Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessing be yours on the Feast of the Transfiguration! Today's feast falls on a Sunday and so the whole Church has the opportunity to celebrate this important moment in Jesus' life and that of his disciples. The basic message for us is that to encounter God, we too will have some mountains to climb. The first reading from the prophet, Daniel shows the protective love God has for people of faith. Daniel's dream has the Son of Man on a bright throne with power and glory that is unending. His kingdom will stand against any force this world tries to mount against it. "His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not be taken away, his kingship shall not be destroyed." Then in the second reading from 2 Peter we have the testimony of Peter, an eyewitness to the Transfiguration. He urges the faithful to follow the message of the gospel just as they would a guiding lamp in the dark. "We ourselves heard this voice come down from heaven while we were with him on the holy mountain. Moreover, we possess the prophetic message that is altogether reliable." And finally, the story of the Transfiguration as told through Matthew's gospel confirms the identity of Jesus as the Son of God. As Jesus is transfigured everything about him becomes brilliantly white. He is being seen from the perspective of his divinity. Moses is there as a symbol of the law and Elijah as a symbol of the prophets. Jesus symbolizes the fulness of divine revelation. Peter, James, and John are understandably afraid of the cloud and the voice, but Jesus reassures them as they make their way back down the mountain. "Do not tell the vision to anyone until the Son of Man is raised from the dead."

When Jesus was on the mountain, God shone so brightly through him that he was transfigured, revealing God's light. Remember the first mountain experience for Jesus was when he underwent the three temptations from Satan. He rejected the search for things, power, and glory. All worldly things pass away, for God is the only one who is eternal. While people often live in fear of the world as we know it ending, Jesus invites us to see that only God and love are real and enduring. On the Transfiguration mountain, Jesus reveals more of who he is and what God is asking. Never more clearly has God spoken: "Listen to him." We are always tempted to stay in the here and now just as Peter wanted to on the mountain with Jesus. But just as Jesus said to Peter, we too have to go into suffering and death to arrive at resurrection life. And Jesus touches the apostles and tells them not to be afraid to move into the future, which will be shown in glory at his Resurrection.

The light that shone through Jesus can also shine through them if they follow him. The future for the apostles and all of us is one of hope. Do not worry, for I am with you, and you can handle what comes, is Jesus' assurance to the apostles and to us. The most important virtue a believer needs is hope. In a dark and fearful world, it is hope that keeps us going. When we act on this virtue, we let the light of God shine through us as we keep climbing our own mountains.

Now, we've done this before and a lot of people have helped getting at least one ticket sold. We need that help once again. So please consider being a "ticket agent" at this time. I'm sure with enough help, we can reach our goal.

To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.



The Transfiguration of the Lord is the 4th Luminous Mystery of the Rosary (which is usually the Mysteries that are prayed on Thursdays). This week, try praying the Rosary. It is a wonderful devotion that will help you deepen your faith.



Why do we speak of the "Body of Christ" in more than one sense?

First, the Body of Christ refers to the human body of Jesus Christ, who is the divine Word become man. During the Eucharist, the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. As human, Jesus Christ has a human body, a resurrected and glorified body that in the Eucharist is offered to us in the form of bread and wine.

Secondly, as St. Paul taught us in his letters, using the analogy of the human body, the Church is the Body of Christ, in which many members are united with Christ their head (1 Cor 10:16-17, 12:12-31; Rom 12:4-8). This reality is frequently referred to as the Mystical Body of Christ. All those united to Christ, the living and the dead, are joined together as one Body in Christ. This union is not one that can be seen by human eyes, for it is a mystical union brought about by the power of the Holy Spirit. The Mystical Body of Christ and the eucharistic Body of Christ are inseparably linked. By Baptism we enter the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church, and by receiving the eucharistic Body of Christ we are strengthened and built up into the Mystical Body of Christ.

The central act of the Church is the celebration of the Eucharist; the individual believers are sustained as members of the Church, members of the Mystical Body of Christ, through their reception of the Body of Christ in the Eucharist. Playing on the two meanings of "Body of Christ," St. Augustine tells those who are to receive the Body of Christ in the Eucharist: "Be what you see, and receive what you are" (Sermon 272). In another sermon he says, "If you receive worthily, you are what you have received" (Sermon 227).

The work of the Holy Spirit in the celebration of the Eucharist is twofold in a way that corresponds to the twofold meaning of "Body of Christ." On the one hand, it is through the power of the Holy Spirit that the risen Christ and his act of sacrifice become present. In the eucharistic prayer, the priest asks the Father to send the Holy Spirit down upon the gifts of bread and wine to transform them into the Body and Blood of Christ (a prayer known as the epiclesis or "invocation upon"). On the other hand, at the same time the priest also asks the Father to send the Holy Spirit down upon the "THE CUP OF BLESSING THAT WE BLESS, IS IT NOT A PARTICIPATION IN THE BLOOD OF CHRIST? THE BREAD THAT WE BREAK, IS IT NOT A PARTICIPATION IN THE BODY OF CHRIST? BECAUSE THE LOAF OF BREAD IS ONE, WE, THOUGH MANY, ARE ONE BODY, FOR WE ALL PARTAKE OF THE ONE LOAF." 1 CORINTHIANS 10:16-17

