Father Chuck's Corner

Greetings and God's blessings be yours on the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time! We now begin the first segment of Ordinary Time which will take us up to Ash Wednesday and then will resume after the Easter Season. The focus of today's readings is on the acceptance of the call of Jesus to be his follower. In today's first reading from 1 Samuel, we see the prophet Samuel receiving his first revelation from God. After realizing that it was God who was summoning him, Samuel responded: "Speak, for your servant is listening." Then in the second reading from 1 Corinthians, we see Paul telling the people that their bodies are members of Jesus Christ. The body is raised by the power of Jesus and is a temple of the Holy Spirit. "Therefore, glorify God *in your body.*" And finally, John's gospel reveals something that is at least one thing God is inviting all of us to do; namely, to point the way to Jesus and invite others to join in the journey with you. John the Baptist had pointed his disciples to Jesus and when they came to Jesus, he told them: "Come and vou will see."

In today's readings from 1 Samuel and John's gospel we have examples of "holy conversations," interactions between God and human beings. Samuel is a bit confused for a while about what he is hearing as Jesus does what he always does-flips the conversation from something shallow to something much deeper. Now we may have difficulty in relating what happened back then to us today. The temptation is to simply assume that God really doesn't have much to say anymore and so our communication with God is mostly one-sided. We do all the talking and hope that God is listening. It seems to me that we have to stop talking sometimes and believe that God has something to say to us. It takes faith to believe that God hasn't stopped trying to communicate, to believe that he hasn't gone silent. And it takes faith to truly want to hear what God has to say, which is not always going to be nice thoughts that warm our hearts. Sometimes he wants to ask us questions, to get us to think more deeply about things. Sometimes he invites us to travel down a path we have never travelled on before. Sometimes he wants us to stop behavior that is harmful or unhealthy. And sometimes he wants to challenge us in some way to be more or give more or love more. Finally, there are times he just wants us to know how much he loves us and encourages us to trust more deeply. Yes, God wants to tell us so many things. But it can't happen if we never stop babbling, stop giving God a laundry list of wants and desires.

Remember, prayer is a "holy conversation", one between Creator and creature, between Savior and sinner, between lover and beloved. Just don't make your voice get in the way of the most important voice there is: "Speak, for your servant is listening."

We have learned that several weeks ago, an outstation in Father Jim's parish in Uganda was attacked by rebels. Some people were killed and over three hundred, many of them children, displaced as a result of this attack. The main compound of Father Jim's parish is their only hope for safety at this time. There is a great need to feed and shelter his people and local help is minimal at best. So, next Sunday we will take up a special collection at all the Masses to help Father Jim at this time. If you donate by check, make it out to St. Raymond Church. As soon as possible we will send the money to Father Jim. I thank you in advance for your help with this appeal.

This coming Friday is the annual *March for Life* in Washington D.C. We will have an extended period of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 1 -8pm in the church. Each hour will include praying the Rosary, special prayers, and time for silent prayer. Adoration will conclude at 8pm with Benediction. I invite all who can to try and spend one hour of this time praying together and trusting that God will hear our prayers that change hearts and brings about an ending of abortion.

Please remember to take home a copy of the bulletin when you leave Mass today. It contains many items of interest with something for everyone. Of special note is news and needs from Parish Social Ministry, info from Religious Education (Faith Formation), an invitation to join our Consolation Ministry, an invitation to the March for Life Prayer Vigil from 1-8pm in church on Friday, January 19th, the Eucharistic Revival Centerfold, the Communal Prayer Before Communion (found on the inside back cover of the bulletin) an invitation to join FORMED (your Catholic Faith on demand) and much more. To keep informed, keep a copy of the bulletin at home each week for quick and easy reference.

FIRST READING 1 Sm 3:3b-10, 19

Samuel was sleeping in the temple of the LORD where the ark of God was. The LORD called to Samuel, who answered, "Here I am." Samuel ran to Eli and said, "Here I am. You called me." "I did not call you, " Eli said. "Go back to sleep." So he went back to sleep. Again the LORD called Samuel, who rose and went to Eli. "Here I am, " he said. "You called me." But Eli answered, "I did not call you, my son. Go back to sleep." At that time Samuel was not familiar with the LORD, because the LORD had not revealed anything to him as yet. The Response After Readings

After the First and Second Readings at Mass, we have this familiar statement and response from the congregation. As the Diocese of Peoria's A Study of the Mass teaches, "At the end of the reading, the lector announces, 'the Word of the Lord,' which is a testament of our faith in the inspired Word of God in Sacred Scripture. We readily show our gratitude and respond, 'Thanks be to God!' We are thankful that God has revealed himself to us and that He continues to speak to us".

God Speaks to Us

Far more than just being "standard operating procedure," these little dialogues are really powerful affirmations of what is happening during the Liturgy of the Word. While the lector proclaims God's Word, we listen to what God wants to teach us that particular day. Even if we are generally attentive to the readings, we can easily get distracted. Perhaps we notice someone sitting nearby and think of a question we wanted to ask him or her. Sometimes, a word in the reading reminds us of another thought. Maybe our stomach growls and we start thinking about what our next meal might be. In any event, at the end of the reading, the lector helps to get us back on track if we've wandered astray. The lector says, "The Word of the Lord," as if to say, "In case you forgot or didn't notice, the Lord God of heaven and earth was just speaking to you." It really is amazing to stop and think about: God is speaking to us, his people, through the readings at Mass!

