Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessing be yours on the Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time! As we enter the month of September and summer slips away, our readings tell us of "good news," yet the cost means taking up one's cross and following Jesus. In the first reading from Jeremiah, we see the prophet complaining about all the humiliation he has endured. He constantly warns the people, and they constantly ignore what he has to say. He decides to be silent, but God's word could not be held in, so he kept at it with the people. Only in this difficult position could he effectively serve God's saving purpose. Jeremiah describes God's word in this statement: "But then it becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones, I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it." Then in the second reading from Romans, Paul encourages the faithful to consider any challenges they face as sacrifices to the Lord. And finally, Matthew's gospel contains three passion predictions. First, Jesus predicts his suffering, death, and resurrection. Second, the disciples, with Peter as spokesman, express a failure to understand what Jesus is saying. And third, Jesus offers them a corrective teaching that stresses the meaning of discipleship. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me."

All three readings today emphasize that authentic fidelity to one's call from God will inevitably entail struggle and sacrifice. True discipleship, while having peace of soul and sometimes consolation, may also mean facing oppression, rejection, persecution, betraval, ridicule, humiliation, and in some cases, even death. Why? God's ways are in direct opposition to the world's ways of thinking and acting. Christian discipleship imitates and follows Jesus regardless of circumstances and does not change direction when the inevitable cross appears. Now this may seem all too grim but believe that God in his goodness wishes to give us only what is best for us. Struggle and sacrifice, when united with Jesus, carry eternal rewards. Parents sacrifice so much for their children and activists struggle peacefully for causes greater than their own well-being. Christian discipleship is similar but with much higher stakes. The cross offers divine transformation by means of Jesus' Resurrection. For most of us it is the little daily deaths that can be challenging.



.Remember that God's message ultimately cannot be contained. And our worship of God cannot be for just an hour a week in church. If we die with Jesus, we also live with him. Most of us will not be called to martyrdom, but we are all called to *"lose our lives"* by seeking the good of others rather than our own.

Last Sunday we conducted our 2023 Backwards Money Drawing at which \$20,000 was awarded in multiple prize winnings. The event was held in the cafeteria where the Sodality of Our Lady provided a wonderful breakfast for all who came by to check in on their tickets. Excitement mounted as the last 10 tickets were called which were all winners. When we reached the final two numbers, we called those who had tickets #291 and #463 to see if they wanted to split evenly the last two prizes (\$2500 and \$10,000). They both said yes and so each ticket was awarded "\$6250.00." Congratulations to all the winners and to St. Raymond Parish which profited \$33,000+ from the event. STATION FOUR THE OLD TEMPLE: GOD DWELLING AMONG MEN "THE GLORY OF THE LORD FILLED THE HOUSE OF GOD. THEN SOLOMON SAID, 'THE LORD HAS SAID THAT HE WOULD DWELL IN THICK DARKNESS. I HAVE BUILT THEE AN EXALTED HOUSE, A PLACE FOR THEE TO DWELL IN FOR EVER' ... 'BUT WILL GOD DWELL INDEED WITH MAN ON THE EARTH?''' 2 CHRONICLES 5:14; 6:1-2,18

After spending forty years in the desert, the Israelites finally conquered the Promised Land of Canaan. They soon build their kingdom and begin to grow. During this time, they also had the Ark of the Covenant. King David wanted to build a great temple for the Ark as a place for God to dwell with his people. It would be his son, Solomon, who would fulfill this dream. In 2 Chronicles we read:

"Thus, all the work that Solomon did for the house of the Lord was finished...So the priest brought the ark of the covenant of the Lord to its place, in the inner sanctuary of the house, in the most holy place, underneath the wings of the cherubim..." (2 Chron. 5:1a, 7).

The Lord, pleased by these efforts, manifested His Presence among them:

"The house of the Lord was filled with a cloud, so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud: for the glory of the Lord filled the house of God. Then Solomon...said...But will God indeed dwell with



THE TWELVE STATIONS OF THE MOST HOLY EUCHARIST STATION FOUR

Man on the earth?" (2 Chron. 5:13b-14, 6:18). What is the connection with Jesus?

Jesus is the new and eternal temple:

"The Jews then said to Him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking about the temple of his body." (Jn. 2:18-21).

Jesus identifies the temple of Jerusalem with his own body, and by so doing refers to one of the most profound truths about himself--the Incarnation. After the Ascension of the Lord into heaven this real and very special presence of God among men is continued in the sacrament of the Blessed Eucharist.

Mary is also called the Ark of the New Covenant. This reference is taken from Revelation 12:2 where Saint John sees a "woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars..." In the preceding verse (Rev. 11:19) Saint John says, "Then God's temple in heaven was opened, and the ark of his covenant could be seen in the temple..."

Each week, we will present another of the twelve stations for your meditation for the week.

