Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time! The purpose of today's readings is to impress upon us that a wise approach to the impending arrival of God's kingdom is not an anxious hyper-vigilance, but rather a consistent dedication to doing God's will. In the first reading from the Book of Wisdom, it is pointed out that those who wish to rule wisely will put God first in their lives, like King Solomon did. That is true wisdom: "Resplendent and unfading is wisdom, and she is readily perceived by those who love her and found by those who seek her." Then in the second reading from 1 Thessalonians, Paul assures the community of faith that all who have died in Jesus Christ will rise at the coming of the Lord. "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep." And finally, Matthew's gospel points to what the kingdom of heaven will be like when Jesus comes the second time. The story has ten virgins waiting for the bridegroom to arrive for a wedding. Five are prepared and five are not. When the bridegroom is delayed, they all fall asleep. When he finally arrived only the five virgins who had brought extra oil for their lamps were ready to greet him. The ten virgins stand for members of the Church with Jesus as the bridegroom. When the five foolish ones are locked out of the wedding feast, they plead to be let in, but it is too late, and the bridegroom doesn't even recognize them. The message of the story is to stay awake and be prepared for Jesus' coming so that he won't say to us: "Amen I say to you, I do not know you. Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

We have all experienced times when we were unprepared for something, either through our own fault or because of unexpected circumstances. Now in today's parable, Jesus is very up front with whom we should identify with. With the choice between "wisdom" or "foolishness" it is really a no brainer. True wisdom does not mean constant vigilance is needed. All the virgins fell asleep waiting for the bridegroom. Watching is more than just staying awake. You can be watchful and still sleep peacefully. Wisdom tells us that readiness for Jesus' unpredictable future arrival involves preparation here and now. And it's more than simply an attitude of readiness and calling out for admittance. We are called to be ready by actively advancing God's kingdom here and now in our daily lives. Remember that the present moment is both a gift and an obligation. Being prepared means we can enjoy the blessings that life provides. Doing God's will in the present will give us enough oil to meet God's future.

As the saying somewhat goes: "A word to the wise should be sufficient."

This Monday evening, November 13th, starting at 7:30pm there will be a special Holy Hour for Peace in St. Raymond Church. Between the war in the Mideast and in Ukraine, plus all the other troubled places in the world, the cry for peace seems to be most needed throughout humankind. This Holy Hour is an opportunity to gather in prayerful reflection in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (the prince of Peace) to pray for the kind of peace that only Jesus can give. It is a peace, not of this world, but for this world and as such praying is our way to ask for the peace of Jesus to be with all who suffer from war and all its horrible effects on people. There will be Exposition, scripture, reflection, music and Benediction during this time. Come and join to unite in faith and hope so that peace will come to our world.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education. an order form for the special One Year Memorial Candles, an ad and order form for the Countdown to Christmas Raffle (order your tickets soon), an order form for the Christmas Plant *Sale*, an invitation to the Bereavement Ministry's gathering for a discussion on "Coping with the Holidays" on Thursday evening, November 16th, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover of the bulletin), invitations to join both the Adult *Choir* and the *Folk Group*, an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great week. Smile, share, keep alert and prepared. Plus remember: Don't raise your kids to have more than you had. Raise them to be more than you were. God bless always. -Father Chuck



II. WHAT IS THE SACRAMENT CALLED? SECTION 2 / CHAPTER 1 / ARTICLE 3 PARAGRAPHS 1328 -1332

1328 The inexhaustible richness of this sacrament is expressed in the different names we give it. Each name evokes certain aspects of it. It is called: Eucharist because it is an action of thanksgiving to God. the Greek words "eucharistein" and "eulogein" recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim - especially during a meal - God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification.

1329 The Lord's Supper, because of its connection with the supper which the Lord took with his disciples on the eve of his Passion and because it anticipates the wedding feast of the Lamb in the heavenly Jerusalem. The Breaking of Bread, because Jesus used this rite, part of a Jewish meat when as master of the table he blessed and distributed the bread, above all at the Last Supper. It is by this action that his disciples will recognize him after his Resurrection, and it is this expression that the first Christians will use to designate their Eucharistic assemblies; by doing so they signified that all who eat the one broken bread, Christ, enter into communion with him and form but one body in him.

The Eucharistic assembly (synaxis), because the Eucharist is celebrated amid the assembly of the faithful, the visible expression of the Church.

1330 The memorial of the Lord's Passion and Resurrection. The Holy Sacrifice, because it makes present the one sacrifice of Christ the Savior and includes the Church's offering. The terms holy sacrifice of the Mass, "sacrifice of praise," spiritual sacrifice, pure and holy sacrifice are also used, since it completes and surpasses all the sacrifices of the Old Covenant.

