th graders. Let's pray for all these children and their teachers that Jesus will touch their lives with his loving grace this year.

Please take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to the Our Lady of Fatima Prayer Vigil on Tuesday evening at 7pm, the Come and See Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover, and invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great first week of October. Smile, share and always walk by faith and not by sight. Plus remember: Faith makes things possible, not easy.





Come & See

Summary of the Readings for the Week

For the Twenty-Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time, the First Reading is from the prophet Habakkuk (1:2–3; 2:2–4). The prophet cries out to God in the face of injustice and suffering, and God answers him with a call to patient faith, assuring that His promises will be fulfilled in due time. In the Gospel taken from Luke (17:5–10), the apostles implore Jesus, "Increase our faith," and He answers that even faith the size of a mustard seed can move mountains, then emphasizes that disciples must serve without presumption, for they are "unprofitable servants" who have only done what was commanded.



Tuesday is the Memorial of Our lady of the Rosary in which we reflect on Mary, as a model of faith who always directs believers to her son, Jesus Christ. As October is the Month of the Rosary, Mary encourages us to pray the Rosary, to meditate on the life of Christ through its mysteries, and to see the Rosary as a spiritual weapon to combat sin as well as increase in virtue and our good works.

Throughout this week's readings, the First Readings are drawn from the prophetic books of Jonah, Malachi, and Joel. Each passage invities us into a journey of faith, repentance, and trust in God's mercy.

Monday through Wednesday's First Readings focus on the prophet Jonah's story, which centers on God's mercy and the human response to divine calling. "Should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city?" (Jonah 4:11). Jonah's initial reluctance, the repentance of Nineveh, and Jonah's own struggle with God's compassion reveal the tension between judgment and mercy.

The Gospels for the week are taken from Luke which echo this call to mercy and active love, such as the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) urging us to love our neighbor without prejudice "Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" and the instruction to listen attentively to God's word: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing." (Luke 10:38-42). Together, these readings teach that obedience to God's call involves openness to mercy—both received and given.

Thursday's readings shift to Malachi's call for genuine faithfulness and trust in God's justice. The Gospel from Luke (11:1-4) in which Jesus teaches the disciples to pray to the Father (the "Our Father"), He reinforces this by encouraging persistent prayer and trusting in God's generosity, portraying God as a loving Father who responds to our needs. This combination invites us to deepen our relationship with God through faithfulness and persistent prayer, confident in His care and justice.

Friday's first reading from the book of Joel brings a sense of urgency to repentance and readiness for the coming "Day of the Lord." The Gospel presents Jesus warning against spiritual complacency and division, emphasizing the need for vigilance and wholehearted discipleship. This pairing challenges us to examine their spiritual lives honestly and to remain alert to God's transformative presence.

Saturday's first reading from the book of Joel continues the theme of God's judgment and vindication, promising blessings and restoration for the faithful. The Gospel concludes the week with Jesus affirming that true blessing comes from hearing and obeying God's word.

On the Twenty-Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time, we are presented with the disparity between the First Reading, in which Naaman, a foreigner healed of leprosy, comes to faith and gives thanks to God, while in the Gospel, Jesus heals ten lepers but only one, also a foreigner, returns in gratitude. These readings highlight that true faith is shown in our heartfelt thanksgiving in all circumstances.

Daily Prayer This Week

As I begin this week, Sunday's First Reading invites me to bring my honest questions and doubts before God, much like the prophet Habakkuk who lamented the injustices around him. This reminds me that faith does not require me to have all the answers, but to trust God's plan even when I cannot fully understand it.

In my morning prayer, I can entrust my uncertainties and the world's challenges to God, asking for the grace to live by faith and to see His vision unfold in my life and in the world.

Lord God, as I begin this day, I place my trust in Your mercy and faithfulness. Help me to live by faith, even when I do not understand everything. I bring my doubts to You, confident that Your justice will prevail.

The story of Jonah further calls me to reflect on obedience and God's abundant mercy. Even when I feel reluctant or unworthy, God continues to call me to repentance and transformation. Like the people of Nineveh, I am invited to turn back to God and open my heart to His mercy. Throughout my day, I can meditate on the power of conversion and renewal, seeking to live more fully in God's grace and compassion.

