## Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Easter blessings be yours on the Fifth Sunday of Easter! Today's gospel message is all about the sacred connection we have with Jesus. In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we see how Paul, newly converted, had to show the apostles that he was now connected to Jesus. "He moved about freely with them in Jerusalem and spoke boldly in the name of the Lord." Then in the second reading from 1 John, the disciple is emphasizing that a person of faith remains in Jesus by keeping his commandments. "And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another as he commands us." And finally in John's gospel, Jesus uses a beautiful metaphor for connection with him. He describes himself as the vine and his followers as the branches. This example was very clear to the people of Jesus' time and reflects the most important relationship we will ever be part of. That's why Jesus says: "I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing."

Being connected to Jesus is not automatic. Just like trying to stay connected to a TV back before cable was usually a challenge with the constant fussing with an antenna, and now with cable and Wi-Fi, there still can be connection problems. We always have to decide what and with whom we want to be connected to, and then figure out the best way to establish that connection. Yes, being connected requires effort. Now, Jesus says by staying connected to him we will bear lasting fruit. But how do we establish this connection with Jesus and make sure that it stays strong, cared for and secure. As Catholics we have all sorts of ways to establish and maintain our sacred relationship with Jesus. It starts with baptism when we are welcomed into a family with Jesus as the center. We become bonded with Jesus and the Church. But then we need ways to strengthen this relationship that started with baptism. First off it requires our attention, our effort, our humility, and deep desire to want our relationship with Jesus to be more than it was yesterday. The Church provides us with holy moments to open ourselves up to our God who wants nothing less than to be close to us and dwell within us. The Holy Spirt comes to guide us in God's word. And the Church gives us countless devotions and prayers to lift our spirits and quiet our hearts so that we can be inspired to do good in this world. There are also our brothers and sisters in the Church who walk the journey with us

But most of all we have the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Eucharist who comes to make a home in us that is the best way to stay connected. If you want to remain with Jesus and through him the Father, it is the Eucharist which will graft us securely to the vine of Jesus. If we do this, then the fruit we produce will feed and enrich and transform a world in need of every single thing our God wants to provide.

This is the last weekend that our friend, Father Theo will be with us at St. Raymond Parish. Father Theo came to us almost 5 years ago from Nigeria. He is a friend of Father Lawrence who recommended him for ministry in our diocese and as a replacement when Father Lawrence was transferred. We have all enjoyed and benefited from Father Theo's priestly service to our parish and will miss him. This Sunday, Father Theo celebrates his last parish Mass at 12noon followed by a parish reception in the school cafeteria. Both are opportunities to express personal thanks and best wishes to Father Theo who will be returning to his native diocese in Nigeria. We thank you Father Theo and wish you the very best in your new assignment. Ad Multon Annos!

On Tuesday, May 7th there will be a special *Holy Hour* from 7-8pm in the church. There will be Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, prayer, scripture, music and Benediction. All are invited to spend this special time in the presence of the Real Presence as we continue to observe the Eucharistic Revival here at St. Raymond's. So come and bring a friend. Jesus would love to see you.

2024/2025 Registration forms will be e-mailed this month to parents and also found on the parish website.





## ST. RAYMOND'S HUMAN LIFE COMMITTEE

The Supreme Court's Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Org. Decision, sadly, did not end abortion. Simply stated, the Supreme Court held that the U.S. Constitution makes no such reference to abortion, and no right is implicitly protected by any constitutional provision, including the one on which the defenders of Roe chiefly relied on, namely, the Due Process Clause of the 14th Amendment. Therefore, the power to regulate any aspect of abortion not protected by federal statutory law was returned to each state. Immediately, following the announcement of the Dobbs Decision, Planned Parenthood and other proabortion organizations predicted dire consequences for women. And with the help of the media, succeeded in promulgating fear. It was, as if, women would no longer be able to receive medical help. The truth is that since the Dobbs Decision, the killing of the preborn babies by abortion has increased, not decreased, with the use of the chemical abortion pills. There is now a concerted effort, by the present Administration in D.C., Planned Parenthood and the abortion lobby, to have an abortion referendum put on the November ballot in as many states as possible, our own N.Y. State being among the 11 states targeted. If the referendum passes and the killing of the preborn babies by abortion is codified into the State's Constitution, it will be almost impossible to protect any preborn baby for the entire nine months of pregnancy. Remember, abortion is not health care. It is the intentional, barbaric killing of an innocent human being. Please pray and work to protect God's little ones and for the guidance of all those involved in the decision-making process. #### Collection and Procession

It's time to pass the basket for the Offertory. For many people, the word offertory might make us think simply of the money offerings we place in the collection basket. While that certainly is part of the typical Sunday offertory, this is also an important spiritual moment for uniting ourselves to the offering on the altar.



