Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's continued Lenten blessings be with you on the Fifth Sunday of Lent! Also, Happy St. Patrick's Day to everyone. Today's readings encourage us to keep serving God even when we suffer life's trials. In the first reading from Jeremiah, the prophet speaks of a new covenant that God was forming with his people. Why a new covenant? Because time and again the Israelites failed to obey God's commandments and went the way of their neighboring people. That's why God established a new covenant in the blood of Jesus Christ. "I will place my law within them and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God and they shall be my peo*ple.*" Then in the second reading from Hebrews, we are told of the obedience of God's Son and how through him all are reconciled. "Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered; and when he was made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him." And finally, in John's gospel, we see Jesus pointing directly at his coming suffering and death and how through his obedience to the Father, salvation would be possible for all people. He would not stay dead but be lifted up in glory through his resurrection. "And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself.'

If you have ever seen the Coastal Redwoods or the Giant Sequoias in California, you can't help but be awed at their size and massive bases, as they grow so tall. And to think that each tree started out as a seed, a small object that looks like nothing, looking lifeless and insignificant. And yet, miraculously under certain conditions a slim few of these will become something quite majestic, other worldly, beautiful and lifegiving. "Amen, amen I say to, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." This isn't the only time this sort of radical transformation takes place. A small business after time flourishes into a major chain located all across the country. A five-yearold who takes their first piano lesson becomes later in life a concert pianist. A young child, struggling to learn the basic ABCs becomes a college professor. A neighbor you hardly know becomes your best friend. Two cells come together and somehow, miraculously become you. From small things, insignificant things, wonderful things can happen

Lent is coming to a close, and now the tone becomes a bit more somber as the mystery starts to unfold. The pattern of authentic faith, on display in the life of Jesus is coming into focus. And it starts with dying! Faith is hard because dying is hard. We do so much to avoid it. We cling to all sorts of things, placing a value on them, when in the end they don't really matter. We pretty much get so wrapped up in ourselves that all else becomes secondary. But "dying" isn't like that. Dying is working long hours to provide for your family. It's making the extra effort to achieve something rather than taking the easier route. It's searching for ways to make your spouse feel a bit safer, happier, at peace. It's waking up each day wondering what you can do to make someone's life a little bit better. Dying is really about sacrifice and losing oneself so that something wonderful and beautiful and life-giving can happen. There's a redwood or sequoia of goodness in each one of us. That's how we were made. Let God work on you and in you to bring about all the wonderful things this world needs.

THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS STATIONS 1-7



THE FIRST STATION-JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DIE

Just as Jesus was wrongfully accused, sometimes people falsely place blame on me to escape the responsibility themselves. And yes, sometimes I also put others down in order to build myself up. When Jesus was condemned to death, even those who had once followed Him went along with Pilate. Do I care more about being accepted by those around me than returning your love? Help me Lord. Be with me Lord.

THE SECOND STATION-JESUS IS GIVEN HIS CROSS

Lord, help me remember the humble and loving way You carried Your cross up to Calvary when I experience life's heavy burdens and strife. Sometimes I think I can't go on. Help me remember I am not alone. You are always with me. May I imitate Your virtues of love, humility and perseverance while dealing with my crosses and offer them up on behalf of my sins, for the sick and less fortunate. Help me to understand that there is nothing You and I can't get through together.





THE THIRD STATION-JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME

I am like you, Jesus, in that I take up my own cross. But my cross is made up of my sins, temptation and Materialism. I carry my cross through my life, like You, Jesus, carried Your cross to Calvary. The Creed as Profession of Faith

What does the word Creed mean? A Latin word for the Creed is symbolum. Its first meaning is that of a sign, a mark of recognition by which an envoy is accredited or strangers know each other as belonging to the same group. The 'symbol' of faith identifies Christians. People who are not Christian cannot profess it without a lie on their part.

In addition to being a sign of our unity, the Creed also is a summary of core doctrines we believe in and an important part of the Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "The purpose of the Creed or Profession of Faith is that the whole gathered people may respond to the Word of God proclaimed in the readings taken from Sacred Scripture and explained in the Homily and that they may also honor and confess the great mysteries of the faith by pronouncing the rule of faith in a formula approved for liturgical use and before the celebration of these mysteries in the Eucharist begins" (GIRM, no. 67). In summary, Charles Belmonte says, "The symbol or Creed expresses our response and assent to what we have just heard in the readings and in the homily" (Understanding the Mass, p. 99). Having heard the truths of the Faith in the Liturgy of the Word, now we profess them in the Creed.