The midweek Gospels also invites me to embrace mercy and active love as central to my discipleship.


The parable of the Good Samaritan challenges me to extend compassion beyond my comfort zones and to embody God's mercy in concrete ways.

This theme encourages me to begin each day with a commitment to live out the Gospel in my interactions, seeing Christ in those I meet and serving without judgment or hesitation.

In the passage in which Jesus visits Martha and Mary, Mary's example, choosing "the better part" by listening attentively to Jesus, reminds me of the importance of quiet and attentive prayer amid the busyness of daily life. Each day, I can set aside moments to listen deeply ... to Scripture, to God's voice in my heart, and to the needs of those around me. This practice nurtures spiritual growth and strengthens my ability to respond faithfully to God's call.

Wednesday's Gospel (Luke 11:1-1) deepens this reflection by reminding me of the importance of prayer and persistence. Jesus' teaching on the Lord's Prayer and His encouragement to ask, seek, and knock with confidence inspire me to cultivate a persistent and trusting prayer life.

"Blessed rather are those who hear the word of God and obey it!"



In the evening, I can reflect on the day's moments of grace and difficulty, bringing all my needs and those of others to God with faith and perseverance.

Finally, both the First Readings and Gospels for the week emphasize that true blessing and peace come from hearing and obeying God's word.

As I close each day, I can meditate on the blessings of faithfulness and obedience, asking for the grace to live in harmony with God's will. This ongoing commitment shapes my life as a Catholic, grounding me in hope, love, and the joy of serving God and neighbor.



As Christians, we are called to spread the Gospel. Ask the Holy Spirit to enlighten your mind and help you to spread the Gospel. When we trust in God and do His will, we can be formed into powerful, confident missionaries.



During the Easter Vigil liturgy, the single flame of the Easter candle shines through the darkness. That small flame spreads as each person's candle is lit and the light of Christ is shared with others. Before we know it, the entire Church is ablaze with the warm glow of candlelight and the darkness has been vanquished.

We are each called by God to be that light of Christ that breaks through the darkness. We are called to be his disciples, continually transformed by our encounter with him and sharing in his mission. Jesus came that we might have life. Part of the impetus for the Eucharistic Revival was a concern that some Catholics do not believe. or at least do not understand, that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. Even though our human senses perceive bread and wine, the Eucharist is Jesus-body, blood, soul, and divinity. Similarly, many people do not realize or acknowledge the sanctity of human life when it is hidden in the womb. Both instances call for us to help others recognize these sacred gifts that may not be perceivable through our human senses. We need to help others understand that just because something may not be apparent to our eyes does not mean that it is not there or that it is not important.

We live in a society that rejects those who are weak, fragile, or vulnerable. Yet, it is precisely within these conditions that a person is most in "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

need of our care and protection. Pope Francis reminds us that "every child who, rather than being born, is condemned unjustly to being aborted, bears the face of Jesus Christ, bears the face of the Lord, who even before he was born, and then just after birth, experienced the world's rejection."1

The U.S. bishops have affirmed that, while it is important to address all the ways in which human life is threatened, "abortion remains our preeminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone."2

As Pope St. John Paul II wrote, "we are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life'. …we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life." 3

"I am with you always, until the end of the age." Matthew 28:20

In the face of challenges such as abortion and physician-assisted suicide, we may feel that we are not equal to the task of overcoming the darkness. Yet, we are not alone. Jesus tells us, "I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

The God who became man to save us still dwells among us. For Christ is "the light [that] shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). He is the one who overcame death and continually raises us to new life. He remains close to us always, seeking us out in each moment of our lives.

Jesus gave his very flesh to give us the gift of eternal life and invites us to the most profound

experience of this gift in our celebration of the Eucharist. When we meet Jesus in the Eucharist, this encounter has the power to change us. The Eucharist has the power to transform the depths of our hearts and the heart of our culture. United to the power of his Eucharistic Presence, may we work to ensure that each person has life-and has it in abundance.


