## Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Second Sunday of Lent! Today we are being invited by God to listen more closely to his Son, Jesus. It all starts in the first reading from Genesis when Abraham listened to God and is ready to sacrifice his son Isaac as God had instructed him. As harsh a request as it seemed, Abraham was ready to do God's will. But in the end, he was stopped. "Do not do the least thing to him. I know now how devoted you are to God since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son." Thren in the second reading from Romans, Paul encourages the people to remain steadfast in their faith, trusting that God will provide all we need. "He who did not spare his own son, but handed him over for us, how will he not also give us everything else along with him.?" Finally, we have Mark's gospel account of the

"Transfiguration" when the divinity of Jesus is revealed to Peter, James, and John on the mountain top. They were awestruck at the sight of Jesus and then a voice came from the heavens: "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him."

Wouldn't it be incredible if God would do this same thing in our time and place, say right here in St. Raymond Church. I imagine our first rection would be one of fear. We probably wouldn't even know what was happening. But then we might be awestruck like the apostles were, and even excited. And maybe even a bit humbled. What an experience this would be. I'm sure we would change because of it. How would be different for each one of us. But the one common effect would probably be that each of us would believe more than before. We would believe more strongly in God's existence and in Jesus, and that our lives do have some sort of meaning. Yes, we probably would leave church believing more. But would we have more faith? "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." I think God is saying don't just believe in Jesus but have faith in him too. What's the difference? I would say it is in the words: "Listen to him." Faith is not simply acknowledging that God is real, but accepting what he is asking of us. And that's the most difficult part of faith because it means surrendering our own will and desires to the will and desires of our God. The question really becomes, "What would you do for God," not just, "What do you think about God." If you affirm that your desire is to have faith, not just believe, then ask yourself if you are truly listening to Jesus or still just listening to yourself. "What would you do for God?" Look at how Abraham answered that question.

This Tuesday evening, February 27th, we will have our second special *Holy Hour* for Lent in our church from 7-8pm. In the spirit of the Eucharistic Revival this is a great way to spend some quality time in the presence of Jesus. If you are going to open your heart to Jesus more this Lent and try to grow closer to him, then Eucharistic Adoration is for you and for all of us. This is where our belief becomes faith, and our lives take on a whole deeper purpose. The hour will consist of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, scripture, time for quiet prayer, a reflection, music and ending with Benediction. So, if you can, come join us for this hour with Jesus. And bring a friend.

Once again, I would like to call your attention to a request I made last week. It has to do with the concern that many of our elderly parishioners, when trying to park in the back parking lot, are unable to find a space. Many times, a person with a walker, cane or in a wheelchair can't find a parking space in the lot. I would urge those who are more physically capable to please consider using the street or another lot for parking. It means walking a bit to the church, but it would be a very considerate gesture for those who truly need to park close to the rear entrance. Thank you for your consideration to this request.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to the upcoming St. Patrick's Celebration in March, the ongoing Lenten Schedule, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Mass (found on the inside back cover), an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand), and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

Have a great Second Week of Lent. Keep that Lenten smile going and remember: Life doesn't get better by chance; it gets better by change. God bless always.

So they kept the matter to themselves. questioning what rising from the dead meant.



# Abstinence and fasting

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth year are bound to abstain entirely from meat/poultry on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen and fifty-nine inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired and excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Ash Wednesday and Good Friday fast and abstinence.









Jesus, dear Savior, during these days of Lent, I want to fast, to repent and to pray. Above all else I want to stay in the circle of Your love. Walk with me and surround me with Your light; lead me and guide me in Your footsteps. During this season of Lent help me to follow You and imitate Your love. May this cross remind me today and throughout Lent of Your great love for me.

#### A Deeper Look at the Homily

The homily "serves as an integral link between the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Before the apostles recognized Jesus in the 'breaking of the bread,' he explained the Scriptures to them, 'filling their hearts with a burning desire.' The homily strives to kindle a fire of love for God and His Church. As a 'bridge' it draws us deeper into the mysteries we celebrate—most especially the mystery of the most Holy Eucharist" (Diocese of Peoria: A Study of the Mass, p. 9). So, as you can begin to see, the homily is really packed with a number of important goals!"

#### Inspiration from the Church Fathers



One of the earliest written descriptions of the Mass is from St. Justin Martyr, who was writing a little earlier than 165 AD. As he describes the prayers and meaning of the Mass, I am always struck by how similar they are to our celebrations today. It is a great testament to the guiding work of the Holy Spirit and continuity of our Catholic faith and liturgy. When St. Justin describes the homily, he talks about how the leader exhorts the people to imitate the good things they have just heard. All these centuries later, preachers are still following this same pattern. The priest may use different kinds of homilies for different circumstances, taking into account what the people are like, what they know already, what kinds of involvement they have, what types of concerns are currently happening on the local level, etc.

