

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the **Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time!** And Happy Father's Day to all our Dads. Thank you for all you do for us and especially for loving our Mothers. Our readings today talk about the kingdom of God, how it is established, how it grows and how it will reach fulfillment. In the first reading from Ezekiel, the prophet uses the image of a cedar tree to prophesy that God will restore Israel under a new king from the line of David. "And all the trees of the field shall know that I, the Lord, bring low the high tree, and make the withered tree bloom." Then in the second reading from 2 Corinthians, Paul encourages the people in their faith to keep steadfast with their sight set on the kingdom and being with God in eternity. "We are always courageous, although we know that while home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight." And finally in Marks' gospel, Jesus tells two parables about the kingdom of God. In both parables there is a contrast between small or humble beginnings and great conclusions. There is also an element of mystery. There is planting and harvesting with slow and often unseen growth taking place in between. The mustard seed graphically shows how the kingdom starts and comes to be. "But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade."

All of us probably want the best things in our life to grow. We like the number of our friends to grow, and we like it when the bottom line of our bank accounts and investments grows. We like it when we exercise and eat smartly, and our health gets better as our looks grow healthier in the mirror as a result. And we like it when relationships we are in grow deeper and more lasting. Yes, we like it when the best sort of things grow into something more than they were before. It seems to be the same for Jesus with the kingdom. He describes how the kingdom will develop and grow from something the size of a mustard seed into something much larger and grander. It seems that the point Jesus makes is that from almost nothing something wonderful can blossom. From little can come much; from the invisible can come something visible and beautiful, helpful and necessary.



Now it sure seems that God will do everything, making sure the seed is sown and watered, the ground nourished, the sun shining so that the kingdom will then grow in great and wondrous ways. Seems pretty fine to me, right? I get to sit on the sidelines and watch God do his thing. But not really. Everything doesn't seem to happen as God wants it. He doesn't stop us from hurting one another. We poison the planet and God doesn't heal it. People who are starving aren't fed by God. Justice doesn't come to everyone treated unfairly. It seems obvious to me that God doesn't want his kingdom to grow on its own. He ushered it in, yes, and the seeds were planted by the death and resurrection of Jesus. The world has been made new, but it can be made better if we cooperate in all its growth. God wants us to be co-creators of this beautiful world, the beautiful kingdom he wants for all of us. This is how God shows how much he loves and respects us. And there are no limits to what is possible. The little we have can make real differences in the lives of others. What can we grow in? How about kindness, compassion, forgiveness and generosity for starters. The seeds are there, and God's help is always there for us to tap. But he wants our openness and willingness to also grow into much more than we would ever expect.

At the recent Parish Blood Drive, 64 pints of blood were donated by parishioners. While not as many pints as usual were donated, whatever is donated is most necessary and appreciated. Thanks to all who donated blood and thanks to our Parish Blood Drive Committee for sponsoring this event once again. Look forward to our next Parish Blood drive in October.

To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.






FATHER'S DAY NOVENA



The Prayer over the Offerings

Our next "stop" in this journey through the Mass is the Prayer over the Offerings. Similar to what we saw with the Collect at the beginning of Mass, the Prayer over the Offerings gives us a summary of our offering and points our minds and hearts to the coming Eucharistic Prayer. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal says, "Once the offerings have been placed on the altar and the accompanying rites completed, by means of the invitation to pray with the Priest and by means of The Prayer over the Offerings, the Preparation of the Gifts is concluded and preparation made for the Eucharistic Prayer. At Mass, a single Prayer over the Offerings is said, and it ends with the shorter conclusion, that is: Through Christ our Lord. If, however, the Son is mentioned at the end of this prayer, the conclusion is: Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. The people, joining in this petition, make the prayer their own by means of the acclamation Amen" (GIRM, 77).

Offering Prayers, Receiving Graces

What are we praying about at this point in the Mass? Generally speaking, if we look through these prayers, we find the following familiar words: prayers, gifts, offerings, sacrifices, and oblations. We also ask God to sanctify, accept, and transform these gifts. Fleshing out the content of these Prayers over the Offerings, Charles Belmonte, author of Understanding the Mass, writes, "we usually acknowledge our incapacity to offer to God gifts adequate to his goodness and power. We ask God to accept what we offer with sincerity. We ask some grace in connection with the mystery celebrated on that particular day, in return for the material gifts. We notice an ascending or upward-striving rhythm in the progress of the liturgical action. If we contrast this prayer with the Collect, we can perceive an increase in fervor and assurance. We know that our gifts to God will be returned to us multiplied a hundredfold" (p. 116).