Stand and Profess

Why do we stand up to profess our Faith? As the Diocese of Peoria teaches, "Through the Creed, we as a community of believers stand and profess, in precise terms, the foundations of our faith. We stand for the Creed because of its importance in our Church and in our lives. Of important note is another gesture the Church asks of us as we profess the Creed. As we say '[and by] the Holy Spirit [was



incarnate] of the Virgin Mary and became man,' we are to bow in adoration of the Incarnation and birth of our Lord. Interestingly, on those respective solemnities (Annunciation and Christmas) we are to retain the ancient custom of genuflecting during those lines. As we have reviewed previously, each of the gestures and postures within the liturgy has a meaning and can help us pray more deeply. Throughout the Mass, we stand together for the principal prayers. In a very practical way, standing is another way of giving our assent, as when a crowd stands in applause. Standing adds an additional fervor to the recognition. In a similar way, standing to pray together adds an element of strength to the words we proclaim. Bowing while we recall the Incarnation acknowledges in a humble way how much we honor that significant moment in world history.

As we profess our faith together, we are joined in a unity that began at our Baptism. "As on the day of our Baptism, when our whole life was entrusted to the 'standard teaching,' let us embrace the Creed of our life-giving faith. To say the Credo with faith is to enter into communion with God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and also with the whole Church which transmits the faith to us and in whose midst we believe" (CCC, no. 197).



The Seven Last Words of Christ



This week, we reflect on the second of Our Lord's final words from the Cross. They were spoken to St. Dismas, the Good Thief, as he and Jesus hung dying side by side on Good Friday. We find these words only in the Gospel of Luke.

Dismas and his fellow-thief had, like Christ, been condemned to death by crucifixion. Unlike them, Jesus was innocent, suffering His punishment due to others.

The bad thief reviled Christ and demanded that He save Himself and them, if He be truly the Son of God. Dismas rebuked him for his impiety, proclaiming that they-as criminals-deserved their punishment, but that Christ had done no wrong.

"Truly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise."

Dismas then made a rather strange request of Jesus: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He did not ask to be saved from the cross. He did not ask to escape the punishment for his crimes. He did not even ask for mercy. He simply asked to be remembered. The request is stunning in its simplicity and its profound humility. Even more stunning is the response of Our Lord, Who does far more than simply remember the repentant. "Truly I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise."

Dismas will not only be remembered. He will be forgiven, and the gates of Paradise will be open to him, once his (and Our Lord's) agonies are complete. The Just Man hanging beside Dismas has taken the crimes of Dismas and all of humanity upon Himself, so that we can escape the punishment we deserve.

Dismas' reaction is left to the imagination of the reader, but one can surmise that he died filled with joy and hope. Perhaps he offered up his suffering—in union with Christ—in reparation for his sins and those of humanity. What a beautiful and extraordinary thing, to suffer in such perfect imitation of Christ! What a grace—to rise from being a common thief to being the chosen companion of Jesus in His final hours! How superabundant is the mercy of God!

Eucharistic Witness Saint Joseph and the Holy Eucharist By Fr. Serafino Lanzetta



Let me introduce this topic with a question: did Jesus reveal to St Joseph his desire to institute the Holy Eucharist? Perhaps during the years of his hidden life in Nazareth? Or before the beginning of his public life, e.g., before St. Joseph fell asleep in God? It is not easy to answer this question, nor is it easy to get some clues from the Gospel accounts.

It was certainly fitting for Jesus to reveal to the one who after Mary his Mother was closest to him the secret of secrets, the love of his Heart, the desire of all desires: the Holy Eucharist. We can well imagine that this great desire animated Jesus from his earliest years and that he, therefore, did not hold back his heart from confiding it to Mary his mother and then to Joseph his father. It must have been this "Eucharistic desire" confided to Joseph that motivated the holy Carpenter in a very special way to make himself one with his Son and his Bride.

St Peter Julian Eymard, who describes it as follows: Joseph "penetrated, so to speak, the coarse garment of Jesus: his faith penetrated the Sacred Heart and, illuminated by the divine light, he saw in advance all the states through which Jesus would pass, and he adored them and united himself to the grace of those mysteries. He worshipped Jesus in his hidden life; he worshipped him in his passion and death; he worshipped him even then in the holy Tabernacle. Could Our Lord have hidden anything from St. Joseph? St. Joseph therefore received the grace of all the states of Jesus, including that of adoring the Blessed Sacrament. St. Joseph is therefore a "minister of the Eucharist" because he prepared Jesus to "break bread", to break himself, his body for us, offering him the example of his daily and indomitable sacrifice. He is our model of adoration of the Holy Eucharist.



Communal Prayer Before Mass