Our response, "Thanks be to God," acknowledges that God is truly speaking to his people through the Bible reading we just heard and that we recognize we are blessed to hear those words! Being in the habit of turning to God in thankfulness can be so helpful in our daily living as well. In the midst of our lives, we easily get our hearts turned inward, such as when we are thinking about what makes us happy or what we would enjoy for dinner. In more serious situations, when we fall into sin, we are turned inward in a way that keeps our vision away from God and others. When this happens, we can find ourselves falling into selfishness and self-seeking behavior. We can also miss opportunities for charity because we do not recognize the good in the people around us.



Practicing Thankfulness

In these latter situations, the grace of the sacraments helps strengthen us. Thankfulness is also a great remedy that helps turn our hearts as we recognize blessings that have come from God and others. Being thankful can give us a reset and help us once again to see and appreciate the gifts God has given us and the good that we can see in one another. We glimpse the wisdom behind our response to the readings at Mass. Being in the habit of regularly thanking God helps keep our hearts healthy and on track.

Not only does this dialogue help us acknowledge God and thank him for the Scriptures, but it can also help us stay in tune with what we are doing at Mass. As you may know, the word Eucharist itself means "thanksgiving." In the Mass, we join with Christ in the perfect sacrifice of praise to God the Father. As God's people, we are also joined together in thankful praise, recognizing the love of Christ and our invitation to share in that love. Very fittingly, after the Second Reading and response, we will praise God together in preparation for the Gospel as we sing the Alleluia!

For Reflection:

1. Reflect on a few Scripture passages which proclaim, "Thanks be to God" (e.g., Romans 7:25, 1 Corinthians 15:57, 2 Corinthians 9:15). Compare St. Paul's cause for thanksgiving with your own reasons for gratitude. Consider adding "Thanks be to God" to your public ways of expressing joy and gratitude in daily life.

2. Psalms 105, 106, 107, 118, and 136 (among others) all begin by inviting us to "Give thanks to the Lord." Try beginning your next time of prayer with thanksgiving.

The Significance of the Baptism of the Lord January 8th The Baptism of the Lord is notable because it marks the beginning of Jesus' ministry and confirms his identity as the Son of God.

The Trinity Displayed in the Baptism of the Lord

The Gospel of Mark describes the event:"It happened in those days that Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized in the Jordan by John. On coming up out of the water he saw the heavens being torn open and the Spirit, like a dove, descending upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." (Mark 1:9-11).

Why Is Jesus Baptized?

When Jesus comes to John, John hesitates to baptize him. John's is a baptism of repentance, and Jesus has nothing for which he needs to repent. Why then does Jesus insist on being baptized? By choosing to be baptized, Jesus fulfills all righteousness – preparing himself to be a perfect sacrifice for us. The account in Matthew demonstrates this: "Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan to be baptized by him. John tried to prevent him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and yet you are coming to me?" Jesus said to him in reply, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." Then he allowed him." (Matthew 3:13-15)

What Does Baptism Mean for Us?

As we reflect on Christ's baptism, we are reminded of our own baptism. Pope Benedict XVI said on the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord: "[Baptism] is communion with the One who conquered death and holds in his hand the keys of life. Belonging to this circle, to God's family, means being in communion with Christ, who is life and gives eternal love beyond death."

Thanks be to God, who has redeemed us from our sins and given us eternal life through Jesus Christ.

Eucharistic Witness St. Elizabeth Ann Seton First American Saint († 1821) Feast: January 4

Elizabeth Ann Seton's story is at the heart of the Church in the U.S., and the Eucharist is at the heart of her story. Born Elizabeth Bayley in 1704, she married William Seton in an Episcopalian church and gave birth to five children. In 1803, Elizabeth accompanied her husband to Italy, seeking relief for his tuberculosis. William died later that year. While in Italy with her husband during his illness, she was fascinated by Catholics' faith in the Eucharist: they believed that Jesus really meant it when he said that the bread and wine offered at Mass are truly transformed into his Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. The knowledge that Jesus Christ was really there in the Catholic Church, waiting for her, dominated her thoughts. After she returned to the U.S., she entered the Catholic Church in 1805 and moved her family to Baltimore, where she took a leading role in founding a Catholic education system. In 1809 she became a professed religious and, she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph.

Elizabeth was deeply saddened by the lack of the Eucharistic faith she saw in others. She thought of the words of St. Paul with tears: "they discern not the Lord's body."" She made her feelings about the Eucharist clear to her Protestant friends, and they challenged her. She recalled that her answer wasn't agitated, but calm and even joyful. "It is God who does it, the same God who fed so many thousands with the little barley loaves and little fishes, multiplying them of course in the hands which distributed them." In fact, she said, "Nothing is so very hard to believe in it [the Eucharist], since it is he [God] who does it.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton shows us that our faith comes to us by the Eucharist, in the Eucharist, and for the Eucharist.
