Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time! As the weather becomes cooler and the colors change, it is a beautiful time of year and one which is conducive to reflecting on our personal faith life. Where are our priorities? Do we place God first in our life? In the first reading from Isaiah, the path for the Israelites that led to God often got sidetracked by pride. When the veil of pride is removed, the earth will rejoice, and life will flourish once again because the people have put God's kingdom first. "This is the Lord for whom we looked to save us! This is the Lord for whom we looked; let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!" Then in the second reading from the Letter to the Philippians, Paul learned that his strength comes from God and that he will provide the faithful with all they need to live. "My God will fully supply whatever you need in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus." And finally, Matthew's gospel describes the dynamic of the kingdom of heaven. It is a story told in four stages. First there is a king giving a wedding feast for his son, but the invited guests refuse to come. Secondly, he sends out more invitations to those who also refuse and mistreat the messengers. The king is pretty mad now. Third he invites anyone he can find, both good and bad, to fill up the banquet hall. And fourthly, a man shows up underdressed and gets kicked out of the feast with a verse that gives a clue to the meaning of the parable: "Many are invited, but few are chosen."

Now at first reading, this parable seems to have a rather harsh ending. The king goes through various mood swings, from being happy to sad to enraged. What the ending means is that being invited to the banquet table in heaven does not imply free entrance. You don't just get in by showing up. The wedding garment symbolizes the moral preparedness a person needs to enter the kingdom of heaven. Now what is proper attire for entering God's kingdom? The proper attire is the interior one. Are we properly disposed to enter? It seems to me that a strong faith, and belief in God's presence in our daily lives is the best "dress of the day." What gets in the way of not being properly attired? Go back to pride which can really hinder a person's spiritual growth. Many of the world's problems and our own can be attributed to pride.

. Pride is like having blinders over our eyes. We get so used to having things our own way, our own preferences, that we forget about the needs of others. But it is never too late to change, to see the light of God's path, the one we are called to follow as Christians. The problems and crises that life throws at us every day can make changing our direction seem impossible at times. But don't stop! Deepen your faith in God's forgiveness and mercy. Let the Holy Spirit enter your life once more. So, prepare now for entering God's kingdom just as you prepare to receive Holy Communion. Open yourself to the healing power of the Real Presence of Jesus.

While this year's baseball season was a dud for the Mets and Yankees, and it looks like the football season is more of the same for the Giants and Jets, our parish's **CYO Basketball Program** is in full swing. The school gym is constantly being used for practices and soon the regular season games will commence. We wish all our teams well in this new season. May all who participate, play well, play fair, improve individually and as a team; and most of all have fun. **Just don't forget Sunday Mass comes first!** Thanks to all our coaches and CYO Staff who tirelessly give of themselves to make our program one of the finest in the diocese.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin each week when you leave Mass. It contains many items of interest and invitation with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from **Parish Social Ministry**, info from **Religious Education** (Faith Formation), the upcoming *Fall Ball* on November 4th for our young boys and their adult escorts, an ad for the 2023 Catholic Ministries Appeal, a request for Parishioner Emails to improve communication from the rectory, the *Eucharistic Revival Centerfold*, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover) an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand, and much more. 

The Dobbs Decision, which overturned Roe vs. Wade, returned the decision-making regarding abortion to each individual state. STATION TEN THE LAST SUPPER: PROMISES FULFILLED "AND HE TOOK BREAD, AND WHEN HE HAD GIVEN THANKS HE BROKE IT AND GAVE IT TO THEM, SAYING, 'THIS IS MY BODY.''' LUKE 22:19

This is the event to which all the previous stations have been leading. At the Passover meal Jesus established the New Covenant, the new priesthood, and the Bread of Life. We read in the Gospel of Saint Luke:

When the hour came, he took his place at table with the apostles. Then he took the bread said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them saying, "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me." And likewise, the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup is the New Covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you" (Lk. 22:14, 19-20).

What is the connection to Jesus?

Jesus makes the connection between Himself and the bread and the wine. The bread and wine become His Body, Blood,

Soul and Divinity. Saint Cyril of Jerusalem reflects:

Even of itself the teaching of the Blessed Paul is sufficient to give you a full assurance concerning those Divine Mysteries, of which having been deemed worthy, you have become of the same body and blood with Christ.

"For you have just heard him say distinctly, That our Lord Jesus Christ in the night in which He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks He broke it, and gave to His disciples, saying, Take, eat, this is My Body: and having taken the cup and given thanks, He said, Take, drink, this is My Blood. Since then He Himself declared and said of the Bread, This is My Body, who shall dare to doubt any longer? And since He has Himself affirmed and said, This is My Blood, who shall ever hesitate, saying, that it is not His blood?"

Each week, we will present another of the twelve stations for your meditation for the week.

Step By Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me By Father Luke Spannagel National Eucharist Revival Blog Altar Kiss

Have you noticed that, during the entrance hymn or antiphon, the celebrant approaches the altar and kisses it? As a sign of veneration, the priest and deacon kiss the altar. The altar symbolizes the heart of the Church. It is the Lord's table and the center of the Eucharistic action. It has always been considered a symbol of Christ. That is why we cover the altar with a cloth, out of reverence for the celebration of the memorial of the Lord's sacrifice.

Altars typically also have a special set-in stone that contains the relic of a saint. The relic is usually a small bone fragment from one of the martyrs or perhaps a saint. The tradition of the relic can be traced back to the first centuries of Masses celebrated at the burial places of the martyrs or in the catacombs.

The word "altar" comes from the Hebrew word meaning "place of sacrifice." Throughout the Old Testament, altars were erected in special places where the people had an encounter with God, which then became places of prayer. In our churches, the altar is where the Sacrifice of the Mass is celebrated, and we encounter Christ truly present in the Eucharist. We call the Mass a sacrifice because we are given an opportunity to share in the one perfect sacrifice of Jesus on the cross. Jesus Christ -body, blood, soul, and divinity-becomes present during the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass. To kiss the altar is to kiss Christ. As you may realize, kissing the altar is more than a simple gesture!

Saints Who Promoted the Eucharistic St. John Paul II († 2005) Feast: October 22

A French novelist once wrote, "Tell me what you love, and I will tell you who you are." Although there are countless ways to study Saint John Paul the Great, the most direct route is by entering the man's heart. Between 5:00 and 5:30 a.m. - and sometimes as early as 4:00 - Pope John Paul II would arise each morning, keeping virtually the same schedule he had as the bishop of Kraków. Although he enjoyed watching the sunrise, the main reason for his early start was to make time for prayer. He prayed the Rosary prostrate on the floor or kneeling, followed by his personal prayers, and would then go to the chapel to prepare for 7:30 Mass. According to his press secretary, Joaquín Navarro-Valls, his sixty to ninety minutes of private prayer before Mass were the best part of his day.

During the celebration of the Eucharist, one observer noticed, "He lingered lovingly over every syllable that recalled the Last Supper as if the words were new to him." Then, after the moment of Consecration, he would genuflect before Christ's presence on the altar with tremendous reverence. After Mass, a lengthy time of thanksgiving followed before the Holy Father greeted guests and gave each of them a Rosary.

The Eucharist was the principal reason for his priesthood. He said, "For me, the Mass constitutes the center of my life and my every day." He added, "nothing means more to me or gives me greater joy than to celebrate Mass each day and to serve God's people in the Church." John Paul didn't merely offer the Mass. He lived it. Like the Eucharist itself, he became an immolation of love – a living sacrifice offered to the Father for the salvation of mankind. Because of his deep faith in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, he was adamant with priests and bishops about how the Mass ought to be celebrated.




