#### Father Chuck's Corner

Merry Christmas and God's continued Advent blessings be yours! We move from the Fourth Sunday of Advent quickly to Christmas Eve on Wednesday and then to Christmas Day on Thursday, December 25th. What a joy it is to gather with everyone and celebrate such an incredible mystery. Christmas truly is a mystery. I wonder sometimes if much of what we believe in faith loses a certain specialness with each passing year. Things that amazed us when we were younger start feeling common, ordinary and routine. Does Christmas still astonish you, or has it too become a little too familiar, a little too common? Since it has been part of our lives for so long, it simply makes perfect sense or on the other hand, does it still have the power to make us realize just how amazing our God is? Is it something that rocks us to the core, believing that God loves us so much, so that healing our broken world is still his ultimate concern? That he refuses to remain at a distance, wanting instead to be in an intimate relationship with all creation? Can you really believer that God chose not to simply appear to us, but actually became one of us, assuming our human nature and immersing himself fully into our journey? That he refused to force himself into the world but rather chose to ask for the cooperation of a humble woman from an ordinary town in a nowhere place to say: "yes?" Do you believe that he is able to show us not simply who he is but who we are called to be? To believe that he came to us meekly, quietly, unassumingly, in a vulnerable way, showing us that true power is not what we think? And that he helped us to realize that God doesn't act despite the world, despite his creation, but rather through it, giving all of us a chance to cooperate with his plan and help transform the world into the beautiful, loving, peaceful place he created it to be? That may be a of faith questions to ponder at Christmas, but don't back off.

The mystery of Christmas teaches us so much, revealing to us a God unlike any god thought of or imagined. It reveals to us a God who human beings never believed could be possible. Our God is the opposite of ordinary, the opposite of predictable. He is the opposite of vengeful or distant. Rather, he is a God who wants to be near us, within us, within every human heart open to his grace, open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. *What a God we have!* 

So, as you gather with your family and friends and do all the usual things you do on Christmas, all your traditions, the usual foods, exchanging presents; don't just lump the miracle and mystery of Christmas in with the usual things you do each year. Rather, truly think about the meaning of Christmas Day, not just the first one long ago, but the meaning it has for your life in this time and place. Unpack, unwrap the mystery and you will find there is more and more mystery to be in awe of and grateful for. Don't try to explain it. Just enjoy, embrace and live it!

I want to thank all those who continue to be generous to St. Raymond Parish, even when times are tough. We always need the financial boost that comes from many parishioners at Christmas. Thank you for once again including St. Raymond's in your giving this year. Thanks to all who helped make the "Giving Tree" such a success again for Parish Social Ministry. You truly helped make many people in our community have a blessed Christmas. 



# FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT TIME WEEKLY GUIDE FOR PERSONAL PRAYER



## Come & See

Until you do, you will never know



Summary of the Readings for the Week

For the Fourth Sunday of Advent, the first reading announces God's decisive sign of hope to a fearful people. In the second reading, Saint Paul affirms that Jesus Christ fulfills God's ancient promises and calls all people to the obedience of faith, reminding us that salvation is God's gracious initiative. The Gospel presents Joseph's quiet righteousness and trusting obedience, as he accepts God's plan. God comes to dwell with us through humble faith and courageous trust.

During this week, Tuesday is the Optional Memorial Saint John of Kanty, a humble university professor and priest known for his charity to the poor, simplicity of life, and fidelity to prayer. Friday is the Feast of Saint Stephen, the First Martyr and one of the first deacons of the Church. Saturday is the Feast of Saint John, the Apostle and Evangelist. Honoring these saints the Church teaches that welcoming the newborn Christ means living the Gospel with sincerity, courage, and self-giving love.

The First Readings for Monday through Wednesday this week come from 1-2 Samuel and Malachi, and are centered on waiting, promise, and God's faithful fulfilment. The First Readings for Thursday through Saturday shift from the Advent anticipation to witness and proclamation amid the Christmas season's immediate celebration.

Although Christmas Day belongs to its own solemn readings, the Friday celebration of Saint Stephen (Acts) recalls the cost of discipleship. On Saturday, the Feast of Saint John the Apostle from (1 John) draws our attention to the incarnate Word emphasizing the tangible reality of Christ made flesh and the joy that flows from that revelation. These readings call us not only to remember the joyful birth we have just celebrated, but also to live the implications of that birth, faithful witness, community in Christ, and joy rooted in the reality of the Word among us.

