

Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today's readings teach us that forgiveness benefits not only the person who is forgiven but also the one who forgives. In the first reading from Sirach, we get words of wisdom that are practical for daily living. Right off the bat, anger is seen as hateful. What is good is mercy. Forgiveness brings about not only social benefits but also countless blessings from God. The people are reminded that their choices do not go unnoticed by God. "Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven." Then in the second reading from Romans, Paul reminds the faithful that through Baptism they live no longer for themselves but for Jesus. Jesus is now both Lord of the living and the dead. "Brothers and sister: None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself." And finally in Matthew's gospel, Jesus very forcefully teaches about the importance of forgiveness and mercy, especially about how it will be an aspect of our lives that is judged by God. There is no limit on how many times we should forgive and there should always be the desire to be merciful to one another. Jesus is pretty clear that the way we treat each other in this matter is how we will be treated by God. "So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

In Jesus' time forgiving someone three times was considered more than generous. Peter, in proposing seven times, thinks he will impress Jesus. But Jesus counters with 77 times. This means there should be no limits placed on forgiveness. We should extend unlimited forgiveness to others just as God extends unlimited forgiveness to us. The first reading and the gospel, both make it clear that God's gifts of mercy and forgiveness are for those who themselves extend mercy and forgiveness to others. Remember the words in the Lord's Prayer: "And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." In other words, we ask God to forgive us in the same measure that we forgive others. It is a definite experience of people that when you give forgiveness as well as receive it, the weight on your heart and spirit is most definitely lightened. We should always think of Jesus as being in the business of forgiveness. And if you doubt this, then just gaze at a crucifix. To me the first thing we should be saying to Jesus dying on the cross is: "I'm sorry." And the second thing to say is: "Thank you." May Jesus, who is the font of mercy, through the gifts of his Body and Blood cleanse, heal and restore us to right relationship with one another and with Jesus.

At this time, I would like to welcome *Father Xavier Lazar*, a priest from Kerala in India who will be staying with us for several months. This is the first time Father Xavier is visiting St. Raymond Parish and we all look forward to experiencing Father Xavier's priestly ministry during his stay with us. Father Xavier, welcome to St. Raymond Parish. I'm sure that you will enjoy your time with us. Look for Father Xavier at a Mass near you.

Next weekend, September 23-24 is designated as IHM Weekend at St. Raymond Parish. Sister Ruthanne and Sister Lorraine will spend a final weekend with us after so many years of faithful service to St. Raymond Grammar school and our parish. They have begun a new ministry for the IHM Congregation in the Scranton area of Pennsylvania. We wish them all the best in their new service to the people of God. The IHM Weekend here will include a final "Nuns on the Run Bingo *Night*" on Saturday, the 23rd starting at 6pm in the school cafeteria. Then on Sunday, the 24th, we will honor both sisters at the 12noon Mass followed by a parish reception in the school cafete*ria.* All are welcome to join in these events to wish your own personal thanks and best wishes to the sisters.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest and invitation, with something for everyone. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.' Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' But he refused. Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?' Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

"In September 1971, Texas became the first state, since 1973, that the courts allowed to enforce a pre-viability abortion ban. Its heartbeat law bans elective abortions once an unborn babu's heartbeat is detectable, about 6 weeks of pregnancy....Since that time, research from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health suggests the Texas law has saved about 1,225 babies from abortion every month....Researchers at Johns Hopkins portrayed their findings in a negative light, referring to pregnant women as 'birthing people' and claiming pro-life laws cause harm...Suzanne Bell, PhD, MPH, an assistant professor at Bloomberg and another lead author of the study said, "...abortion bans have real implications for birthing people, thousands of whom have no choice but to continue an unwanted or unsafe pregnancy." She said that most women seeking abortions are struggling financially. But killing unborn babies is not a solution to poverty. Most pregnant mothers want better support, not abortions, as attested by those who aid women who come to the many pregnancy care centers seeking help to carry their babies to term. " (Lifenews.com) There are now 14 other states who are also enforcing laws that ban or strictly limit elective abortions, and more are fighting in court to do the same.



STATION SIX

BETHLEHEM, THE HOUSE OF BREAD:
BIRTHPLACE OF THE BREAD OF LIFE
"BUT YOU, O BETHLEHEM EPHRATHAH, WHO ARE
LITTLE TO BE AMONG THE CLANS OF JUDAH,
FROM YOU SHALL COME FORTH FOR ME ONE WHO
IS TO BE RULER IN ISRAEL, WHOSE ORIGIN IS
FROM OF OLD, FROM ANCIENT DAYS."
MICAH 5:2 (MICAH 5:1 IN HEB.)