Week 4 Thought: By building the great Temple, the Israelites showed great respect to the Ark of the Covenant. When I am in Mass or Eucharistic Adoration, does my respect indicate that I am in the presence of Our Lord?

Reflection

We all need a revival. The root word itself-revive-means "to live again." After the past four years, don't you feel like you need to live again? The Eucharist is the privileged place where we go to be revived, the source and summit of life itself. Jesus Christ-who called people back to life (both physically and spiritually)-desires our revival and is making it happen. True revival is always the work of God. We can't fake or manufacture it. But we can choose how we respond. Jesus is doing something new. Do you desire it?

We don't get to choose revival—we can only be open to it. Revival isn't our work; it's the work of the Holy Spirit, and it is happening constantly. Let that sink in. We stand on the brink of a significant moment for the Catholic Church in the United States. The Eucharistic Revival is a uniting movement, gathering up sparks and fanning them into flame throughout our country. You are a part of that moment.

But revival is not just for this moment. It's for every moment. Revival has been happening since Pentecost when the disciples waited for the next step. It is true, revival is a corporate work-but it begins personally. If you are reading this, it most likely means you desire revival for more than just you. You desire it for everyone. That's how this becomes a movement and a wildfire that transforms our world.

When we embody that renewal as it has taken place in us, and bring it to other people, we become missionaries. We want to use this Year of Parish Revival to pray for the courage to invite others to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist so they can experience new life as well.

Just as the Holy Spirit brought revival at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit is here now. Spend 10–15 minutes in silence today, asking the Holy Spirit to bring revival to you. It may be as simple as repeating, "Come, Holy Spirit." Be open to how the Spirit may show up during this time. LORD JESUS CHRIST, I BELIEVE THAT REVIVAL BEGINS IN ME. I GIVE YOU PERMISSION TO REVEAL THE PLACE IN MY HEART AND IN MY LIFE WHERE I AM DEAD SO THAT I CAN OFFER THEM TO YOU FOR HEALING. GIVE ME A HEART THAT DESIRES REVIVAL FOR OTHERS AND THE COURAGE TO SHARE WHO YOU ARE.

Saints Who Promoted Eucharistic Devotion Blessed Frédéric Ozanam Layman († 1853) Feast: September 9

"The best way to economize time, is to 'lose' half-an-hour each day, attending Holy Mass."

Frédéric, born in 1813 in France, was the fifth of Jean and Marie Ozanam's 14 children, one of only three to reach adulthood. As a teenager he began having doubts about his religion but the influence of his teacher, Father Noirot, at Lyons College, reignited his faith. Frédéric began to attend daily Mass whenever possible and receive Holy Communion frequently, even though that was very unusual during that time. Each day he would make a short visit to the Blessed Sacrament in one of the churches in Paris.

In college, Frédéric began to write religious articles for the school paper and helped to organize a student discussion group that frequently looked at the social teachings of the Gospel. At one meeting, Frédéric and his friends tried to prove that from historical evidence alone that the Catholic Church was the one founded by Christ. Their debate opponents declared that, though at one time the Church was a source of good, it no longer was. One opponent issued the challenge, "What is your church doing now? What is She doing for the poor of Paris? Show us your works and we will believe you!" Taking up the challenge, Frédéric and a group of other young men later founded the charitable Society of Saint Vincent de Paul in May 1833 for the sanctification of its members by personal service of the poor. The Society took St. Vincent de Paul as its patron under the influence of Blessed Sister Rosalie Rendu, a member of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, known for her work with people in the slums of Paris. She guided Frédéric and his companions in their approach towards those in need.

Frédéric discovered that, to live the Eucharist, one must give the same gift of love that Jesus did on the cross by practicing the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. Every time a poor person is helped, the gift of love that Jesus gave in the Eucharist is given ... a practice called Eucharistic solidarity. That's what the St. Vincent de Paul Society mission continues to be ... to serve those in need by living the Eucharist.

"It is our vocation to set people's hearts ablaze, to do what the Son of God did, who came to light a fire on earth in order to set it ablaze with His love."

Abortion Pill Reversal

As has been previously stated in the parish bulletin. almost half the abortions today are chemical abortions. It is a two pill regimen. The first pill is RU-486 followed, 24-48 hours later, by the second pill, misoprostol. Many girls/women who have taken the first pill and start having second thoughts about the abortion have been told by abortion workers that they must take the second pill. However, that is not necessarily true. If the first pill has been taken, and the girl/woman changes her mind, it may not be too late to reverse the effects of the first pill. To reverse the abortion, the reversal medication must be taken. Reversing the abortion cannot be guaranteed, but the chances of success are highest the sooner the Studies show the reversal medication is taken. success rate of 64%-68%, if the medication is taken within the first 72 hours.




