

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessing be yours on the Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time! Given the thrust of the Eucharistic Revival at this time, today might be a good day to suspend making judgments and simply receive the Sacred Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. I believe there is more peace within the lack of understanding and just accepting the mystery. In the first reading from Wisdom, we see God protecting the righteous while also challenging disbelievers to change their ways. "For you show your might when the perfection of your power is disbelieved; and in those who know you, you rebuke te*merity.*" Then in the second reading from Romans, Paul knows that because of our human weakness we do not always pray as we should. The Holy Spirit will always be available to intercede on our spiritual behalf. "And the one who searched hearts knows what is the intention of the Spirit, because he intercedes for the holy ones according to God's will." And finally, in Matthew's gospel Jesus continues to teach through parables because they help to reveal what is hidden. The parable of the wheat and weeds is really about community diversity and the mustard seed and yeast parables show the small to large dynamic. It is how the kingdom of God works and if you listen closely this is what happens. "Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

Discovering the distinction between the need to judge the value of something and to just open our spirit to receive creates tension. We want to dismiss what we hear and see by disbelief. In times of tragedy, we often just can't understand why this has happened. It's important to know that not everything needs to be explained. In the Old Testament the people were always being challenged to trust in God. They were often reminded of his constant care. They had lots of leeway in coming around, lots of sacred time for repentance and to return. It is the same for us. The gospel connects our waiting in faith for the kingdom to come in full abundance. This transformation is also slow, but certain if believers embrace the pattern of the mustard seed and yeast. You can say the "kingdom of heaven" is more of an attitude than a place and this attitude resides in us when we place our trust in Jesus. The ways of Jesus do not require immediate understanding. We get tempted to disbelief. But as our faith and trust grow in Jesus' words, what we embrace without understanding yields the gifts of the kingdom of heaven. Standing in awe of a great mystery without knowing allows us to believe in things unseen. It's not always necessary to have all the answers. Let the Eucharistic Presence of Jesus be an invitation into a wordless mystery of God's love.

At this time, I would like to welcome an old friend, *Father John Peter Arockiasamy* back to St. Raymond Parish. Father John Peter, from India, has been with us several times over the years but not since 2018. May your stay be a restful and enjoyable time. Look for Father John Peter at a Mass near you.

Jesus proposed another parable to the crowds, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everyone was asleep his enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat, and then went off. When the crop grew and bore fruit, the weeds appeared as well. The slaves of the householder came to him and said, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where have the weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' His slaves said to him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' He replied, 'No, if you pull up the weeds you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, "First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn" He proposed another parable to them. "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that a person took and sowed in a field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, yet when full-grown it is the largest of plants. It becomes a large bush, and the 'birds of the sky come and dwell in its branches." He spoke to them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with three measures of wheat flour until the whole batch was leavened." All these things Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables. He spoke to them only in parables, to fulfill what had been said through the prophet: I will open my mouth in parables, I will announce what has lain hidden from the foundation of the world. Then, dismissing the crowds, he went into the house. His disciples approached him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field." He said in reply, "He who sows good seed is the Son of Man, the field is the world, the good seed the children of the kingdom. The weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels. Just as weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all who cause others to sin and all evildoers. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears ought to hear."






MARY, MARTHA & LAZARUS PRAYER

TAYLOR WAS A VERY ACTIVE MEMBER OF OUR FOLK GROUP. A LECTOR. AND HER PARENTS. JACK AND LAURA WERE MEMBERS OF OUR PARISH PRE CANA PROGRAM.

Taylor Rose Clarke At 18, in her freshman year of college, she became ill and it was determined she needed a heart transplant. The parish banded together, in many ways, and lead by prayer, at 20 in 2016, she received a new heart. What are appropriate signs of reverence with respect to the Body and Blood of Christ?

The Body and Blood of Christ present under the appearances of bread and wine are treated with the greatest reverence both during and after the celebration of the Eucharist (cf. St. Pope Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei, Encyclical on the Holy Eucharist, nos. 56-61). For example, the tabernacle in which the consecrated bread is reserved is placed "in some part of the church or oratory which is distinguished, conspicuous, beautifully decorated, and suitable for prayer" (Code of Canon Law, Can. 938, §2).

According to the tradition of the Latin Church, one should genuflect in the presence of the tabernacle containing the reserved sacrament. In the Eastern Catholic Churches, the traditional practice is to make the sign of the cross and to bow profoundly. The liturgical gestures from both traditions reflect reverence, respect, and adoration.

It is appropriate for the members of the assembly to greet each other in the gathering space of the church (that is, the vestibule or narthex), but it is not appropriate to speak in loud or boisterous tones in the body of the church (that is, the nave) because of the presence of Christ in the tabernacle.

Also, the Church requires everyone to fast before receiving the Body and Blood of Christ as a sign of reverence and recollection (unless illness prevents one from doing so). In the Latin Church, one must generally fast for at least one hour; members of Eastern Catholic Churches must follow the practice established by their own Church.