whole assembly so that "those who take part in the Eucharist may be one body and one spirit" (Catechism, no. 1353). It is through the Holy Spirit that the gift of the eucharistic Body of Christ comes to us and through the Holy Spirit that we are joined to Christ and each other as the Mystical Body of Christ. By this we can see that the celebration of the Eucharist does not just unite us to God as individuals who are isolated from one another. Rather, we are united to Christ together with all the other members of the Mystical Body. The celebration of the Eucharist should thus increase our love for one another and remind us of our responsibilities toward one another. Furthermore, as members of the Mystical Body, we have a duty to represent Christ and to bring Christ to the world. We have a responsibility to share the Good News of Christ not only by our words but also by how we live our lives.

We also have a responsibility to work against all the forces in our world that oppose the Gospel, including all forms of injustice. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us: "The Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive in truth the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognize Christ in the poorest, his brethren" (no. 1397).

Conclusion

By his Real Presence in the Eucharist Christ fulfils his promise to be with us "always, until the end of the age" (Mt 28:20). As St. Thomas Aquinas wrote, "It is the law of friendship that friends should live together - Christ has not left us without his bodily presence in this our pilgrimage, but he joins us to himself in this sacrament in the reality of his body and blood" (Summa Theologiae, III q. 75, a. 1). With this gift of Christ's presence in our midst, the Church is truly blessed. As Jesus told his disciples, referring to his presence among them, "Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it" (Mt 13:17). In the Eucharist the Church both receives the gift of Jesus Christ and gives grateful thanks to God for such a blessing. This thanksgiving is the only proper response, for through this gift of himself in the celebration of the Eucharist under the appearances of bread and wine Christ gives us the gift of eternal life

St. John Vianney's Pastoral Plan for Eucharistic Revival By Tather Roger Landry,

Excerpts from National Catholic Register Blog, August 4, 2022 As Catholics in the United States enter more deeply into the three-year Eucharistic Revival inaugurated by the bishops last month on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, there are many lessons and much hope to be gained by successful Eucharistic renewals that have taken place in Church history. One of the most important was led by the patron saint of parish priests, St. John Vianney (Feast August 4th), in his parish of Ars, France, in the 19th century. His pastoral strategy to get his people to return to their Eucharistic Lord is a model of practical wisdom that can guide the Church today. It involved four essential steps.

The first was to help his people recover a sense of importance of sanctifying the Lord's Day. From the earliest days of the Church, Sunday has been treated as a "little Easter," and if people don't recognize the importance of celebrating Easter or prioritize other activities over it, they do not really grasp the basics of the Christian faith.

The second step was to teach them what the Mass really is. "Attending Mass is the greatest action we can do," he repeated, until they grasped the profound truth of those words. "All the good works taken together do not equal the sacrifice of the Mass, because they are the works of men and the Holy Mass is the work of God."

Once he had restored a sense of holy awe at what happens in the Mass, he was able to pass to a third stage: to help them grow in practical appreciation of the Lord's real presence in the Eucharist. "He is there!" By his own reverence in the celebration of the Mass and his own example of prayer before the tabernacle, he helped them to see that Jesus in the Eucharist "awaits us night and day," "waiting for us to go to him to say our needs and to receive him," accommodating "himself to our weakness: if he appeared in glory before us, we would never have dared approach." He urged them to make more time for prayerful adoration of the Lord's wondrous self-gift, visiting him like we would a beloved friend.

The last step was to help them make frequent holy Communion. His 31 years of famous 12-to-18-hour days spent hearing confessions was all to help his parishioners to be able to receive Jesus with clean souls. He tried to help his people prepare inwardly to receive Jesus worthily not just every Sunday, but as frequently as possible, even every day. "IF WE HAD ONE FAVOR TO ASK OF OUR LORD, WE WOULD NEVER HAVE THOUGHT ... TO ASK GOD FOR HIS OWN SON, ... TO HAVE HIS SON DIE FOR US, TO GIVE US HIS BODY TO EAT, HIS BLOOD TO DRINK. Saints Who Promoted Eucharistic Devotion St. Alphonsus Liguori Bishop († 1903) Feast: August 1

"You must also be aware, that in a quarter of an hour's prayer spent in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, you will perhaps gain more than in all the other spiritual exercises of the day."

Alphonsus was born in 1696 in Naples, Italy, the oldest of seven children. He was soon known as a child prodigy—earning a doctorate in law by the age of 16. At 21 he had his own legal practice and soon became a leading lawyer in Naples. While visiting people suffering from terminal illnesses, he felt a distinct call to give himself to God.

In 1726, he was ordained a priest and he quickly became known for his preaching. Fr. Liguori became a sought-after theologian and writer and founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, known as the Redemptorists, in 1750. He was appointed bishop of an area near Naples, and he worked tirelessly to educate the laity and reform seminaries.

St. Alphonsus Liguori died in 1787, was canonized in 1839, and in 1871 he was named a doctor of the church by Pope Pius IX.

St. Alphonsus Prayer of Spiritual Communion

"My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. 
