

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today's readings challenge us to follow leaders who live by the divine covenant, honoring God's law, and leading by serving. In the first reading from the prophet, Malachi, the people of Israel are told that if they seek to restore their homeland, they need to hear what God has to say. Even though they have returned from exile they still need direction to grow in the rich, strong faith tradition of their ancestors. Failure to give good direction is rebuked by God and the challenge is issued to the priest to respect the covenant. "Have we not all one father? Has not the one God created us? Why then do we break faith with one another, violating the covenant of our fathers?" Then in the second reading from 1 Thessalonians, Paul preaches but also works so as not to be a burden to anyone. And he is grateful that the community listens and believes in the word of God. "And for this reason, we give thanks to God unceasingly, that, in receiving the word of God from hearing us, you received not a human word but, as it truly is, the word of God which is now at work in you who believe." And finally, in Matthew's gospel we have Jesus strongly denouncing the scribes and Pharisees. He says not to follow their example for they lay heavy burdens on the people, but do not help them. After criticizing these religious leaders, he then gives a strong piece of advice. "The greatest among you must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled and whoever humbles himself will be exalted."

One conclusion to be made from today's readings is that it is not always wise to follow any leader blindly. Good leaders demonstrate integrity, good communication, commitment, servanthood, and enthusiasm. Godly leaders should be preaching and teaching the ways of God and living by the ways of God that they teach. Jesus is quick to point out when leaders seek their own fame and glory. That's when he speaks of being humble in service to others. Of course, this is modeled by Jesus' very own life. Simply getting in line can be dangerous. As Christians we follow Jesus Christ. He alone shows us a good and perfect example for living. We all have examples in our lives of others who have given us godly examples for living, from parents and grandparents to teachers, coaches, saints and world and Church leaders. Actually, we are all called to be leaders of some type. As such we should be a leader who lives by God's ways, treating everyone fairly and with justice, serving others with love

Moms and dads lead their children. Siblings lead their younger brothers and sisters. Employees lead their employees as well as teachers leading their students and coaches leading their teams. We all need to pay attention to the opportunities we have to lead others in Jesus' way of love and service. Maybe try starting to do so this week.

On Monday evening, November 13th, there will be a special Holy Hour starting at 7:30pm in the church. This Holy Hour will be dedicated to praying for peace in our world. With so much suffering and death occurring because of war, it would be a good time to gather in prayerful reflection to ask for the peace of Jesus Christ to touch the hearts of all people so that war and the evil that war brings upon a nation's land and people will stop. There will be Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, reflection, scripture, music and Benediction to help guide our prayer. So, consider joining together on the 13th to pray for peace.



CATECHISM

SECTION 2 / CHAPTER 1 / ARTICLE 3 PARAGRAPHS 1322 -1327

"The sacrament of the Eucharist the Holy Eucharist completes Christian initiation those who have been raised to the Dignity of the royal priesthood by baptism and configured more deeply to Christ by confirmation participate with the whole community in the Lord's own Sacrifice by means of the Eucharist.

At the Last Supper on the night he was betrayed Our Savior instituted the Eucharistic sacrifice of his body and blood this he did in order to perpetuate the sacrifice of the Cross throughout the ages until he should come again and so to entrust to his beloved spouse the church a memorial of his death and Resurrection a sacrament of love a sign of unity a bond of Charity a Paschal banquet in which Christ is consumed the mind is filled with grace and a pledge of future glory is given to us.

The Eucharist is the source and Summit of the Christian Life the other sacraments and indeed all ecclesiastical Ministries and works of the apostolate are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it for in the Blessed Eucharist is contained at the whole spiritual good of the church namely Christ himself our Pasch.

The Eucharist is the efficacious sign and Sublime cause of that communion in the Divine life and that Unity of the people of God by which the church is kept in being it is the culmination both of God's actions sanctifying the world in Christ and of the worship men offered to Christ and through him to the Father in the Holy Spirit.

Finally, by the Eucharistic celebration we already unite ourselves with the Heavenly liturgy and anticipate eternal life when God will be all in all.

In brief, the Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith: Our way of thinking is attuned to the Eucharist and the Eucharist in turn confirms our way of thinking."