As every Christian should know, Jesus was born in Bethlehem. This was prophesied in the Old Testament: "But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for Me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days..." (Micah 5:2).

Fast-forward hundreds of years later to the Gospel of Luke. We read: And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth to Judea, to the City of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born Son and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn" (Luke 2:1-7).

What is the connection to Jesus?

Eternal Wisdom Incarnate had some good reasons for wanting to be born in Bethlehem. St. Thomas [Aquinas] mentions two of them [Summa Theologica 3a q.35, a. 7.1]. First, He wanted to be born in the city where David was born "so that the promise [made to David] would be shown to have been fulfilled from the very place of his birth". Secondly, as St. Gregory the Great says, "Bethlehem" means "house of bread". Now it is Christ Himself who said, "I am the Living Bread, which came down from Heaven" (cf. Jn. 6:41).

The City of David is thus the birthplace of the Eucharist. "The place He was born," says St. Bede, "is rightly called the "House of Bread", because He came down from heaven to earth to give us the food of heavenly life and to satisfy us with the flavor of eternal sweetness." Since the Church contains within her the Bread of Life, she can be called "the perpetual Bethlehem."

Holy Water

What is one of the first things you do when entering the body of a Catholic church? You reach down and dip your fingers in the holy water font and make the Sign of the Cross on yourself. We do this seemingly small gesture so often that sometimes we may not think about its meaning. First, have you ever wondered why there are holy water fonts located near the entrance of the church? Msgr. Peter Elliott explains, "The holy water stoups [fonts] at the doors of the church are signs which recall the baptismal washing of the faithful" (Ceremonies for the Modern Rite, no. 44). In many traditional church layouts, the baptistry was located near the main door of the church. So just as the Sacrament of Baptism is our entrance into the life of God and the Christian Faith, it's symbolic that baptistries and fonts are located at the entrance of churches. Their location just inside the church doors recalls for us our entrance into the life of the Church when we were baptized with water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. So, as you enter the body of the church, you bless yourself with holy water to recall the sacrament through which you entered God's family, the Church. We have been given tremendous gifts as members of God's family, and holy water reminds us of these gifts. By blessing ourselves with holy water, we recommit ourselves to living holy lives in fidelity to Christ, and we prepare ourselves to participate fruitfully in the Holy Mass.

Sacramentals

Holy water is water blessed by a bishop, priest, or deacon and is among holy things that fall into the category called "sacramentals." The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that sacramentals "are sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments" (CCC, no. 1667). That means that these holy things or actions remind us of sacraments in some way. They help us recall the graces of the sacraments. They don't confer grace but prepare us to receive grace and help us be ready to cooperate with those graces so we can grow in faith and holiness.

Saints Who Promoted Eucharistic Devotion Saint Robert Bellarmine Cardinal and Doctor of the Church († 1621)

Feast: September 17

"Take and eat: This is My Body. Weigh carefully, dear brethren, the force of those words..."

Robert Bellarmine was born on the feast of Saint Francis of Assisi, October 4, 1542, in the little town of Montepulciano near Tuscany in Italy. His mother attended a retreat patterned on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius; as a result, she was determined to send all her five sons into the Society of Jesus. In 1560, Robert joined the Jesuits and was ordained in 1670.

St. Bellarmine combined great wisdom and learning with a passionate love of Christ, while living a busy life fraught with much controversy. He was a tireless defender of the Church against the heresies of his era, always grounding his positions in logic and reasoned argumentation. He also wrote on issues of Church and government, refuting the idea of the divine right of Kings and criticizing the pope's authority over secular rulers. He believed that popes only possessed indirect, and not direct, jurisdiction over temporal governments – a view so controversial that it nearly landed Bellarmine's work on a blacklist called the Index.

His apologetic writings on the Sacrifice of the Mass, St. Robert divided his work into two topics: that the Mass is a Sacrifice, and secondly, that the nature of that Sacrifice and the ceremonies of the Mass are ancient and pleasing to God. He defended the Mass from Scripture and how the Church Fathers understood it, arguing that the Church Fathers and the whole history of the Church believed the Mass was a sacrifice instituted by Christ Himself.

As part of Bellarmine's argument on the question of whether Christ is truly present in the sacrament of the Eucharist, he said "Jesus says: 'This is my body. This is my blood.... Do this in memory of me.' Surely laws and decrees ought to be promulgated in clear, precise, simple terms and not obscurely or ambiguously. Now what Christian ever doubted that our Lord in instituting this Sacrament gave orders and framed a law that it was to be renewed perpetually in his Church? That is the literal meaning of: Do this in memory of me. Since, then, these words of Christ are the expression of a law or command, to read figures or metaphors into them is to make Almighty God the most imprudent and incompetent of legislators."