All of these elements will affect both what the faithful need to hear and how well they will understand it and live it out each day. No matter what the circumstances, and no matter what the background of the people is like, all homilies really have one thing in common: Jesus Christ who died and rose for us and our life in him. A wise old seminary professor once said, "If you never say anything else in the pulpit except Jesus loves you and wants you to be with him, the main essentials will always be in every homily."



#### A Bridge Between the Two Halves

So, our focus should always be on Christ, his love for us, and what that means in our lives. We focus on Christ's four-fold presence to us at every Mass: he is present in the Word of God, in the priest, in his assembled people, and especially in his Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist in a most unique way. We focus on Jesus through the Scriptures and God's loving Word to his people. We focus on Jesus dwelling among us, offering himself for our sins, rising in triumph, and continuing to be with us through the Holy Eucharist.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1346, states: "The liturgy of the Word and liturgy of the Eucharist together form 'one single act of worship'; the Eucharistic table set for us is the table both of the Word of God and of the Body of the Lord." It is important to remember that the Mass is not just a sequence of unrelated events: it is a perfect unity in Christ. The first half helps us get to know God (and ourselves), nourishing our faith in God; the second half helps us unite with him in body and soul. The hope of the homily, then, is to help bring these two halves together so that the faithful can go out into the world and really live the life of Christ.

#### For Reflection:

- Read about St. Peter's first "homily" and its impact in the account from Acts 2:14-41. Commit to more attentive listening to the homily the next time you participate in Mass, and ask for the grace to put the lessons of the homily into action in your own life,
- 2. 2. On the journey to Emmaus, two disciples experience their hearts burning within when the Risen Lord Jesus interprets the Scriptures for them (see Lk 24:13-35). A Gospel acclamation preceding this Gospel passage implores, "Lord Jesus, open the Scriptures to us; / make our hearts burn while you speak to us." Make this prayer your own as you prepare to participate actively in the Liturgy of the Word, including the homily.

The very core of Christ-life is "Host-life" By Fr. Peter John Cameron, OP

The Host is light as a petal of rose, colorless, supremely fragile. Don't we ourselves often feel like that? Fragmented, insignificant ...

The Catholic mystical writer Caryll Houselander (+1954), in her profound reflections on the Holy Eucharist, focuses on the mystery of the Eucharistic Host by way of a captivating expression: the "Host-life."

Houselander makes the point that the Host-life "is not something new or different from the Christ-life that we know already." Rather, "it is the very core of it, and it was given to us at the Last Supper when Christ gave himself to us in the Blessed Sacrament." The notion of Host-life is meant to be for us a tremendous encouragement and bolstering of hope. For, as Houselander observes, at Mass:

"the offering to be changed into Jesus' Flesh is the most fragile wafer of unleavened bread, light as the petal of a rose; flexible, colorless, only just substance at all. It is made out of tiny separate grains. It is this that Christ chooses for his supreme miracle of love."

Don't we ourselves often feel like that ... fragile, insignificant, fragmented? That is why the Host-life is our Savior's deliberate "choice of how to live his life among us today." "In the Host, Christ gives himself to live the ordinary life as it is today, to live it fully in all its essentials, and to take into himself, into his own living of the Host-life, the most ordinary, the most numerous, seemingly the most mediocre lives, bestowing upon them his own power to bring down the Spirit of love."

With what renewed confidence, joy, and freedom can we approach Holy Communion: We are asked to offer only what we have, what we are today. That it is so little means nothing: it is our wafer of unleavened bread. And then, by our faith and trust, we can be the Host-life for others.



Eucharistic Witness
Saint Gregory of Narek
Abbot & Doctor of the Church
Feast: February 27th

St. Gregory of Narek was an Armenian priest, mystic, composer, astronomer, and, theologian. He was declared a saint in 2015 on the 100th anniversary of the Armenian genocide in the Ottoman Empire. In his Book of Lamentations, or "book of prayer," he offers us encouragement during Lent to prepare for Easter.

#### Trust in God's Gracious Mercy:

St. Gregory's father taught him to remain in a state of continuous dialogue with God, ever attentive to His divine presence. Gregory's prayers express the deepest love of God by a soul that seems troubled, and even tormented at times. However, he urged that we should never despair in our brokenness, but acknowledge our sin, and reach out to our God who constantly seeks us and very much wants to extend His mercy.

#### God Awaits Us in Reconciliation and the Eucharist:

According to St. Gregory, the goal in life is to achieve union God. This union cannot take place at the level of the intellect, but only at the level of the heart and feelings through the experience of God in the sacraments, especially in Reconciliation and the Eucharist.

#### Devotion to the Blessed Mother:

The loss of his mother early in life led Gregory to a deep devotion to our Blessed Mother, particularly in her role as mediator between God and humanity. He would later write, "This spiritual, heavenly mother of light cared for me as a son more than an earthly, breathing, physical mother could."





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
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