Hearing mention of sacrifice, we recall one of the great truths about the Mass: it truly is the one sacrifice of Christ. In the Mass, the perfect sacrifice of Christ on the Cross is re-presented to us. In the traditional understanding of a sacrifice, we need a priest, a victim/offering, and an altar. For Christ's perfect sacrifice, Jesus is both the priest and victim/offering; that is, he offers himself in sacrifice on the altar of the cross. The Mass is our access to that sacrifice and its many fruits. How amazing: the sacrifice of Jesus is right there before us. No wonder the Mass is such a powerful prayer!

Uniting Our Offerings with Christ's Sacrifice

Of course, we are not just spectators at the Mass; we don't just sit back and watch what Jesus does. We have been invited to take part and to unite with Christ in offering our own sacrifices. As we have been reflecting on this part of the Mass, we are able to join our prayers and offerings to the perfect offering of Jesus. As Charles Belmonte says, "St. Paul exhorted the first Christians to offer every action to God. 'Whatever you eat, whatever you drink, whatever you do at all, do it for the glory of God' (1 Cor. 10:31), and never say or do anything except 'in the name of the Lord Jesus' (Col 3:17). The Second Vatican Council [in the Constitution on the Church, Lumen Gentium, 34] encourages ordinary Christians to make their daily offering united to the [E]ucharistic sacrifice: For all their works, prayers and apostolic endeavors, their ordinary married and family life, if patiently borne-all these become 'spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ' (1 Pet. 2:5). Together with the offering of the Lord's body, they are most fittingly offered in the celebration of the Eucharist" (Understanding the Mass, p. 116-117). Belmonte goes on to suggest that we make offerings to God each day as an anticipation of joining in this Prayer over the Offerings. If you are up for it, I invite you to consider his challenge. Resolve to make offerings each day this coming week, and then bring those offerings to be spiritually joined to the sacrifice of the Mass on Sunday. Hopefully, you will experience deeper union with Jesus, especially the next time you are at the Mass!

For Reflection:

During the Prayer over the Offerings, unite your sacrifices of the past day(s) with Christ's sacrifice on the altar.

St. Joseph's Example for Fathers for Adoration Excerpts from National Catholic Register

Indisputably, St. Joseph is the epitome of Eucharistic devotion. Being the quintessential example of devotion to Our Lord, St. Joseph naturally becomes the perfect model of Eucharistic devotion for fathers today to follow, especially during the National Eucharistic Revival. St. Joseph's name is remembered in the Eucharistic Prayer at every Mass, and he has long been closely tied to the Eucharist.

Theologian Scott Hahn explains the foundation this way: "St. Joseph was, with Mary, the first to take up the practice of perpetual adoration. He was with Jesus, loving him, all the time – at home, in the workshop, in the synagogue, on the road. He teaches us to live in the presence of God at all times, and he shows us how to pray when we are in the Eucharistic presence of Our Lord."

St. Joseph models and teaches us Eucharistic adoration in many ways, expounded Father Jeffrey Kirby, the pastor of Our Lady of Grace parish in Indian Land, SC. "Joseph was the first to see the Christ Child when he was born from his mother. As he held the Christ Child in his arms, he made the first Holy Hour. As he showed the Christ Child to Our Lady, he was the first to announce the Eucharistic Lord to the world.

Theologian Scott Hahn offered advice on how to apply St. Joseph's model to our lives: "Especially for men who are husbands and fathers, like Joseph, we should allow the grace of adoration to fill our hearts and our homes. We can learn all those things just from a close reading of the early chapters of Matthew and Luke. Joseph is a model adorer."

Michael Ferarro, a student at Franciscan University employs St. Joseph as a model for his life. He has learned how St. Joseph "prioritized his life and understood that what was most important was to be with Our Lord. St. Joseph taught me so much about the importance of remaining in the presence of [Jesus in] the Eucharist."

"Joseph was a man of action. We are called to do the same. Our Eucharistic devotion begins at the altar and is then played out in the duties of our state in life."

Adoration Leads to Witness

Mary Beth Schmidhamer of St. Therese of the Child Jesus Parish in Altoona, PA is a member of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, an association of Catholics who commit to spending one hour once a month in prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament during the night. She also serves as conference member, for the St. Vincent de Paul Society, an organization that donates proceeds from thrift stores to those in need, in central Pennsylvania. What can we learn from the her Eucharistic witness?

Belief Intensifies Love: Mary Beth said Eucharistic adoration helps to strengthen her relationship with Jesus, which gives her the desire to serve and bring others closer to him. "You can't be a doer all the time," she added. "Sometimes you just have to be."

Feeding and Being Fed by Love: Mary Beth recalled the Gospel story of Mary and Martha, where Martha was busy preparing the home for Jesus, while Mary simply sat and listened. "You need to have both [prayer and service]; it can't be one or the other," she said. "Between the two, they build on each other."

Made for Love: "I think that the Eucharist and service to the poor go hand in hand. Jesus didn't say, 'Just pray' to me; he said, 'Pray and serve,' so I think you really have to have both of those things," Mary Beth said.


Vocations Prayer