# The Collection in the Early Church

The practical details of this part of the Mass have looked different at various points in history. In earlier times, the gifts would typically be things that people brought from their homes. People would bring all sorts of food, along with bread and wine, and gifts for the poor (money or otherwise). These gifts would all be brought up and then sorted. The bread and wine were used for the Mass, some food and money were given to the priest to provide for him, and the remainder of the food and money were divided up and given to the poor. So, one can see that even in the earliest times, this part of the Mass was about offering and giving. In our modern day, to simplify the offertory, the ushers collect money. This money still symbolizes our gift: what we give to God for the Mass (bread, wine, candles, etc., are purchased for the Mass), what we give to provide for the needs of the priest and the upkeep of the church, and what we give to provide for the needs of the poor and those less fortunate. As the ushers prepare to collect the offerings, we can take a look at our lives, all that we have, all that the Lord has provided for us. We can show our gratitude and thank the Lord by offering a portion of what we have back to him for the good of the Church and others.

Along with the collection, the bread and wine (and water in some places) are brought forward, just as in the days of the early Church. Around the year 150 A.D., St. Justin Martyr describes this part of the Mass by saying simply: "bread, water, and wine are brought". The gifts are brought forward by members of the faithful. Whether it is the ushers, family members who requested the Mass intention, or other parishioners, whoever brings the gifts forward represents the whole congregation, bringing forth our offerings to God.

#### An Offering of Spiritual Gifts

As we think about our practical or material gifts during this part of the Mass, we should not overlook the opportunity to also offer spiritual gifts. Mother Teresa of Calcutta was known for asking priests to leave room on the paten for her intentions. One priest also recalled her saying that she would place her heart on the paten so that it would be near Jesus in the Mass. If we think about this part of the Mass. offering the gifts we have in thanksgiving to God and in union with Jesus, it is true that one of the best offerings we can make is ourselves! Along these lines, the author Charles Belmonte teaches, "Together with Christ, we offer everything that we are and all that we possess, all that we have done or try to do. We offer our memory, intelligence, and will; our family, profession, hobbies, success, sufferings, failures, and worries; and our aspirations, liovs and hopes], and spiritual communions. Likewise, we offer our small and big mortifications: all those acts of love we performed yesterday and as many as we plan to perform today" (Understanding the Mass, p. 110).

If you haven't thought about the offertory in this way before, I encourage you to think about including your personal spiritual offering along with whatever you drop in the basket. It certainly is a great way to join to the prayers the priest offers at the altar spiritually and a great way to deepen our unity with the perfect offering of Jesus!

#### For Reflection:

 Consider what spiritual offering(s) you will offer at the next Mass in which you participate.

 Ask Jesus to help you identify what you can generously give. In addition to your financial offering, consider how Jesus may be inviting you to give of yourself to parish life in other ways.

Fr. Bruno Lanteri was the founder of the religious congregation of the Oblates of the Virgin Mary in northwestern Italy in the early 19th century. His spiritual life and work centered on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola and he was known for his devotion to the Holy Mass. What can we learn from his Eucharistic witness?

Belief Intensifies Love: Fr. Lanteri intentionally prepared for each part of the Mass by choosing biblical characters as models and thinking about what was in their heart. For example, going to Church with the heart of Simeon, the repentant tax collector at the Penitential Rite, a disciple for the Gospel, the martyrs at the Creed, Jesus from the cross at the Consecration, a beggar at the Our Father, and a person in love at Communion. Starting with even just one part of the Mass will slowly change your mindset about the Mass.

Feeding and Being Fed by Love: Fr. Lanteri was very devoted to the Blessed Sacrament, and to adore the Blessed Sacrament more frequently, he had a small window made from his room looking onto the altar of the chapel. Adoration was key to his day: "This will be then the remedy for all your feelings of sadness and of fearfulness of heart: the thought that, with the grace of God... you can do anything."

