No matter in what language from English to the languages of our priest friends from other countries, Merry Christmas is a truly universal greeting. From Christmas Eve through Midnight Mass and all Christmas Day, no matter where you live or happen to be, the Christmas story is being loudly proclaimed. And no matter what difficulties our world faces, if you are Christian, you have to grapple a bit on how best to respond to the Christmas story. It is a gift giving time as we all receive gifts on someone else's birthday- namely that of Jesus Christ! But any gifts we may receive pale in comparison to the gift of Jesus, being born into this world and becoming our Lord, Savior and King.



## The First Reading

After spending some time reflecting on the Liturgy of the Word as a whole, this week we begin looking more closely at each part, beginning with the First Reading. We might hear the lector proclaim, "A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah. In the days of Ahaz, king of Judah, son of Jotham, son of Uzziah, Rezin, king of Aram, and Pekah, king of Israel, son of Remaliah..." (Isaiah 7:1-9). With all these names, which many of us may not even know how to pronounce, we might wonder: Why do we use the Old Testament at Mass, anyway?

#### The First Reading

As we said earlier, the First Reading at Mass is generally from the Old Testament. When we hear the stories of the Old Testament, we hear about how God called and began to form his people. If you are familiar with the Old Testament, you know there are times of faithfulness and falling away. There are prophets, judges, and other leaders that help call the people back to faithfulness. There are times where God is clearly directly involved and times where he seems to be more in the background. We learn about God's faithfulness, even in the midst of our unfaithfulness. I am often struck by that faithfulness of God: we know we don't deserve it, and yet there he is, consistently loving, forgiving, leading, providing, and protecting, doing all the things that good fathers do for their beloved children. Hopefully, as we hear those words each week, they remind us we can always go to our loving God and Father.

As we reflected before, generally when we talk about the Old Testament, we talk about a preparation. Through Moses, the prophets, and other writers, God was preparing his people (and us) to receive the truth about Jesus-that he truly is the Messiah who came to set us free from sin and death so that we might live with the Father forever. The Old and New Testament work together: the Old prepares for the New, and the New tells us what we've been waiting for, namely, Jesus Christ (cf. Dei Verbum, no. 15). understand their meaning, even from a reading about a most unusual topic!

## The Family of God



But why do we need all those names? The whole Bible, even parts we don't understand or that don't seem helpful, is part of God's precious word to his people. Just as every particle of the Body of Christ is precious, so too is every word (and name) of the Bible. Sometimes the readings may seem "obscure" to us because we don't understand the ancient cultures of the Middle East. Sometimes they just mildly hint at one of the great mysteries of God and their importance can be easily overlooked. Sometimes we stumble over the names or we don't understand the poetic language. Nevertheless, we can be sure that if we do our best, the Holy Spirit will give us enough capacity to grasp whatever we may need for our sanctification and mission in life. And even if what we have read [or heard] does not stay in our memory, the Word of God has purified and nourished our souls.

We might think that the names aren't that important, but what they show us is a continuous string of people who are in relationship with God, an ongoing family which the Lord is building over time. Just like we remember the names of our grandparents and great-grandparents because they are part of our family tree, so too do we remember the names of these people who in some way had (and still have) an important part to play in God's family tree. As the Church teaches, "Christians should accept with veneration these writings which give expression to a lively sense of God, which are a storehouse of sublime teaching on God and of sound wisdom on human life, as well as a wonderful treasury of prayers; in them, too, the mystery of our salvation is present in a hidden way" (Dei Verbum, no. 15).

#### For Reflection:

In light of the insights on the significance of names and genealogy in the Old Testament, revisit Jesus' genealogy in Matthew 1:1-17 and/or Luke 3:23-38. Recall what you know about any of the persons whose names feature in these genealogies. For any names you do not recognize, pause and invite the Lord to help you see more clearly how he accomplishes his work through men and women throughout salvation history.

What is the meaning behind "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"? Shrouded in powerful imagery and mystery, this beloved hymn is more than a festive song.

In a season where our music is filled with high-spirited festivity, upbeat rhythms, and clichéd images of wreaths and pretty wrapping paper, the haunting melody and archaic imagery of the beloved Advent hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel stand out sharply. The distinctly biblical feel of the lyrics differs from the more overtly celebratory tone of most carols, and the actual Nativity narrative doesn't appear in its usual way.

Rather, O Come, O Come, Emmanuel draws from Old Testament imagery of the coming Messiah, creating a hymn that feels anticipatory, prophetic, and timeless. Its incessant cries of "O Come!" echo our own hearts' desperate cries for a Messiah, making it a beautiful Advent hymn. Although a classic and well-known hymn, the history of O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is surprisingly shrouded in mystery. Who wrote the lyrics?

It is difficult to attribute the lyrics to any one writer. Originally written in Latin around the 7th or 8th centuries, these verses are actually part of the Divine Office. They are a rendering of the Greater Advent Antiphons, also called the "O" Antiphons based on the initial letter of each. These are sung at the Magnificat during Vespers (Evening Prayer) from December 17th through December 23rd. These special antiphons are verses extracted from the Old Testament that express our longing for the coming of the Christ. In fact, the word "come" is used in every O Antiphon. Once combined with the stunning and easily-recognizable tune, John Mason Neale's translation of the Latin text turned the verses into a perennial festive favorite. Who wrote the music?

The haunting melody of O Come, O Come, Emmanuel has its roots as far back as 15th-century France, with a rather uncertain history. It wasn't until the 1960s that musicologist and nun Mary Berry sourced the 15thcentury manuscript that bore the tune's building blocks, finding it among many others used for processional chants for burials. "So they went in haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger." Luke 2:16



So the actual composer of the music for one of the world's most popular carols is enigmatically anonymous. O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is a hymn that transforms the atmosphere of every space where it is heard, as well as the hearts of those who prayerfully listen to its beautiful biblical cries for the Savior we all so desperately need.



## The Eucharist, Christmas & the Manger

St. Luke places an extremely high value on the Eucharist, and it is a major point of emphasis woven into the fabric of his Gospel from beginning to end. He artfully inserts a curious detail into his birth account to begin to state his case: Mary "gave birth to her firstborn son ... and laid him in a manger" (Lk 2:7). The manger is mentioned twice more in verses 12 and 16. The shepherds represent people everywhere, and as the animals approached the manger for food, the shepherds approached the manger to feast their eyes upon Jesus, and the infant in the manger would be the one to feed their souls, both with his word and the Eucharist, the great banquet feast of his Body and Blood.

The manger on Christmas anticipates the table at the Last Supper, and as the owner of the animals made sure that his animals would be well-fed to provide for their physical health, the infant Jesus would feed his sheep to provide for their spiritual health. The infant in the manger would be the one who would take bread and say, "This is my body" (Lk 22:19), and a cup of wine and say, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood" (Lk 22:20). And wanting to provide ongoing spiritual sustenance, he told his disciples to "Do this in memory of me" (Lk 22:19b). Then Jesus showed them how to reenact the Eucharist when he broke bread with two of his disciples on Easter Sunday night at Emmaus (Lk 24:30).

Most religious artists portray the infant Jesus in the manger on a bed of hay or straw, but those who grasp the Eucharist connection show him on a bed of wheat.