At the start of the week, the Gospel readings lead us deeper into the unfolding mystery of salvation and the joyful anticipation of Christ. On Monday Mary's Magnificat celebrates God's mercy and reversal of worldly values. Tuesday's reading continues the Luke infancy narrative as Elizabeth gives birth to John the Baptist, and the wonder of God's providence begins to be revealed that even in surprising circumstances God's plan is at work. By Wednesday, Zechariah's Benedictus bursts forth, proclaiming that God has visited His people and raised up a horn of salvation.

In the readings for Christmas Day, the Church proclaims the mystery of the Incarnation with joy and awe as God's saving Word enters human history. The First Reading from Isaiah 52:7–10 announces the good news of salvation and peace, declaring, "All the ends of the earth see the saving power of God," as the Lord reveals His victory to the nations. The Second Reading from Hebrews 1:1–6 affirms that in these last days God has spoken definitively through His Son, "the refulgence of his glory," who is exalted above all creation. The Gospel from John 1:1–18 reaches the heart of Christmas by proclaiming that the eternal Word who was with God and was God "became flesh and made his dwelling among us," revealing divine light, grace, and truth to a world longing for redemption.

After Christmas Day itself, the Gospel focus shifts to the lifelong witness to Christ and the reality of the Incarnation lived among us. In the Gospel on Friday, the young Jesus amazes the teachers in the temple with His wisdom and understanding. On Saturday, the Gospel silently circles back to the empty tomb and the risen Christ pointing to the ultimate fruit of Christ's coming: resurrection life. Together, these passages invite us to live the implications of Christmas beyond December 25: to understand Christ as Emmanuel who teaches, saves, and invites us into the joy of believing and witnessing His presence in every moment of life.

Sunday, December 28th is the feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. The Gospel recounts the Holy Family's flight into Egypt and return to Nazareth, showing how God's saving plan unfolds through obedience and protection amid hardship, fulfilling the words, "Out of Egypt I called my son."

#### **Daily Prayer This Week**

This sacred week invites families to slow down and recognize that God enters ordinary life through trust, praise, patience, and love. As Advent gives way to Christmas, take time each day, perhaps at dinner or before bed, to recall where God was present in small moments, struggles, or joys.

Encourage one another to speak words of gratitude, forgiveness, and hope, remembering that Christ does not ask for perfection but for open hearts. Let the birth of Jesus renew your family's commitment to prayer, generosity, and attentive love, trusting that Emmanuel truly dwells among you.

#### **Trusting Obedience**

The Fourth Sunday of Advent invites me to imitate Saint Joseph, who listens to God in silence and acts with courage when he hears, "Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home." I am called to trust that God is present in unexpected circumstances and to respond with faithful obedience rather than fear or control.

My Prayer: Lord God, as Saint Joseph trusted your word without fully understanding your plan, help our family trust you in moments of uncertainty and decision. Give us the grace to act with quiet faith and loving obedience each day.

#### **Humble Praise**

As the week unfolds with Mary's song of praise, I am reminded that gratitude grounds the soul even when life feels overwhelming, for "the Almighty has done great things for me." In prayer and daily routines, I am invited to cultivate humility and joy, teaching my family that recognizing God's blessings transforms ordinary days into moments of grace.

My Prayer: Almighty God, like Mary, we praise you for the wonderful things you have done in owr lives, even those we do not yet fully see. Teach our family to recognize your blessings and to respond with grateful hearts.

#### Faithful Waiting

The Gospel accounts surrounding the birth of John the Baptist show that God works quietly and patiently through time, fulfilling promises beyond human calculation. I learn to trust that God is at work even when answers are delayed, shaping my heart for deeper faith.

My Prayer: Faithful God, you keep your promises in your time and in your way. Strengthen us when waiting feels difficult, and help our family remain patient, hopeful, and attentive to your work in our lives.

#### **Living Emmanuel**

As Christmas arrives, the Gospel proclaims that the Word "became flesh and made his dwelling among us," revealing that God enters the very fabric of daily life. This week challenges me to live with reverence and attentiveness, allowing Emmanuel—God with us—to shape how I love my family, approach my work, and remain rooted in hope amid life's demands.

Christmas Day Prayer: Emmanuel, God-with-us, we thank you for entering our world in humility and love. May your presence transform our family relationships and renew our commitment to live as children of the light.

#### Witnessing Light

With the feasts of Saint Stephen and Saint John, the Church reminds me that welcoming Christ leads naturally to witness, sacrifice, and love. Whether through forgiveness at home, integrity at work, or kindness in conflict, I am called to reflect the light of Christ who has come into the world.

My Prayer: Lord Jesus, teach us to forgive and love even when it is difficult. Give our family courage to live the Gospel with compassion

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


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