Made for Love: For Fr. Lanteri, one must be an active agent within the Sacred Heart of Christ. This means experiencing oneself as a loved and redeemed sinner who participates dependently but freely and actively in the mission of Christ. He can discern within himself the effect of Christ's love for him.

"If I should fall even a thousand times a day, a thousand times, with peaceful repentance, I will say immediately, Nunc Coepi [Now I begin]!"



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The Growing Danger of Physician-Assisted Suicide in New York State April 19, 2024

A Pastoral Statement to the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre Most Reverend John O. Barres, Bishop of Rockville Centre



My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Long Island is blessed to be home to several of the nation's most renowned healthcare systems. These systems consist of a vast network of physicians, nurses, technicians, and medical professionals of all kinds who live and work in our communities. In my weekly travels across the Diocese of Rockville Centre, I meet so many of these health professionals and I never fail to be inspired by their commitment to accompanying their patients throughout the courses of their lives. This includes the end of life.

However, legislation pending in Albany seeks to upend the doctor-patient relationship at its most vulnerable moment via physician-assisted suicide. The bill, which seems to be gaining momentum, authorizes doctors (whose careers are dedicated to healing and preserving life) to dispense pills that literally poison patients who have been given terminal diagnoses. Such a practice flies in the face of human dignity.

In fact, a groundbreaking new Vatican document approved in April by Pope Francis, titled– appropriately – *Dignitas Infinita* (Infinite Dignity), specifically singles out euthanasia and assisted suicide as grave assaults on human dignity which utilize "a mistaken understanding of human dignity to turn the concept of dignity against itself."

This comment refers directly to the euphemism "death with dignity" that promoters of assisted suicide favor. *Dignitas Infinita* notes that, even in serious infirmity, "human life carries a dignity that must always be upheld, that can never be lost, and that calls for unconditional respect. Indeed, there are no circumstances under which human life would cease from being dignified and could, as a result, be put to an end."

Clearly, Pope Francis views euthanasia and assisted suicide as symptoms of what he repeatedly has called a "throwaway culture" that has taken hold in the West. The pope, in his wisdom, sees what many supporters of this practice do not.

By virtue of their very humanity, people who are ill or who lack self-sufficiency never cease being infinitely valuable, even if society sends them a message to the contrary by urging them to "get out of the way" and end their lives.

What is being peddled by advocates as a last resort for those suffering from interminable pain will very quickly be expanded to resemble the dystopian nightmare we are seeing play out in Canada, which passed a law very similar to the New York bill in 2016 but which already has been expanded to allow people with non-terminal diagnoses to end their lives. In March, an Ottawa judge approved assisted suicide for a young woman whose only diagnoses are autism and ADHD, over her parents' pleading objection. The Canadian law is set to expand again in 2027 – incredibly – to allow people with mental illnesses like depression, anorexia, or bipolar disorder to access suicide pills as prescribed by a medical professional.

Sadly, Canada is not an isolated case. The situation is similar in the Netherlands, the first nation to approve euthanasia, where people living with autism and intellectual disabilities reportedly are being euthanized.

I know that these scenarios are not what people have in mind when they answer a survey question asking if they support "medical aid in dying" or "death with dignity." But we must not fool ourselves. What I'm

describing is not fiction or fear mongering; these abuses are really happening today in jurisdictions that have legalized assisted suicide.

The medical professionals whom I speak with in our parishes and at Catholic Health medical facilities understand clearly that assisted suicide is a terrible, untenable policy. They know that when the end-of-life approaches, the answer is not to actively kill patients or to help them to kill themselves. Instead, true dignity is upheld by providing compassionate palliative care which manages patients' pain and other symptoms, keeps them clean, tends to their bodily needs, and spiritually prepares them for their journey home.

As Pope Francis has said, "We must accompany people towards death, but not provoke death or facilitate any form of suicide...Life is a right, not death, which must be welcomed, not administered."

During this time when we celebrate a National Eucharistic Revival, we pray that our reverence for the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ may inspire our witness in New York State's public square to the reverence for the sanctity of human life at every stage of life.