If someone without faith eats and drinks the consecrated bread and wine, does he or she still receive the Body and Blood of Christ?

Yes. The attitude or disposition of the recipient cannot change what the consecrated bread and wine are. The question here is thus not primarily about the nature of the Real Presence, but about how sin affects the relationship between an individual and the Lord.

Before one steps forward to receive the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion, one needs to be "I AM THE LIVING BREAD THAT CAME DOWN FROM HEAVEN; WHOEVER EATS THIS BREAD WILL LIVE FOREVER; AND THE BREAD THAT I WILL GIVE IS MY FLESH FOR THE LIFE OF THE WORLD." JOHN 6:51

in a right relationship with the Lord and his Mystical Body, the Church - that is, in a state of grace, free of all mortal sin. While sin damages, and can even destroy, that relationship, the sacrament of Penance can restore it. St. Paul tells us that "whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord. A person should examine himself, and so eat the bread and drink the cup." (1 Cor 11:27-28).

Anyone who is conscious of having committed a mortal sin should be reconciled through the sacrament of Penance before receiving the Body and Blood of Christ unless a grave reason exists for doing so and there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, that is, an act of sorrow for sins that "arises from a love by which God is loved above all else" (Catechism, no. 1452). The act of perfect contrition must be accompanied by the firm intention of making a sacramental confession as soon as possible.

Does one receive the whole Christ if one receives Holy Communion under a single form?

Yes. Christ Jesus, our Lord and Savior, is wholly present under the appearance either of bread or of wine in the Eucharist. Furthermore, Christ is wholly present in any fragment of the consecrated Host or in any drop of the Precious Blood. Nevertheless, it is especially fitting to receive Christ in both forms during the celebration of the Eucharist.

This allows the Eucharist to appear more perfectly as a banquet, a banquet that is a foretaste of the banquet that will be celebrated with Christ at the end of time when the Kingdom of God is established in its fullness (cf. Congregation of Rites, Eucharisticum Mysterium, Instruction on the Worship of the Eucharist, no. 32)

Eucharistic Exposition & Adoration "I have a burning thirst to be honored by men in the Blessed Sacrament'." Jesus to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque Eucharistic Exposition & Adoration is the traditional Catholic practice of placing the consecrated host in a sub shaped vessel called a Monstrance for the faithful to look upon Our Lord and pray to him. However, even when the consecrated host is not exposed in the Monstrance, the Church encourages everyone to spend time with our Lord in the Tabernacle.

The Eucharist and the Sacred Heart of Jesus By Servant of God Fr. John Hardon, S.J.

It is impossible to identify the Holy Eucharist too closely with Jesus Christ. We should remember He is in the Holy Eucharist not merely with His substance. I have corrected many of my students over the years who tell me, "Transubstantiation means that the substance of bread and wine become the substance of Jesus Christ." I reply, "No, transubstantiation means the substance of bread and wine are no longer there. The substance of bread and wine is replaced not only by the substance of bread and wine is replaces the substance of bread and wine is Jesus Christ!" Everything that makes Christ, Christ replaces what had been the substance of bread and wine. The substance of bread and wine become the whole Christ

Therefore, Christ in the Holy Eucharist is here with His human heart. Is it a living heart? Yes! That is why the revelations our Lord made to St. Margaret Mary about promoting devotion to the Sacred Heart were all made from the Holy Eucharist.

Why do we equate the Sacred Heart with the Holy Eucharist? Because the Holy Eucharist is the whole Christ with His human heart. According to St. Margaret Mary, the Sacred Heart is the Holy Eucharist. So, it follows that devotion to the Sacred Heart is devotion to the Holy Eucharist. It is infinite Love Incarnate living in our midst in the Blessed Sacrament. > Saints Who Promoted Eucharistic Devotion St. Gemma Galgani Laywoman († 1903) Feast: May 16

"If I am with Jesus Crucified, I suffer; if I am with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, I love."

Gemma Galgani was born in 1878. As a little child she acquired a great devotion to the Mass from her mother and a devotion to the Passion from the nuns who educated her after her mother's death. When she made her First Communion, she prayed fervently for the grace "to know perfectly the Life and Passion of Jesus."

The Eucharist and the Passion were one in her heart and Gemma hoped to join the Passionist nuns, but she was considered too sickly. She took religious vows privately and lived a quiet life with family and friends until her death at age twenty-five.

Though her life was hidden, her writings are a fountain of beautiful insights about the Eucharist, which she called "a school of paradise where one learns to love." In her eager love, she suffered each day as she waited to receive Communion. And yet, aware of her unworthiness, she would at times become red-faced with embarrassment before the Lord.

"Jesus gives me all of himself, though I give him nothing worthy in return. I always ask him for so many things, and to tell the truth, I am afraid of wearying him, but he says no and not to worry. Blessed be Jesus!"