The Holy and Divine Liturgy, because the Church's whole liturgy finds its center and most intense expression in the celebration of this

sacrament: in the same sense we also call its celebration the Sacred Mysteries. We speak of the Most Blessed Sacrament because it is the Sacrament of sacraments. the Eucharistic species reserved in the tabernacle are designated by this same name.

1331 Holy Communion, because by this sacrament we unite ourselves to Christ, who makes us sharers in his Body and Blood to form a single body. We also call it: the holy things (ta hagia; sancta) - the first meaning of the phrase "communion of saints" in the Apostles' Creed - the bread of angels, bread from heaven, medicine of immortality,151 viaticum.... 1332 Holy Mass (Missa), because the liturgy in which the mystery of salvation is accomplished concludes with the sending forth (missa) of the faithful, so that they may fulfill God's will in their daily lives.

Fr. Mike Schmitz's Commentary on 1328-1332 (excerpts)

In the Old Testament there were many kinds of sacrifices: atonement, petition, and thanksgiving. The rabbis said that, in the age of the Messiah, all sacrifices will cease except for one: Eucharistic sacrifice. The Church also calls the Eucharist the "Lord's Supper" because Jesus established it at the breaking of the bread.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus appears to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They recognize Him in the breaking of the bread and the Church has always interpreted that as the Eucharist. In the Acts of the Apostle (2:24), it says the disciples devoted themselves to the Apostles' teaching to the communal life to the breaking of bread and to the prayers. This breaking of the bread doesn't just mean they ate meals together, it's code essentially for the Eucharist and the Mass, the Eucharistic assembly. It's called the Eucharistic assembly because it's the whole Church that offers up the Eucharist. It is the memorial of the Lord's passion and Resurrection. We remember what Jesus has done, not simply recalling something, but we are there once again so it's the memorial of the Lord's passion and Resurrection.



The Penitential Act has three different forms. Form A, the Confiteor, begins with the words: "I confess to Almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters..." This prayer helps us to express sorrow for faults we have committed in word and in action. We humbly acknowledge that we have done wrong and that we have sometimes failed to do good. Then, recognizing that we all need help, we ask the intercession of our Blessed Mother, all the other saints, and our brothers and sisters around us. Within the text of the Roman Missal, we are instructed to strike the breast during the words "through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault" (corresponding to the three "mea culpa" phrases of the Latin version). Throughout the Bible, striking the breast is a gesture of humility and sorrow for sins.

Form B is less frequently practiced, and the presider prays, "Have mercy on us, O Lord," and the people respond, "For we have sinned against you." The presider continues, "Show us, O Lord, your mercy," and the people again respond, "And grant us your salvation." This form, the ending of which recalls Psalm 85:8, acknowledges that we have sinned and asks for the Lord's love and mercy.

For Form C, the Missal provides eight suggestions for use in the United States, involves the repetition of the words: "Lord have mercy... Christ have mercy... Lord have mercy." Each verse of this form begins with a statement of acknowledgement about Jesus, called a trope, usually about his mission (e.g., "you came to call sinners") or his person (e.g., "you are Mighty God and Prince of Peace"). These short verses help remind us of who Jesus is and what he does for us.

Saints Who Promoted the Eucharistic St. Margaret of Scotland Lay Woman († 1093) Feast: November 16

Margaret was born a princess in Hungary around 1046 and, after her father's exile, spent much of her youth in the court of her uncle, the English king, Edward the Confessor, also canonized a saint. During the Norman invasion, Margaret's family fled from William the Conqueror and ended up shipwrecked on the coast of Scotland. King Malcolm of Scotland took them in and fell in love with Margaret. They were married in 1070. Margaret used her position of great influence to promote her concern with and ministry to the poor. the orphaned, the widowed, and the sick. In loving and honoring the poor, she was loving and honoring Christ. This included washing their feet and serving them food. She built schools and hospitals and spent time each day listening to the needs of the people in the outer court of the castle. Despite her many duties in the court and for her family, Margaret was perpetually faithful to prayer and the sacraments, especially the celebration of the Mass, which was most important to her.

Margaret's most significant reform was her success in bringing the practices of the Scottish church, still under the influences of Celtic Christianity, into line with those of the Roman Church. One of her reforms had to do with recognizing the centrality of the Eucharist in the lives of Christians. Many of the Scottish clergy felt themselves unworthy to receive the Eucharist on Easter.

To this attitude she responded "Shall all who are sinners not taste that holy mystery? No one therefore ought to receive it, for there is not one who is not stained with sin; not even the infant whose life is but one day on earth. And if no one ought to receive it, why did the Lord when he proclaimed the Gospel say, except ye shall eat the flesh of the Son of Man, and drink his blood, ye shall not have life in you." 