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST ADAPTED FROM THE "CATECHISM IN A YEAR" ASCENSION PRESS PODCAST FR. MIKE SCHMIDT

Fr. Mike Schmidt's Commentary on 1322-1327 (excerpts)

The Eucharist is a "who" ... this is Jesus but also is an action. It's the great sacrifice of Jesus, the Son of God, to the Father and the power of the Holy Spirit. We've been looking at the sacraments of Christian initiation and the Holy Eucharist completes Christian initiation. If you have all three of these: Baptism, Confirmation, and the Holy Eucharist, you're fully initiated. Those who have been raised to the Dignity of the royal priesthood by Baptism and configured more deeply to Christ by Confirmation, participate with the whole community in the Lord's own Sacrifice by means of the Eucharist. Why? Because it's all of Jesus being offered. Not only Christ, the head, being offered but Christ's whole body being offered. Christ's body is truly in the Eucharist and also Christ's body in the Church. You're a member of Christ's body. When we are fully initiated into the church through Baptism, we are able to join in offering up that great sacrifice of the Eucharist of the Son to the Father and the power of the Holy Spirit.

I love the very poetic words of Sacrosanum Concilium (Vatican II document) that describes the Eucharist as a sacrament of love. It's a sign of unity, a bond of charity, a Paschal banquet in which Christ is consumed and the mind is filled with grace and a pledge of future glory is given to us. This is not just incredible because we realize it is a sacrament of love. Why? Because here is Jesus, on night before he died, knowing that all was fulfilled saying: I've longed to eat this Passover with you. Then, He takes bread and said, take and eat, this is my body given for you. Taking the chalice filled with the fruit of the vine, He says, take and drink, all of you, this is the chalice of my blood. The blood of the new and eternal Covenant which will be poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.

The Eucharist is a sign of unity, and we can only be admitted to the Eucharist if we're in communion with the Church. If we step out of communion with the Church, then we're not able to have this Sacrament as it's a precondition that you be in union with your Bishop, who is in Union with the Holy Father.

The Penitential Act

After the priest's greeting and people's response at the beginning of the Mass, we next share in the Penitential Act. During the entrance rite, we recall that we are in the presence of God. If we are truly sincere in realizing that God (who is all-holy) is in our midst, then we recognize the need for purification. We recognize that when we encounter God, we must draw near with a pure heart. So, we take a moment of silence to call to mind our sins and failings, and we ask the Lord to forgive and heal us. After our time of silence, the priest (or deacon) leads the community in praying one of three possible prayers.

This honest look inside ourselves during the Penitential Act helps us to be aware of our sin and, most importantly, our need for God to help us overcome sin. In a very practical way, this brief reflection recalls the places in our lives where we know we need Christ more. If you haven't yet thought of an intention to join with the priest's offering of the Mass, this might be a great time to ask specifically for help in overcoming a particular sin or perhaps further healing from the effects of previous sins. We believe that the Mass is our most powerful prayer together because Jesus himself is truly present and we are joining together with Him in the perfect worship of God the Father. In the Mass we take part in the one perfect sacrifice of the Cross where Christ offered Himself so that our sins could be forgiven.

Saints Who Promoted the Eucharistic

St. Martin de Porres Lay Brother († 1639)

Feast: November 3

St. John XXIII gave a brief summary of the secret to St. Martin de Porres' holiness during his canonization ceremony. "The example of Martin's life is ample evidence that we can strive for holiness and salvation as Christ Jesus has shown us: first, by loving God with all our heart, with all our soul, and with all our mind; and second, by loving our neighbor as ourselves."

"When Martin had come to realize that Christ Jesus suffered for us and that he carried our sins on his body to the cross, he would meditate with remarkable ardor and affection about Christ on the cross. Whenever he would contemplate Christ's terrible torture he would be reduced to tears. He had an exceptional love for the great sacrament of the Eucharist and often spent long hours in prayer before the blessed sacrament. His desire was to receive the sacrament in communion as often as he could."

Pope Benedict XVI, then-Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, explained that St. Martin de Porres recognized the Lord in the tabernacle and the needy: "Martin lived from the adoration of the Lord present in the Eucharist, passing entire nights in prayer before the crucified Lord in the tabernacle, while during the day he tirelessly cared for the sick and assisted the socially outcast and despised, with whom he, as a mulatto, identified because of his origins."

If we want to be like St. Martin de Porres, we should foster a deep devotion to the Eucharist and then, fed by that celestial food, go out into the world, and love our neighbors.

St. Martin de Porres: "Always consider others as more holy and more worthy than you, at the same time strive to be as holy as you can be."

household items and other services they needed.


Also, if you are a senior citizen, living within Parish





No walk ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from Father Chuck.








Communal Prayer Before Mass
